

Offices close for Martin Luther King Jr. Day

In observance of Martin Luther King Jr. Day on Monday, all federal, state, county and city offices and services, including Astoria, Warrenton, Gearhart, Seaside and Cannon Beach city halls, are closed. All U.S. post offices are closed and there is no mail delivery.

Astoria, Jewell, Knappa, Warrenton/Hammond, Seaside (including Cannon Beach and Gearhart schools) and Ocean Beach School District schools and Clatsop Community College are closed.

The Astoria Library, Seaside Library, Warrenton Library and all Timberland libraries in Washington state, including Ilwaco, Ocean Park and Naselle, are closed.

The Port of Astoria offices and services are closed.

Garbage collection through Recology Western Oregon (covering Astoria, Seaside, Gearhart and Cannon Beach), city of Warrenton garbage collection, and Peninsula Sanitation (covering the Long Beach

(Washington) Peninsula) are not affected by the holiday. Recology Western Oregon and Peninsula Sanitation's transfer stations are open.

The Sunset Pool in Seaside is open from 5:45 a.m. to 8 p.m. The Astoria Aquatic Center is open from 5 a.m. to 7 p.m.

The Clatsop County Heritage Museum is closed. The Oregon Film Museum and Flavel House are open from 11 a.m. to 4 p.m., and the Carriage House is open from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. The Uppertown Firefighters' Museum is closed for the winter.

Capt. Gray's Port of Play and Lil' Sprouts are open from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. Fort Clatsop is open from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. The Columbia River Maritime Museum is open from 9:30 a.m. to 5 p.m. The Seaside Museum is open from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m.

Sunset Empire Transportation ("The Bus") is running.

The Daily Astorian offices are open, and the newspaper printed and delivered as usual.

Record Powerball jackpot split three ways

MUNFORD, Tenn. — An eye-popping and unprecedented Powerball jackpot whose rise to \$1.6 billion became a national fascination will be split three ways, by mystery winners in Florida, Tennessee and California.

The lucky trio did not immediately identify themselves Thursday, but they bought their tickets in Munford, a town of about 6,000 in Tennessee; the modest Los Angeles suburb of Chino Hills; and at supermarket in Melbourne Beach, Florida, where residents of a nearby housing

development were heard partying loudly after Wednesday night's drawing.

The winners of the world-record jackpot overcame odds of 1 in 292.2 million to land on all the numbers drawn Wednesday night, 4-8-19-27-34 and Powerball 10. They can take their earnings either as an annuity or as a lump-sum payment, which would be worth slightly less, and which on Wednesday stood at \$983.5 million. The huge draw also produced eight \$2 million winners and 73 \$1 million winners nationwide, said Sally Lunsford of the Kansas Lottery.

The California ticket was sold at a 7-Eleven in Chino Hills, lottery spokesman Alex

Traverso told The Associated Press. The winning Florida ticket was sold at a Publix grocery store. Tennessee officials did not immediately say which of the three Munford stores offering Powerball tickets produced the winner.

That store will get a \$25,000 check; Florida's store collects \$100,000, and Traverso said the 7-Eleven in California will collect a \$1 million bonus, following each state's rules.

The estimated jackpot amounts had risen steadily since Nov. 4, when it was reset at \$40 million. Texas Lottery executive director Gary Grief has said this Powerball offered "absolutely" the world's biggest jackpot.

Not that there aren't large jackpots elsewhere. Spain's massively popular Christmas lottery, known as "El Gordo," is ranked as the world's richest, though it doles out millions of prizes rather than one large jackpot like the Powerball. El Gordo last month showered 2.2 billion euros (\$2.4 billion) across the country.

Powerball tickets are sold in 44 states, as well as the District of Columbia, the U.S. Virgin Islands and Puerto Rico. Many residents of the six that don't participate crossed state lines to get their hands on tickets before the drawing, according to the Multi-State Lottery Association.

Ocean Park man held on \$1 million bail in child-sex case

OCEAN PARK, Wash. — A local tattoo artist is in Pacific County Jail on \$1 million bail following his arrest on suspicion of committing several sex offenses involving children.

Pacific County Sheriff's Office deputies on Jan. 7 arrested John Keone Lopaka

Aylward, 45, on suspicion of first-degree rape of a child, sexual exploitation of a minor, dealing in child pornography, and first-degree incest.

According to public records, Aylward is a father and stepfather with several children, ages 3 to adult. Though he now claims to run a tattoo business, he used to be a contractor, and co-owner of a local business, Affordable Roofing and Construction. Deputies executed a search warrant in December at Aylward's home in the 2900 block of N Street in Ocean Park. The warrant was based on a "credible report" that Aylward was allegedly providing pornographic materials to a primary-school-aged child, according to a probable cause statement.

During the search, deputies seized "many cellphones, memory cards, computers, and other related items," which they later reviewed. According to the investigating deputy, most of the devices either did not contain illegal materials, or

were broken and could not be viewed. However, two cards allegedly contained incriminating images and videos.

A cellphone memory card, taken from a room where Aylward allegedly ran a tattoo business, contained about 17,000 files, though the deputy said he only reviewed parts of about 70 of the files.

According to the deputy, "most" of those files contained "hardcore" materials, and "about one quarter" of those contained short video clips of very explicit child pornography, featuring male and female children as young as about 3 years of age. Many of the videos appeared to be amateur films that were recorded with cellphones.

The phone and card will be sent to a forensic laboratory for further examination, the deputy said, noting that the card could potentially contain "large amounts of child pornography."

On Jan. 6, the deputy reviewed a second memory

card. That card contained three explicit videos that appear to have been filmed by Aylward. According to the report, the films allegedly show about 15 minutes of footage of Aylward coercing a primary-school-aged child into participating in a variety of sex acts. The deputy said the acts appear to have been filmed fairly recently, and at a location on the peninsula.

After viewing the second card, deputies went to Aylward's home, and arrested him at about 2:30 a.m. on Jan. 7.

During an early morning interview in custody, Aylward agreed to talk to police but denied all of the allegations, calling them "ridiculous." Aylward allegedly insisted that he was not familiar with the material on the memory cards, had never molested any children, and did not have any memory of the alleged events, until the deputies provided him with screen shots that allegedly showed him engaged in illegal sex acts.

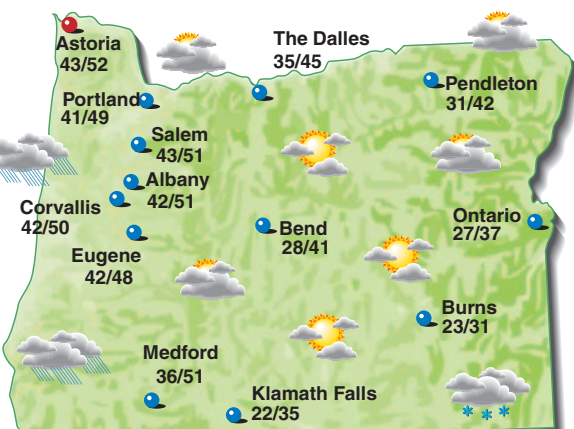

Tonight's Sky: High above the southwest horizon is the constellation of Aries the Lamb.

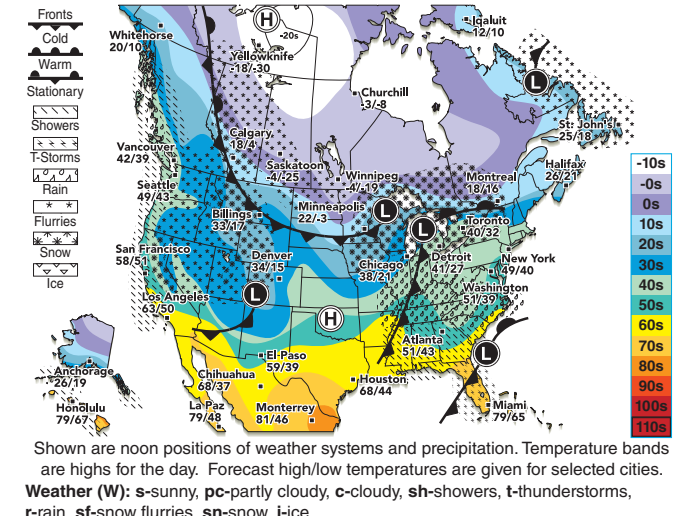
