Logue, Lovvold highlight new AHS Hall inductees

Five individuals, two teams and a contributor are set to be inducted into the Astoria High School Hall of Fame.

Induction ceremonies take place Jan. 30 at the Astoria Elks Club. The inductees will also be introduced at halftime of Astoria's boys basketball game vs. Seaside, Jan. 29 at the Brick House.

Inductees range from the Class of 1948 to '88, with two teams (1982 girls track and 1986 boys golf).

Astoria's 2016 Hall of Fame class

Doug Logue (1948) — During the "Golden Age" of Astoria basketball (the 1930s and '40s), the Fishermen qualified for the state tournament 16 out of 20 years and won six state titles, all at a time when Astoria competed with schools now at the 6A level.

Logue was a 6-foot-4, two-year starter at center, and helped lead Astoria to a combined record of 57 wins, 22 losses.

He scored 337 points his senior year, which accounted for more than 25 percent of the team's season total. The Fishermen went undefeated at home (19-0) his senior season and entered the state tournament on a 20-game win streak, ranked No. 2 in the state. The Fishermen won their first game of the tournament vs. Jefferson of Portland, followed by two losses.

After high school, Logue was a four-year letterman at Willamette University. He was a conference All-Star team three years in a row, and was a Northwest Small College All-Star his senior year, helping Willamette win four straight league titles. He also set a Bearcat record for total points in a game (32), and was inducted into the Willamette Hall of Fame in 2000.

Andre Baugh (1973) — A three-year track star, Baugh was voted by teammates as Most Improved, Most Inspirational and Most Valuable.

He broke the school record in the 100-yard dash twice, with a best of 9.9 seconds. He also broke the school's 220-yard dash record, with a best of 22.4. Both records still stand. He also anchored the quarter-mile relay team to a then-school record of 44.5.

At the 1973 Coast Valley Districts, Baugh received All-League honors for winning the 100- and 220-yard races.

Baugh also played running back for Astoria football as a junior and senior. The 1972 team won the Coast Valley League Championship, and fought their way to the state playoff semifinals.

Baugh attended the University of Oregon, where he ran on the Duck track team from 1974-76.

He had a successful career with Weyerhaeuser and in 1999 started his own consulting business.

In 2015, Baugh was awarded the City of Portland's 30th Annual Spirit of Portland Mayor's Award.

Nancy Lovvold (1974) — Lovvold follows in her father's athletic footsteps — Howard Lovvold (Class of 1946) was inducted into the AHS Hall of Fame in 2001.

Nancy participated in volleyball, basketball and softball at AHS. She was a three-year varsity player in volleyball and basketball, earning team MVP honors in volleyball.

In 1972-73, she led the basketball team in scoring (13.5 points per game), and had 31 steals in 13 games, helping Astoria to a 12-1 record.

Lovvold earned an academic scholarship to Stanford, and was one of two freshmen to walk-on and make the varsity women's basketball team, where she started at point guard all four years. She served as Stanford's co-captain her senior year.

Nancy's daughter, Christina, was recently inducted into her high schools' Hall of Fame.

James Monroe (1987) — As a wrestler at AHS, Monroe placed second at districts and fourth at state as a junior in the heavyweight division. He was 24-3 as a senior, and won the district heavyweight title and placed third at state.

He played football all four years, as a linebacker and running back for the Fishermen. He was the Cowapa League's Defensive Player of the Year as a senior.

Monroe had a successful military career with the U.S. Army after high school. He was awarded the Bronze Star from Operation Enduring Freedom in Iraq, 2004-06.

Jeff Chan (1988) — Chan played varsity golf all four years at AHS, participating in the state tournament every year. He was a three-time District All-Star and three-time Cowapa All-Star.

During his four years, the Fishermen never lost a Cowapa match, and placed in the top five team finishes at state all four years.

Chan won the Cowapa League Scholar Athlete Achievement Award after his senior year, for his achievements in the classroom (3.67 GPA) and on the course.

Lou Marconeri (Contributor) — For over 40 years, Marconeri has contributed to athletics in the Astoria area, coaching athletes of all ages. He served on the Astoria Parks and Recreation Advisory Board from 1984 to 2007. During his 24 years on the board, Marconeri never missed a meeting. Upon leaving, Mayor Willis Van Dusen said, "Lou was a true gentleman and an asset to the community. Astoria is a better place because of you."

Marconeri has also contributed to Astoria High School for over 40 years. Since the 1970's he has been the "Voice of the Fishermen," as the public address announcer for basketball games.

He has been a major contributor to the Astoria softball community, coaching at the youth, high school and adult levels for more than 30 years. He has coached with Astoria softball since 2003, serving as head coach from 2009-

1982 Girls Track — The 1982 Astoria girls track team faced the daunting task of replacing half the points lost to graduation from the 1981 state championship team.

Their season would be defined by their two record-setting relay teams.

In the season-opening Cowapa League Relays, Astoria set a new meet record for the 400 meter relay of 52.3 seconds, despite a rain storm. Brenda Orand, Sue Glackin, Seine Chiang and Lee Boyd added a new meet record of 1:57 in the 800-meter relay.

Despite having only 12 girls on the entire team, Astoria won six of eight league meets during the season.

At the Cascade Meet of Champions, the 400 relay won in 49.8 seconds to break the school record, and unofficially broke the state record they had set the previous year.

At the District Championships, Astoria's 400 foursome of Carla Bailey, Orand, Glackin and Boyd won in 49.8 to tie the school record. Other school records set in 1982 included the 1,600-meter relay (4:13.2); Chiang in the long jump (17 feet, 1 inch); Boyd in the 100 meters (11.9); Bailey in the high hurdles (16.1); and Michele Glackin in the 800 (2:29.6) and 1,500 meters (5:00.7).

In the State Championships at Mount Hood Community College, the Fisherettes tied for second in the team standings.

During the 1981-82 seasons, the Astoria girls track teams placed first and second at state and broke a remarkable 16 school records. Three (the 100, 200 and 400 relay) still stand as of 2015.

1986 Boys Golf — Coach Miles Brendan and team members Jeff Chan, Steve Hauke, Danny Keyser, Sean Patrick and Scott Shelton were undefeated in Cowapa League play, and earned their way back to the State AA-A Tournament after a fifth-place finish in 1985.

Astoria finished third in 1986. Out of the 65 golfers competing, Patrick earned All-State honors with a fifth place finish.

Honoring the Famers

The induction ceremonies take place 1 p.m. Saturday, Jan. 30, at the Astoria Elks Club, 453 11th Street in the third floor Ballroom.

Doors open at noon. Tickets to the event are \$15 and should be purchased in advance at Astoria High School, no later than 3 p.m., Wednesday. There will be a limited number of tickets available the day of the event at the door. Advanced purchases by the deadline date is the only means to secure a reservation.
