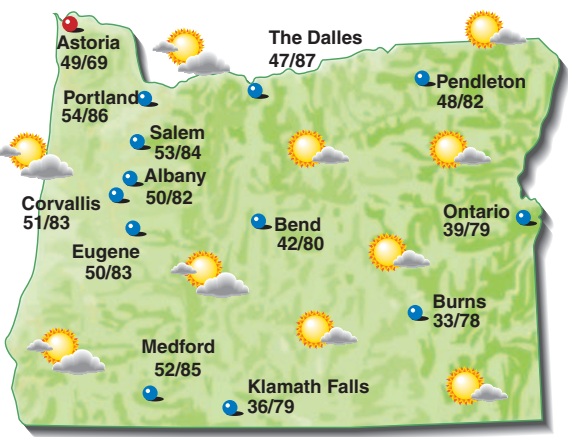

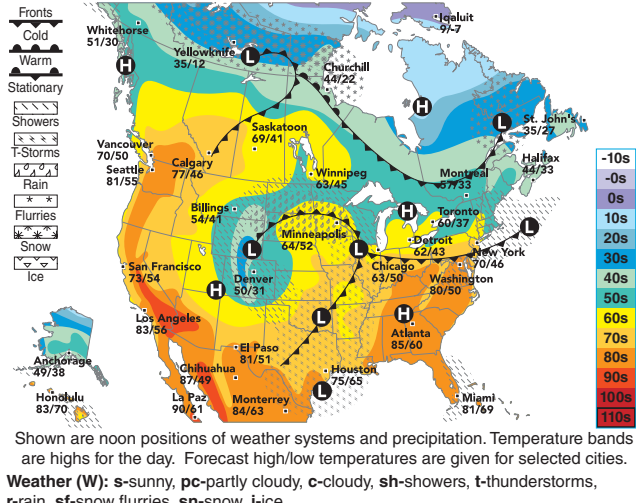

Coast Guard rescues three fishermen near Grays Harbor

GRAYS HARBOR, Wash. — A U.S. Coast Guard boat rescued three fishermen after their fishing vessel Privateer sank less than 1 mile outside of Grays Harbor Friday.

A 47-foot motor lifeboat crew from Station Grays Harbor transported the fishermen to shore, where emergency medical responders evaluated one of them for a reported heart condition.

The crew of the 74-foot fishing vessel called Station Grays Harbor stating they were taking on water through an 8- to 12-inch hole, deploying their life raft, donning immersion suits and preparing to abandon ship.

After arriving on scene, the motor lifeboat attempted to dewater the boat but had to pull the three fishermen off the sinking vessel. The cause of the sinking is unknown.

"It was clear the fishing crew had conducted drills and were prepared for an emergency," Petty Officer 2nd Class

Jacob Hylkema, coxswain of the motor lifeboat, said in a statement. "They had marine VHF radios, a life raft and immersion suits. It was a terrifying situation, but their actions proved they were ready."

The fishing vessel drifted north and ran aground about 100 yards from the beach near Ocean Shores, Washington. It had no catch on board and up to 6,000 gallons of fuel.

Pollution responders at Incident Management Division in Astoria opened the Oil Spill Liability Trust Fund to begin a

cleanup assessment. The Coast Guard and state officials from Oregon and Washington state assessed the wreckage at low tide Saturday, but salvage efforts have been impeded by the shallow water.

"Our first priority is to get cleanup operations going as fast as possible to prevent environmental impact," said Chief Petty Officer Bradley Bennett, the coordinator for the cleanup.

"Until that's done, we ask everybody in the area to stay clear of the wreckage and any possible pollution that might surface."

Body of missing fisherman recovered

A fisherman on Saturday discovered the body of Charles Kelly, a fisherman who went missing earlier this month on the Youngs River.

The fisherman discovered the body of Kelly, 52, floating

in the river about a half mile downstream from its confluence with the Klaskanine River. The Clatsop County Sheriff's Office then recovered the body.

Kelly, also known as Charles Hankel, was last seen fishing on Youngs River on April 5. According to the Sher-

iff's Office, the person who reported Kelly missing saw him fishing, left and returned a short while later to see his boat circling at full throttle with nobody on board.

Kelly's death was ruled accidental. An autopsy will be conducted Tuesday.

Coast Guard air crew hoists injured kayaker

COOK, Wash. — The crew of a U.S. Coast Guard Jayhawk helicopter medevaced a German national injured Saturday after he plunged in a kayak 80 feet down Spirit Falls on the Little White Salmon River in Skamania County, Washington.

The helicopter, from Air Station Astoria, hoisted the 24-year-old approximately 180 feet and transported him to Oregon Health and Science University in Portland with reported

symptoms of a broken back.

Watchstanders at Sector Columbia River received the call from local emergency responders through the Air Force Joint Rescue Coordination Center requesting helicopter support to evacuate the man because the terrain was too steep for ground transport. The White Salmon River is a tributary flowing south into the Columbia River gorge.

Once on scene, the air crew lowered Petty Officer 2nd Class Aaron Eckstein and Petty Offi-

cer 3rd Class Jordan Gilbert, both aviation survival technicians, who transferred the man from local responders to Coast Guard rescue equipment to complete the hoist.

"The terrain and the waters where this rescue took place were extremely treacherous," Eckstein said in a statement. "It was one of the most dynamic hoists I've ever done, but the efforts of local agencies and our crew allowed us to safely retrieve the kayaker and ensure he got to proper medical care."
