Local lawyer tapped as commencement speaker

Tatjana Queener, a Clatsop Community College alumnus and local lawyer, will be the college's commencement speaker to graduates June 10 at the Liberty Theater.

"Tatjana understands the important role that community colleges play in our communities, state and nation," says Gerald Hamilton, interim president of the college.

Queener has faced discrimination in both Russia for her family's German heritage, and later in Germany for their Russian background.

She moved to Naselle, Washington, as an exchange student, attended college in Astoria and was selected to the 2004 All-USA Community College Academic Team as one of the top 20 community college students in the U.S. She finished her undergraduate studies and law school at Willamette University.

Queener started work in Tillamook County during her last year of law school as a clerk in the district attorney's office. She stayed in the county, predominantly representing indigent criminal defendants. In 2011, she started a solo practice, continuing her work in criminal, juvenile, civil and administrative cases.

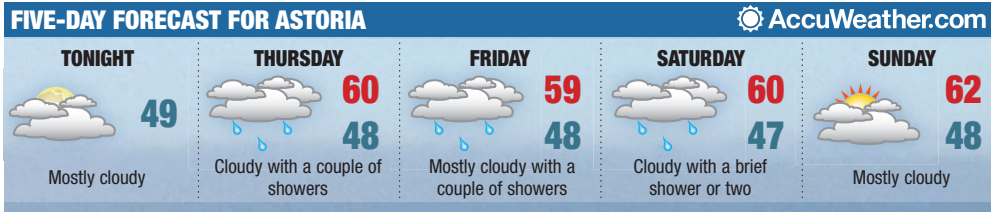

The college will award certificates and degrees to over 160 students, including 127 two-year degrees and 54 one-year certificates.



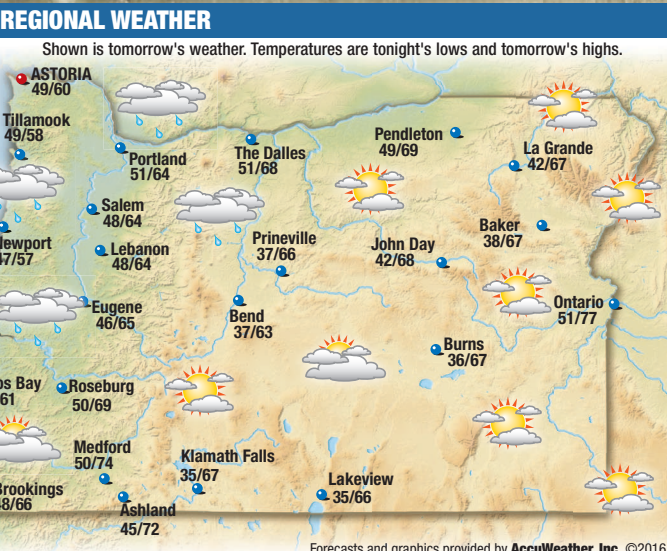

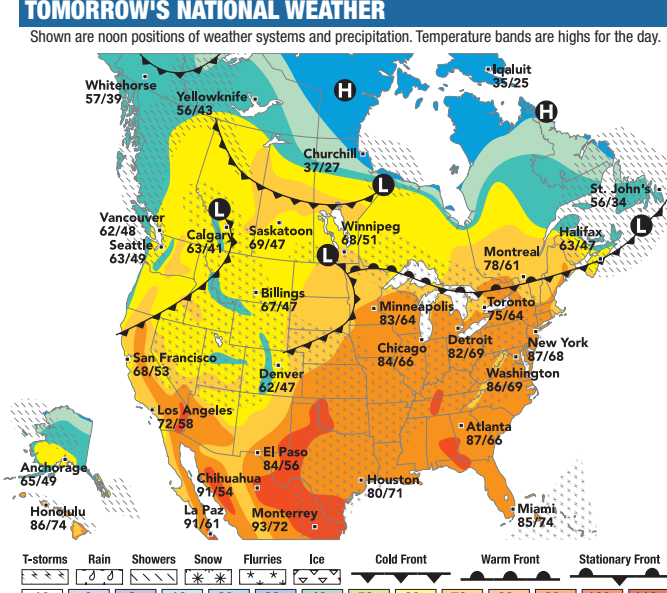
Tonight's Sky: The waning gibbous moon will be near Mars and Saturn.

Summer William (Bill) Ostrom

Bill was born on Feb. 4, 1919, to Master Sgt. Sumner and Lola Ostrom at Fort Columbia, Washington. Master Sgt. Ostrom was in charge of Search Lights at the mouth of the Columbia River.

After the war, the family moved to Milwaukie, Oregon, where Bill graduated from Milwaukie High School in 1936. He then attended Oregon State College, married his high school sweetheart and joined the Army Air Corps.

He always loved adventure, the Oregon Coast, fishing, clamming, bowling, boating, RVing, and Jinx (Norma), to whom he was married for 68 years until her death in 2010.

Bill managed the Lower Columbia Bowl in Astoria, Oregon, before starting the Trophy Case in Warrenton, Oregon.

After retiring, Bill and Jinx moved to Florence, Oregon, where they enjoyed life and many friends. Their second retirement found them again in Warrenton, Oregon, and Neawanna By The Sea, where Bill remained until his death.

Bill was a giver. If there was a need, he wrote a check. His many friends remember a man who always gave a smile, a kind word and had a humorous story to tell. He loved a good discussion.

Bill is survived by his two daughters, Nancy Hopp of Gearhart, Oregon, and Patricia Beyer of Milwaukie, Oregon; and six grandchildren and 13 great-grandchildren.

A family memorial celebration will be held July 4, 2016, at the mouth of the Columbia River.

New photojournalist ready to capture the community

Miller turns his lens on the North Coast

The Daily Astorian has found its new photographer.

Danny Miller, 23, stepped into the position Monday, taking over from Joshua Bessex, who took a job with the News Tribune Co. in Tacoma, Washington.

Born and raised in Phoenix, Arizona, Miller graduated in June from Western Washington University. Though he began his college career not knowing what he wanted to do professionally, he found himself taking journalism classes, including a class in photojournalism, and "just fell in love with it."

"I'm really fascinated with journalism in general — exploring personalities and new experiences and people's stories," he said. "Journalism offered me an outlet to kind of step outside my comfort zone to a certain extent, and push me to experience things I wouldn't necessarily do in any other career."

While a student, Miller interned at two newspapers, the Bellingham Herald and the Skagit Valley Herald, and at his university's athletic department. After graduation, he interned at the Flint Journal in Flint, Michigan — where he briefly covered the city's water crisis — then moved to Arizona for an intern-

ship at The Arizona Republic.

"Danny immediately impressed us with his portfolio and personality," Laura Sellers, managing editor of The Daily Astorian, said. "His former editors spoke glowingly of his work, and we're glad he is joining our newsroom."

Miller, who has family in Oregon, is excited to return to the Pacific Northwest, the region where photojournalism first spoke to him.

"Jumping around so much throughout all these internships over the last four years has been really cool life experience," he said, "but I'm really ready to settle down in a community and ... build a body of work that reflects that community."
