# Astoria Police hosts 'Coffee with a Cop'

The Astoria Police Department is inviting community members to meet with officers this month to discuss local issues, build relationships and drink coffee.

The "Coffee with a Cop" program will take place at 10 a.m. May 25 at Astoria Coffee Bar in Towler Hall at Clatsop Community College.

The program provides a unique opportunity for community members to ask questions and learn more about

the department's work in neighborhoods, according to police.

The majority of contacts law enforcement has with the public happen during emergencies, or emotional situations. Those situations are not always the most effective times for relationship building with the community, police say, and some community members may feel that officers are unapproachable on the street.

"Coffee with a Cop" breaks down barriers and

allows for a relaxed, one-on-one interaction.

"We hope that community members will feel comfortable to ask questions, bring concerns, or simply get to know our officers," Chief Brad Johnston said. "These interactions are the foundation of community partnerships."

The program is a national initiative supported by The United States Department of Justice, Office of Community Oriented Policing Services.

# Astoria Sports Complex gets brownfield award

The Astoria Sports Complex has won a brownfield award from the Oregon Brownfields Awards Program.

The award honors groups that have implemented innovative, practical reme-

diation projects on brownfield sites and addressed a community development need.

The city of Astoria, Astoria School District, Columbia Memorial Hospital and Recology Western Oregon partnered to build a sports complex on a former landfill

on Williamsport Road. The hospital largely financed the complex, in exchange for land on the former John Warren Field next to its main campus.

In September, the project won the Environmental Protection Agency's Phoenix Award.
