

Nature Matters series opens tonight at Fort George

The Nature Matters 2015-16 season kicks off with a marine reserve discussion, "Protecting the Ocean," at 7 p.m. tonight in the Fort George Lovell Showroom.

The presentation highlights Cape Falcon Marine Reserve, the newest reserve going into effect in January off Oswald West State Park. There is no cost for this event, and the doors open at 6 p.m. The public is welcome.

Join Charlie Plybon, Oregon policy manager for the Surfrider Foundation

and member of the Friends of Cape Falcon Marine Reserve, to learn about marine reserves and protected areas, how they are designated, the role they play in ocean conservation, and what outcomes have been seen from similar protected areas.

Plybon works to help advance the conservation and recreational interests of coastal and ocean ecosystems. In 2014, he was appointed to Oregon's Ocean Policy Advisory Council and serves in the capacity of the "non-extractive recreation seat," representing recreational

ocean users on a number of important coastal and ocean issues.

He also serves on the steering committee of Oregon's Marine Reserves Partnership, helping to support greater awareness, foster appreciation and scientific understanding for Oregon's system of marine reserves.

Nature Matters takes place on the third Thursday of each month, October through May, and is hosted by Lewis and Clark National Historical Park, the North Coast Watershed Association, and Fort George Brewery and Public House.

Astoria native who helped invent Zoloft dies at 90

Ken Koe, a native Astoria resident who became a chemist for Pfizer Inc. and co-invented the antidepressant medication Zoloft, died Oct. 7 in Shrewsbury, Massachusetts, at age 90.

Born April 15, 1925, in Astoria, Billie Kenneth Koe was the son of Chinese immigrants who moved around the Pacific Northwest before landing in Portland's Chinatown, according to a Reed College alumni profile.

Koe graduated from Lincoln High School and earned a scholarship to Reed, where

he majored in chemistry. He went on to earn a master's degree in chemistry at the University of Washington and a Ph.D. at the California Institute of Technology in Pasadena, California, according to a Bloomberg article.

He began working for the Pfizer in New York in 1955 and did research for the company for 40 years. During the 1970s and '80s, he and Willard Welch, another Pfizer chemist, developed the drug

that would become Zoloft, Bloomberg said.

In 1991, Zoloft hit pharmacy shelves and quickly became the most prescribed antidepressant up to that point, with sales reaching \$3.36 billion in 2004. The drug's patent expired in 2006, Bloomberg said.

Koe is survived by his daughters, Kristin Koe and Karen Koe, and five grandchildren, Bloomberg said.

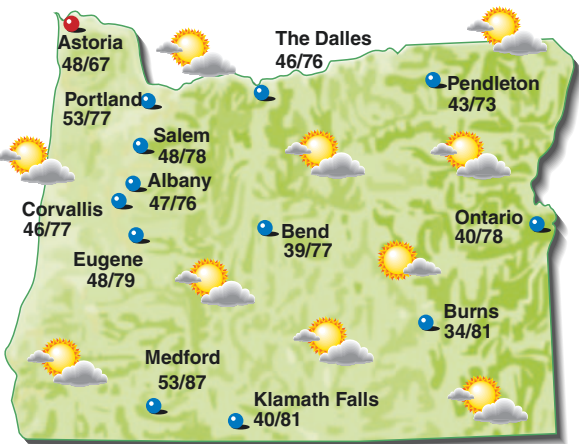

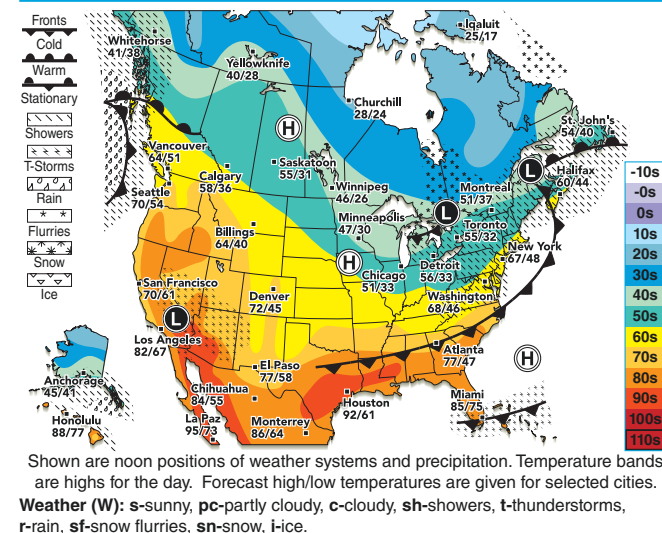

She graduated from Queen Ann High School and went on to receive her bachelor's degree in art from Lewis and Clark College in 1951. After graduation, she married James R. Shaw on June 9, 1951, and raised two sons in California until coming home to Arch Cape, as she put it, in 1978.

Barbara was very passionate about helping women get and further their education, and joined the NY PEO (Philanthropic Education Organization) 60 years ago in Redding, California. To continue this desire, Barbara helped charter the FB PEO Cannon Beach, Oregon chapter, and is the last of 13 original charter members.

Barbara was constantly doing for others. Many of us have been exposed to her resilience and strength in this community, always at the right place, right time, to solve the problem or just be a great friend. For 85 years her life's passions never slowed, from the everyday walks on the beach, to running her bed and breakfast
