

Loggers victorious in low-scoring contest

WARRENTON — Knappa vs. Warrenton basketball is an old rivalry with lots of tradition ... but that doesn't always mean it's going to be a high-scoring, instant classic on the court.

In one of the lowest-scoring games between the two schools, Knappa outlasted Warrenton Tuesday night, 35-25, in a nonleague boys basketball game at Warrenton.

Both teams struggled on offense in the first half, and the halftime break didn't improve things in the second.

Knappa's problem was making shots (4-of-19 in the first half, 0-for-8 from the 3-point line), while Warrenton's problem was taking shots (5-for-11 in the first half).

Still, "it was a good high school basketball game, even though it won't look good in the box score," Knappa coach Chris Spencer said. "Nate (McBride, Warrenton coach) knows us well, and we know them well. Both teams played hard, and both teams played well on defense.

"We held them to 11 points in the second half, and they did a good job on us," he said. "Colton (Weirup) struggled in the first half, but he hit a couple 3-pointers in the third quarter. He and Dale (Takalo) scored 30 of our 35. As they go, we go."

Warrenton held an early 10-7 lead following a 3-pointer by Christian Holt, but Takalo had a pair of hoops and Knappa led 17-14 at halftime.

Back-to-back 3-pointers by Weirup late in the third game Knappa a 27-16 lead.

Warrenton's Anthony Cochran scored seven of his team-high 13 points in the fourth quarter, helping the Warriors to within 27-23, but Takalo made six free throws in the final 26 seconds to close out the win.

Astoria 56, Ilwaco 34
ILWACO, Wash. — A 3-0 start had the Ilwaco boys basketball team feeling pretty confident entering Tuesday night's home game vs. Astoria, which was playing its first game of the season.

But the upstart Fishermen from the south side of the Columbia River outplayed the younger squad from Ilwaco, as Astoria stunned previously unbeaten Ilwaco with a 54-36 win in nonleague action at Ilwaco.

"They're young, but they play really hard," Astoria coach Kevin Goin said of Ilwaco. "We struggled to make shots early, but we held them to 11 (points) in the first half, and our length gave them problems all night."

Astoria led 26-11 at halftime, then put the game away with a 19-10 run in the third quarter.

Still playing without starting point guard Fridtjof Fremstad, Astoria picked up 15 points apiece from Derek Jarrett and Morgan Fruith, while Zac Tapio had a game-high 16 for Ilwaco.

Seaside 86, Rainier 43
SEASIDE — Seaside bounced back from last week's loss to Liberty by doubling the score on Rainier Tuesday night at home, as the Gulls pounded the Columbians 86-43 in nonleague action.

The Gulls jumped out to a 17-0 lead and finished with 15 players in double figures.

Jackson Januik led all scorers with 19 points, followed by Hunter Thompson (17), Austin Eagon (14), Atikin Babb (12) and Jaxson Smith (11).

"We got off to a fast start, then got kind of lackadaisical on defense," Seaside coach Bill Westerholm said. "(The Columbians) got to within eight or nine in the second

Warriors 38, Loggers 28
WARRENTON — After coming close a few times over the past four years, the Warrenton Lady Warriors finally dialed up the right number to defeat Knappa Tuesday night, 38-28, in nonleague girls basketball action at Warrenton.

It was Warrenton's first victory over Knappa since 2011, as the Warriors took a close halftime lead, then broke it open in the third period on the way to their second win of the season.

The Lady Loggers — who trailed by just five points (19-14) at the break, missed 24 of their first 25 shots of the second half, and that was all Warrenton needed to build an eventual 37-18 lead.

Playing without starter Landree Mieth, the Warriors came up with balanced scoring attack, featuring freshman Reagan Hunt (11 points off the bench), with nine points from Katelynn Blodgett and eight points apiece from Tyla Little and Sophia Thomas.

The Warriors were 0-for-12 from the 3-point line, but still managed to make 17 of their 53 field goal attempts, and 4-of-14 free throws.

Knappa's Kaitlyn Landwehr led all scorers with 14 points.

A: Stop Microsoft from using YOUR computer to distribute THEIR updates. By default, Windows 10 uses your computer to "send parts of previously downloaded updates and apps to ... (other) PCs on the internet."

To stop this, left click (LF) "Windows" icon, lower left on screen.

Then LF "Settings" then "Update and security," then "Advanced Options," then "Choose how updates are delivered"

Click oval to set it to read "OFF"
