

Heavy rain closes Indian Beach at Ecola State Park

High surf advisory issued through Tuesday

CANNON BEACH — Indian Beach at Ecola State Park is closed until further notice because of damage to the access road, the Oregon Parks and Recreation Department announced.

Above-average rainfall caused erosion under Ecola State Park Road where it travels over Canyon Creek, making the road unsafe. The storm also washed out trail access to Arcadia Beach State Recreation Area, just south of Ecola.

On Saturday, 2.78 inches of rain drenched Astoria, compared to the normal .38 inches, the National Weather Service reported.

A high surf advisory is in effect from noon to midnight Tuesday for southwest Washington and the north Oregon Coast.

A west and northwest swell of 19 to 22 feet with a dominant period around 13 seconds will impact the coastline. The strongest seas are expected Tuesday afternoon.

The National Weather Service advises people to avoid walking on jetties, rocks and coastal cliffs as waves may rise unexpectedly and sweep people into the turbulent and frigid waters.

A high surf advisory means the high surf will affect beaches in the area, producing rip currents and localized beach erosion.

Meanwhile, Lewis and Clark Road at milepost 8 will be closed during business hours this week while Clatsop County Road Department crews clear debris following a landslide Saturday night.

Heavy rain caused the ground to slide and trees to fall from the steep slopes surrounding Lewis and Clark Road. Crews closed one lane Saturday night, and removed

120 yards of material from the roadway.

On Monday morning, crews returned to safely remove six alder trees and other debris from the side of the road.

The road is open to local access, but will be closed to through traffic between 8 a.m. and 5 p.m.

The closure is expected to last until Friday.

Man who tried to elude police convicted, sentenced to 4 years

An Ocean Park, Washington, man who attempted to elude police twice in five years was sentenced last week in Clatsop County Circuit Court to four years in prison.

Timothy Leon Painter II, 37, pleaded guilty to attempting to elude police, failure to perform the duties of a driver and driving while his license was suspended after a high-speed chase in May that began on the beach north of Gearhart and ended near a residence in Seaside.

At the time, Painter was on probation for eluding police in January 2010 from the parking lot of Lum's Auto Center in Warrenton.

He was sentenced to 11 months in prison for the chase in May, and 37 months for vi-

olating his probation from the 2010 case.

In May, a Clatsop County Sheriff's Office reserve beach patrol officer spotted Painter driving a yellow Dodge Neon without a seatbelt on the beach. When the officer attempted to make a traffic stop, Painter took off southbound down the beach at 60 mph.

Painter drove for about two miles on the beach before

exiting onto U.S. Highway 101, where he reached speeds of 90 mph. Seaside Police unsuccessfully placed spike stripes to stop Painter. Painter then turned on Broadway Street and struck another vehicle at Avenue A and Holladay Drive.

Painter fled from his vehicle and was arrested on S. Columbia Street and Avenue S.

In 2010, Warrenton police noticed a prowler in the Lum's parking lot and discovered Painter, an Aloha resident at the time, hiding in his vehicle.

He reportedly tried to ram the patrol car with his vehicle. He was convicted of second-degree assault, attempting to elude police, second and third-degree criminal mischief, unlawful entry into a motor vehicle and criminal trespass.

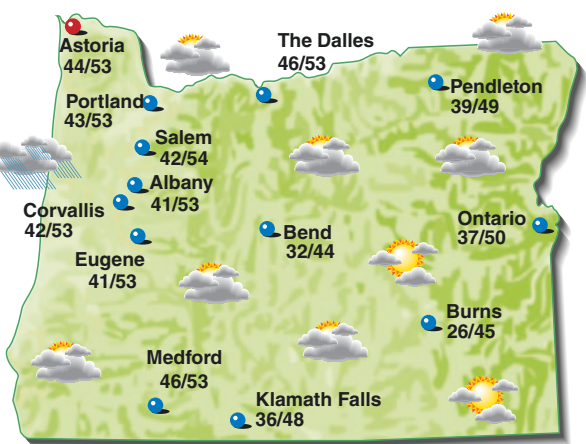

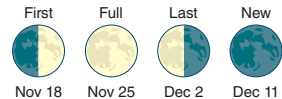

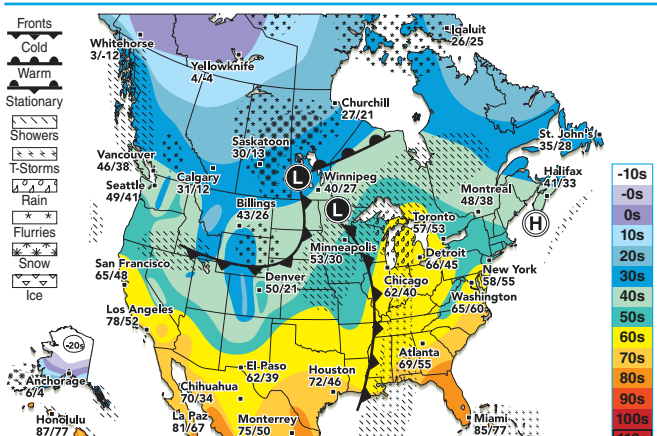
