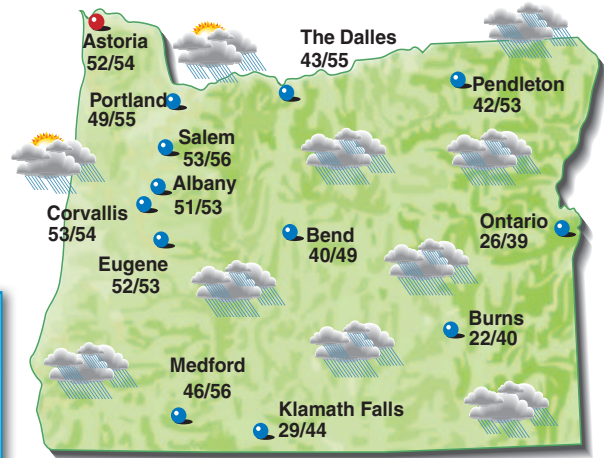

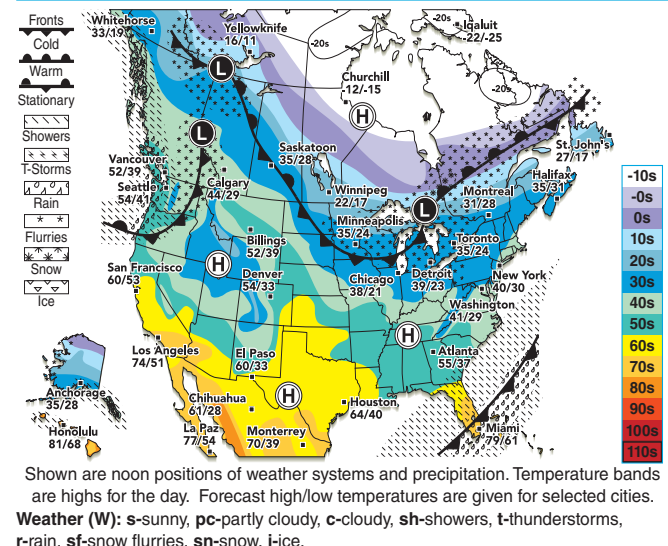

Mary Francis Wainamo-Morris, 94, passed away Jan. 1, 2016, in Colfax, Washington. She was born in Kirkland, Washington, to Agnes and Clarence Jewell on April 22, 1921. She was raised in Kirkland, Washington, and graduated from Lake Washington High School. She moved to Deep River, Washington, with her children and husband, Arne, in 1949.

Her later years were spent in Astoria, Oregon, until she moved to Colfax, Washington, in 2005 to live with her loving daughter, Anne Scott. Mary was a talented and capable "jack of all trades" person. She trained and became a nurse's aide, camp cook for early Washington Department of Natural Resources firefighting crews, fire lookout, radar technician — alias "scope dope" — at Naselle Radar Ridge, clerk at Appeloe's in Grays River and "fish lady" at Ocean Foods seafood market, where she retired.

Always a lover of animals, she was never without her cats and dogs, which she always spoiled. She was known far and wide for her excellent cooking ability, especially her cakes, fruitcakes, cookies and pies. She took great pleasure and pride in instilling those same abilities in her children and grandchildren as they grew up.

A dedicated wife, mother and friend, Mary was loved by her family and friends; many of whom

knew her as "Auntie Mame," a character Rosalind Russell played in a movie by that same name. She was one who could be counted on in time of need to lend a helping hand or word of encouragement.

She was an avid traveler to places here in the lower 48 as well as Alaska, Hawaii, Mexico and the Caribbean. However, her favorite travel trips were to Europe, the United Kingdom and to her all-time favorite, Jerusalem in Israel.

Mary was preceded in death by her parents, Clarence and Agnes Jewell; sisters, Edna Palmer, Ethel Jovag and Edith Osborn; brothers, Raymond and Elwood Jewell; husbands, Alfred Nyberg (father of Allen Paul Wainamo and Anne Kristine Scott), Arne Wainamo ("my Arne," the love of her life, and "daddy" to Allen and Anne), and Larry Morris (her traveling and retirement partner).

She is survived by a sister, Helen Schumacher; a son, Allen Wainamo (Ellie); a daughter, Anne Scott; two granddaughters, Ann Skud (Eric) and Shama Albright (Gregory); a grandson, Paul Wainamo (Heather); her great-grandchildren, Bailey, Tyler and Claire Albright and Jamin and Mia Wainamo; and numerous cousins, nieces and nephews.

Gerald (Jerry) Ray Westerholm, 75, of Gearhart, passed away suddenly on Jan. 21.

He is survived by his devoted wife of 53 years, Charlotte (Workman); daughter Kirsten and son-in-law, Keith Richards, of Bellevue, Washington; son Bill and daughter-in-law, Jeannine Westerholm, of Gearhart Oregon; and five grandchildren: Whitney, Payton and Jordan Westerholm, and Claire and Eva Richards. He is also survived by his brothers Jon (Ina) and Jay (Connie) Westerholm, of Brownsmead, Oregon; brother-in-law Richard (Sally) Workman and sister-in-law Margie Keyser; and many nieces and nephews.

Jerry was born in Astoria on Nov. 25, 1940, to William and Mable (Barendse) Westerholm. He grew up in Brownsmead, where he developed his love for the outdoors, especially fishing on the Columbia River, and farming and hunting, all of which he enjoyed with his brothers and cousins.

He graduated from Knappa High School in 1959, where he was student body president and excelled at football, basketball, baseball and track. He earned a bachelor of science degree from Pacific University in 1964, where he was a three-sport athlete.

He began his career as a history teacher and coach at Seaside High School in 1964, and was

hired as athletic director in 1969. He developed the Seagulls' athletic program, and took pride in watching his student athletes learn the value of competition while also learning life skills. He was

honored with state and regional athletic director awards, and was a finalist for national athletic director of the year in 1995. He was a consistent presence in the stands and sidelines for the past 50 years, rooting on local athletes, including his children and later his grandkids.

He pursued numerous outdoor passions during his adult life with his tight-knit group of friends and family. He was a gillnetter on the Columbia River and Cook Inlet, Alaska, and dory fished in the Pacific Ocean. He spent weekends on the hunt for coastal elk and blacktail deer, plus countless hours in duck blinds with his son. He was a Gearhart volunteer fireman for 25 years. Jerry was an expert in Clatsop County history, and was always ready to share a story over coffee.

There will be a memorial service on Saturday, Feb. 6, at 2 p.m. at the Seaside High School gymnasium.

Salmon, the first formal Jewish organization in Astoria since 1960.

Ann's passions included gardening, integrative health, fitness, knitting, music, singing, Jewish culture, art and community building. To her friends and family, she will be remembered as a vibrant, fiercely intelligent, and giving woman. The legacy of her contribution to our community is profound and her loss is felt by many.

A traditional Jewish funeral service will be held at the Performing Arts Center in Astoria on 16th and Franklin, on Thursday, Jan. 28, at noon. All family and friends are invited.

A reception will be held immediately following the funeral at the Fort George

Lovell Showroom on Duane and 16th streets. The family invites you to share stories and music to cherish her memory. To honor Ann's favorite type of gathering, potluck is encouraged, enhanced by food from Fulio's and Fort George Brewery and Public House.
