

Marijuana, heroin topics of public forums

The Daily Astorian

North Coast Prevention Works will be hosting two public forums Jan. 21 on emerging issues with marijuana and heroin.

Eric Martin, director emeritus of the Addiction Counselor Certification Board of Oregon, will discuss issues and answer questions.

The first session will be from noon to 2 p.m. in Columbia Hall Room 219 on Clatsop Community College's main campus, 1651 Lexington Ave. in Astoria. The second will take place from 6 to 8 p.m. in

the auditorium at Astoria High School, 1001 W Marine Drive. Marijuana became legal for retail sales in Oregon last year. Martin will explain what the new law means for communities, schools, families and youth. These sessions are a follow-up on two workshops hosted by North Coast Prevention Works this past fall to explain the law on retail marijuana.

Martin is also an adjunct faculty member with the University of Oregon Substance Abuse Prevention Program, has served on several gubernatorial advisory boards and is state and nationally certified

with 29 years as an addictions counselor and prevention specialist.

Prevention Works is a local coalition of law enforcement, education, parents, businesses, mentoring programs, substance abuse professionals, social services, healthcare workers and youth to prevent youth substance abuse, suicide, delinquency and other risky behaviors.

The group meets from 3:30 to 5 p.m. the third Thursday of each month at Warrenton City Hall and can be reached at ncreventionworks@gmail.com.

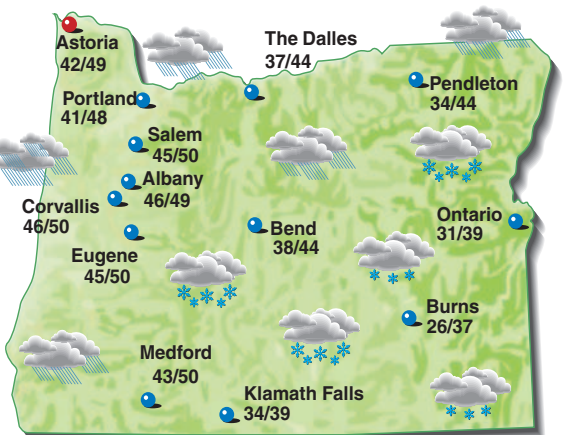

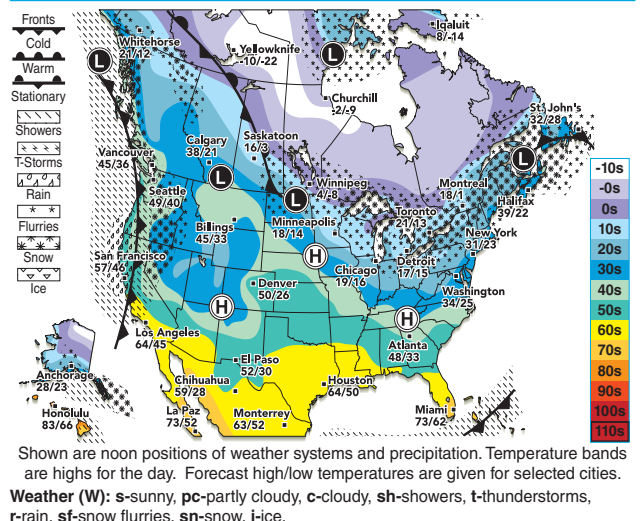

Dick then spent two years in Korea, serving in the U.S. Army as a radio communications specialist. He completed his master's of education degree at the University of Oregon in 1959.

Dick worked for the Hillsboro School District for his entire career, hired as a history teacher before moving into school administration. He retired in 1990 after 33 years of service. He was a lifelong educator and had a passion for mentoring and developing aspiring new teachers.

She was preceded in death by Howard, her husband of 60 years, and her son, Lynn.

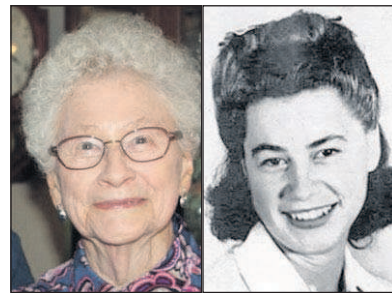
