Schools seek outside help on substance abuse, suicide

The Astoria School District, which administrators say is experiencing an increase of students reporting self-harming behaviors and having suicidal thoughts, is working with Clatsop Behavioral Healthcare to bring in outside help.

Lines for Life, a nonprofit focused on preventing substance abuse and suicide, will visit classes at Astoria Middle School Monday, Tuesday

and Wednesday to talk with students about how to make healthy choices.

Linda Berger, the principal of the middle school, said she sees the increase in reports as somewhat of a positive, meaning students are reaching out for help. She said the increase might be related to the assignment of counselors from Clatsop Behavioral Healthcare on campus.

There will also be educational sessions for parents from 6:30 to 8 p.m. Mon-

day, Tuesday and Wednesday at the middle school, 1100 Klaskanine Ave., to learn about community support. There will be a panel available for questions, and child care.

Call Clatsop Behavioral Healthcare at 503-325-4331 to arrange an emergency screening if a child is suicidal or harming themselves, or request a screening at a hospital emergency room. Lines For Life's crisis line is 800-273-8255.

Ever an outdoor enthusiast, Carol adored hiking, tennis, camping, bicycling, swimming, gardening and snow sports. She was especially fond of trekking through the Cascade and Blue

mountains and swimming in rivers and oceans around the globe. Through the years, Carol also enjoyed volunteering, playing her flute and guitar, reading, working crossword puzzles, dance, writing, adventure and travel.

One hundred percent Finnish, Carol remained influenced by her heritage and relished baking Finnish delicacies. She also delighted in sharing some of the Finnish values, language and customs with her cherished grandson, Nicholas.

A liberal Democrat, Carol believed in equal rights, civil liberties, protecting the environment, affordable health care and higher education and supporting the underprivileged. She was influenced by many heroes in her

life, mainly her natal family members. She utilized ideas and practices from her Buddhist and shamanistic studies and embraced compassion, forgiveness and redemption. Carol, who loved provoking and receiving laughter, retained her quick wit and ready smile till the end.

Carol is survived by her husband, Carlos; parents, Elma and Joe; son, Ryan; grandson, Nicholas; siblings, Jo Anne, Nancy, Grant and Susan; as well as numerous nieces, nephews and dear friends and colleagues.

The family is conducting a private celebration of her life today.

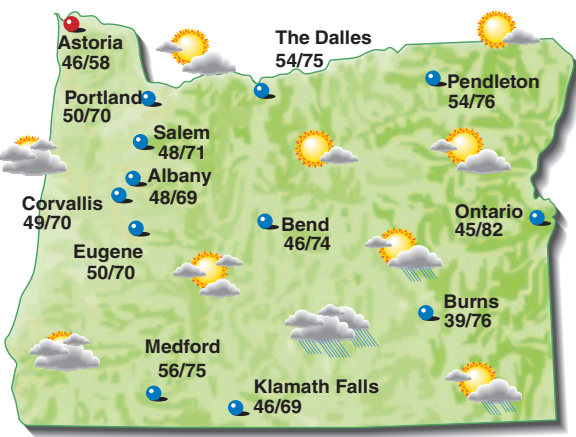

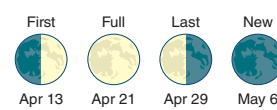

Tonight's Sky: Very low on the western horizon, the young crescent moon will be near Mercury.

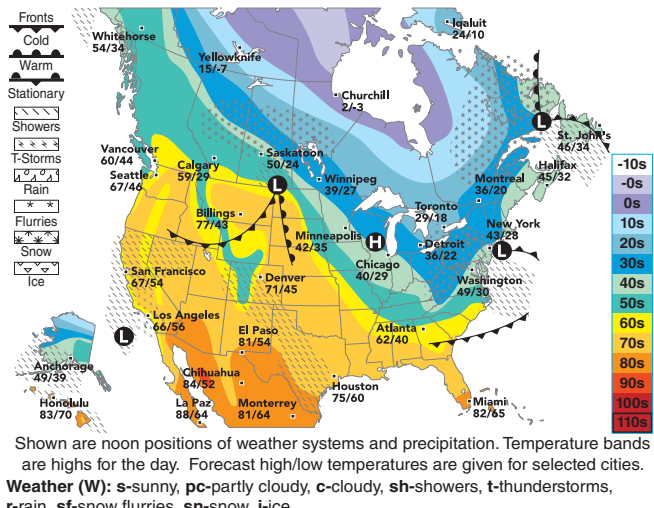
