**James Roger Gaebel
Hammond
Sept. 13, 1944 — Feb. 7, 2016**

Former Warrenton Police Officer James (Jim) Gaebel died unexpectedly of brain cancer Sunday, Feb. 7, 2016, at Hopewell Hospice Home in Portland. He was 71.

Gaebel spent three decades with the Portland Police Department before relocating to Warrenton in 1997, where he served on the force for 10 years. He retired in 2007.

"Jim was a great guy. A cop's cop," former Warrenton Police Chief Bob Maxfield said. "I enjoyed his steady hand at all things that were thrown at him. He enjoyed his chosen career immensely with the variety of calls, from chasing down a thief to corralling bulls. His experience from Portland PD came in very useful for Warrenton, for which I was grateful ... All who knew him will miss him."

He was given a number of commendations and awards, including a Distinguished Service Medal in 1989 for his work establishing the metal theft recovery detail. The detail identified more than 400 individuals who were making a living stealing and selling nonferrous metal, and resulted in the arrest of hundreds of criminals and the recovery of more than \$2.5 million in stolen metals.

He was passionate about police work, family members said.

"He was known as a pretty stern-faced person, but Jim was able to let his guard down with his great-granddaughters," said Lylla Gaebel, his wife of 38 years.

For many years, Gaebel worked in his off time as a gunsmith. His favorite pastimes were watching car races and traveling with his wife in their fifth-wheeler looking for sunshine.

James Roger Gaebel was born in Portland in 1944 to Fred and Janet Gaebel.

He is survived by his wife, Lylla, of Hammond; his daughter, Tamara Mersereau of Milwaukie; three sons, Steve of Milwaukie, Michael of Woodland, Washington, and Mark of Vancouver, Washington; a sister, Diane Davidson and her husband, Wendell, of Portland; a brother, Richard and his wife, Connie, of North Plains; granddaughters Kailee Troup, Rachel Wingenbach, Rachel Gaebel, Hannah Gaebel, Samantha Gaebel and Shelby Gaebel; and grandsons Hayden Gaebel and Noel Gaebel.

Beverly was active in each community and always made lifelong friends. She was a lifelong member of the Episcopal Church. She served on the Vestry And Women's Guild. Beverly was awarded Sweet Home Woman of the Year for 1973 by BPW. In Sweet Home, she was an assistant reading instructor helping children who had difficulty reading. Beverly worked for the Hood River School District 16 years as an assistant special education instructor, retiring in 1994.

Bev loved helping young children with special needs. She started at May Street Elementary, then moved to Mid Valley in Odell and completed her career there. Beverly always had that soft spot in her heart for special needs children. She was caring and compassionate,

firm but fair in all that she did. Beverly and Roy enjoyed camping with their camper pickup and friends, traveling around the Northwest and Canada.

After retiring, Beverly and Roy became involved in taking History America tours that covered Native American culture and history. One of the most memorable was following the Nez Perce Trail to the Bears Paw in Montana. Elder Hostel trips were on the agenda during those years, also.

Beverly was a member of the Hood River Chapter of PEO Sisterhood. She was a 42-year member, joining the Sweet Home chapter in 1974.

Beverly loved gardening, and you could often find her working in her flower beds. She also loved feeding the backyard birds and watching the nuthatches, chickadees, woodpeckers, quail and towhees. Many a time you could hear Bev talking to chickadees and nuthatches, and they would respond.

Her family was the most important thing in her life. She loved them dearly.

Bev and Roy were soulmates. They both believed their journey on earth was meant to be. They were together in the spirit world before, and they will continue their journey together in the next heavenly life.

The family wishes to thank the Providence Hospice of the Gorge staff for their support and kindness. They are a wonderful group of dedicated folks. Also, the staff at Brookside, who were like family and Beverly loved them all. They are so compassionate, and the family thanks them with their deepest appreciation.

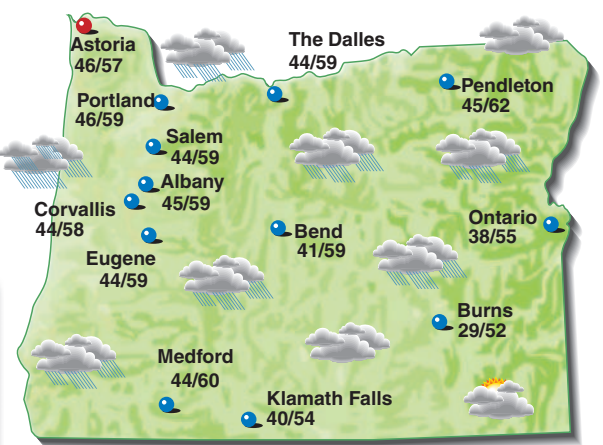

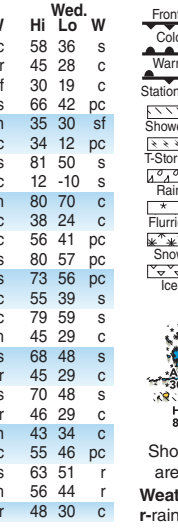
Under the Sky
