

# LaMear to participate in national summit on coastal flooding threat

Astoria Mayor Arline LaMear will travel to New Hampshire this weekend for a national summit on the threat from rising sea levels and coastal flooding.

LaMear is one of more than 35 mayors and local and state officials set to participate in the "Rising Tides" summit, which is being hosted by Portsmouth Mayor Bob Lister and New Hampshire state Sen. Nancy Stiles.

The summit is scheduled to include presentations by officials from the U.S. Navy, the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration, the Federal Emergency Management Agency and the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers.

Astoria is bordered by the Columbia River and Youngs River and is close to the Pacific Ocean. Along with the risks posed by flooding, tsunamis and a potentially devastating Cascadia Subduction Zone earthquake, changes in the ocean can impact the region's commercial and recreational fishing industries.

"We are seeing more warm water species in the area like Humboldt squid, brown pelicans, Steller sea lions and this summer were visited by a pod of humpback whales!" LaMear said in a statement. "While warm summers and whales in Astoria are novel, it is unsettling for many."

# Daily Astorian managing editor tapped as president of news industry group

PALO ALTO, Calif. — Laura Sellers, the managing editor of The Daily Astorian, is the new president of the Associated Press Media Editors, a news industry group that encourages journalism excellence and supports training and development.

The organization elected eight members to its board of directors and installed new leadership during its joint conference with the American Society of News Editors at Stanford University.

Elected to at-large positions Sunday were Michael Anastasi, senior vice president and executive editor of the Los Angeles News Group; Traci Bauer, vice president/news and executive editor of Lohud.com and The Journal News in New York's Lower Hudson Valley; Jane Davenport, managing editor of the Toronto Star; and Michael Days, editor of the Philadelphia Daily News. Also elected to at-large positions were Kurt Franck, executive editor and vice president of The Blade in Toledo, Ohio, and Carlos Sanchez, executive editor of The Monitor in McAllen, Texas.

Ronnie Agnew, executive director of Mississippi Public Broadcasting, was elected as a broadcast representative, and Tom Arviso Jr., chief executive officer of the Navajo Times Publishing Co. and publisher of the Na-

vajo Times, was selected for small-market media. Anne Brennan, product manager/editor of the Cape Cod (Massachusetts) Times website CapeCodOnline.com, was elected to represent online media.

The new APME officers, in addition to Sellers, are Vice President Bill Church, executive editor, Herald-Tribune Media Group in Sarasota, Florida; Secretary Jim Simon, managing editor, The Seattle Times; and Journalism Studies Chairwoman Angie Muhs, executive editor of The State Journal-Register in Springfield, Illinois. The treasurer is Dennis Anderson, editor of the Peoria (Illinois) Journal Star.

The APME also selected its Innovator of the Year, giving the award to the Boston Herald for Boston Herald Radio. Other finalists were the Los Angeles News Group and The Oklahoman. The Herald received \$1,000 from GateHouse Media.

At the conference, the ASNE board of directors chose six new members and a new executive committee. Pam Fine of the University of Kansas became the 2015 president. The executive committee is Vice President Mizell Stewart III of Journal Media Group in Milwaukee, Wisconsin; Secretary Alfredo Carbajal of Al Día (The Dallas Morning News) in Dallas; and Treasurer Nancy Barnes of the Houston Chronicle.

The board added five members for three-year terms: Manny Garcia, editor, Naples Daily News in Naples, Florida; Brian McGrory, editor, The Boston Globe; Karen Peterson, editor, The News Tribune in Tacoma, Washington; Robyn Tomlin, managing editor, The Dallas Morning News; and Anne Vasquez, managing editor, Sun Sentinel in Ft. Lauderdale, Florida.

Rene Sanchez, editor of the Minneapolis Star Tribune, was chosen for a one-year term.

The conference, which ended Sunday, was the second joint conference held by APME and ASNE, the nation's top organizations for news leaders. The organizations will hold their 2016 conference in Philadelphia.

APME members are newsroom leaders at newspapers and broadcast outlets, journalism educators and student leaders in the United States and Canada.

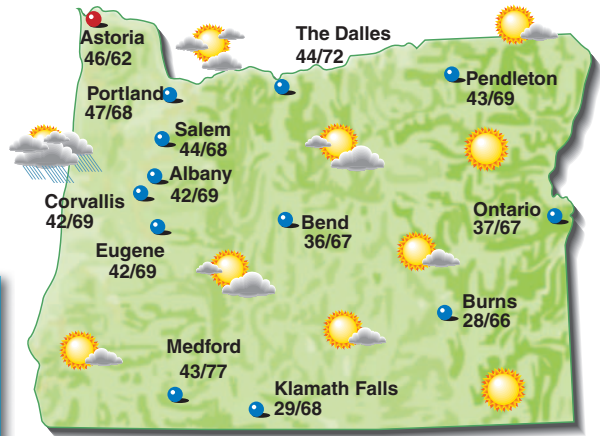

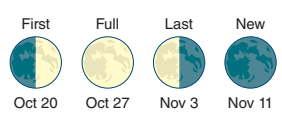

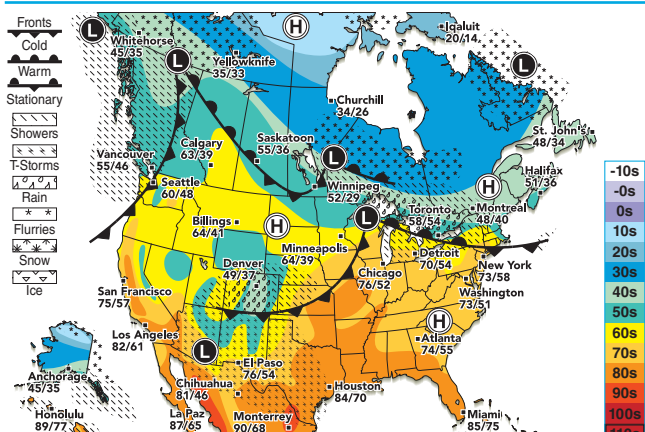

### Driving under the influence of intoxicants

At about 12:28 a.m. Monday, Astoria Police arrested Joshua Nolan, 27, Seaside, after he drove through barricades set up at the New Youngs Bay Bridge roundabout. The barricades had been set up to block southbound U.S. Highway 101 while the bridge was being repaired over the weekend. Police said Nolan was visibly impaired when he arrived. When they asked him to exit his vehicle, he started walking to the bridge

railing making suicidal statements. The officers stopped him and told him he was under arrest for driving under the influence of intoxicants. Nolan resisted arrest, but, after a struggle, was subdued. Police charged him with endangering a highway worker, reckless driving, DUII and resisting arrest. He was taken first to Columbia Memorial Hospital where he was medically cleared. A breath test revealed his blood alcohol content was at .20 percent, more than two times the legal limit. He was

transported to the Clatsop County Jail.

### Counterfeit money

At 11:28 a.m. Sunday, an employee at the Mini Mart on West Marine Drive reported two counterfeit \$20 bills. Astoria Police say they have not received any other reports about counterfeit money. "When we do start to see some, we usually start to see a lot of them," Deputy Chief Eric Halverson said. He reminded businesses and community members to carefully check the money they receive.
