The Sou'Wester Lodge hosts live music

SEAVIEW, Wash. — The Sou'Wester Lodge is getting ready to host live music.

First, at 8 p.m. Thursday, Oct. 22, the lodge will host singer-songwriter Josephine Foster with special guest and local folk singer Michael Hurley.

Foster's first solo album, 2005's “Hazel Eyes, I Will Lead You” remind of American folk and blues from the early 20th century. In 2009, she released “Graphic as a Star,” an album of 27 Emily Dickinson song settings. She has lived in rural Spain with her husband, Victor Herrero, collecting and arranging folk songs.

“Her last record, ‘Blood Rushing,’ offered a selection of recordings that showed Foster's interest in both European and American folk traditions, indicative of her roots in Colorado and her time living in Spain,” wrote Andrew Spragg in *The Quietus Review*.
