

'Tall Cop Says Stop' awareness talk comes to Astoria

Former police officer offers sound advice

When it comes to figuring out if a child is involved in the drug culture, Jermaine Galloway says look beyond the obvious.

Galloway, a former police officer in Boise, Idaho,

brought his Tall Cop Says Stop drug and alcohol awareness program to Astoria Wednesday.

"Your drug users do not look a certain way, they do not act a certain way," Galloway told an audience at Clatsop Community College.

He told people to look for the red flags of drug culture — Rastafarian-themed cloth-

ing, tie-dye, references to marijuana-smoking holiday 420, hash oil slang 710 — but to avoid immediate assumptions and instead ask questions about the meaning of clothing and other possible drug identifiers. "Half the time they'll just tell you,"

he said. Galloway described an ever-evolving drug market,

with narcotics laced with any number of substances, consumed in every imaginable way and concocted into synthetics that can prove deadly after a single use.

"We're seeing more potency, more potency, more potency," he said, pointing to the development of marijuana buds into exponentially more potent oils, hashes and waxes.

Synthetic additives like the cough suppressant Dextromethorphan, the opiate fentanyl and psychedelic NBOMe are

further increasing the danger.

People need to look beyond the cliches of drug users, he said, and realize that anyone can fall prey to addiction. Galloway cautioned against telling kids too many specifics, lest they get new ideas on how to abuse substances. But he urged parents to stay educated about current trends in the drug culture, form groups, share information and communicate with children about what they're seeing.

"Nobody is going to raise

your kids for you," he said.

The event was organized by North Coast Prevention Works, a Clatsop County coalition focused on preventing youth drug and alcohol abuse.

The event was funded through a grant from community wellness program Way to Wellville. It was also sponsored by Jordan's Hope for Recovery, a nonprofit recently set up by former Astoria High School secretary Kerry Strickland, whose son died of a heroin overdose.

Garibaldi man arrested after road rage incident

A Garibaldi man was arrested Tuesday evening after allegedly pointing a gun at two men in a utility truck during a road rage incident.

Jacob Allen Olson, 34, was arrested for menacing and unlawful use of a weapon. A rifle was recovered from his vehicle.

The incident began in Warrenton. The complainants alleged the sus-

pect pulled out in front of them, making obscene gestures. Olson alleged he was being followed by the complainants.

The incident came to an end on Industry Street near Hamburg Avenue in Astoria, when Olson allegedly pointed a firearm at one of the complainants.

"It's unfortunate that this situation progressed to this point," Astoria Deputy Police Chief Eric Halverson said in a

statement. "There are a lot of things that both parties could have done to prevent things from ending up this way.

Halverson advised drivers to be patient, stop following a vehicle if they believe there is a problem, pull over and let a tailgating driver pass, and call 911 if they believe a road rage incident is occurring.

"We're grateful that this situation didn't end up in tragedy," he said.

Cannon Beach Academy interim director steps down

CANNON BEACH — Ryan Hull resigned as interim director of the Cannon Beach Academy to focus on his family business, according to a statement from the school.

Hull is the owner and operator of Dreams and Discoveries in Cannon Beach.

"We appreciate the amount of work Ryan has done for our organization and wish him well on his future endeavors," the academy stated.

Board president Kellye Dewey said the academy will begin the process of hiring a school director after its charter is approved by the Seaside School District.

In March, the school district withdrew its conditional approval for Cannon Beach Academy to open this fall. After a now-canceled appeal to the

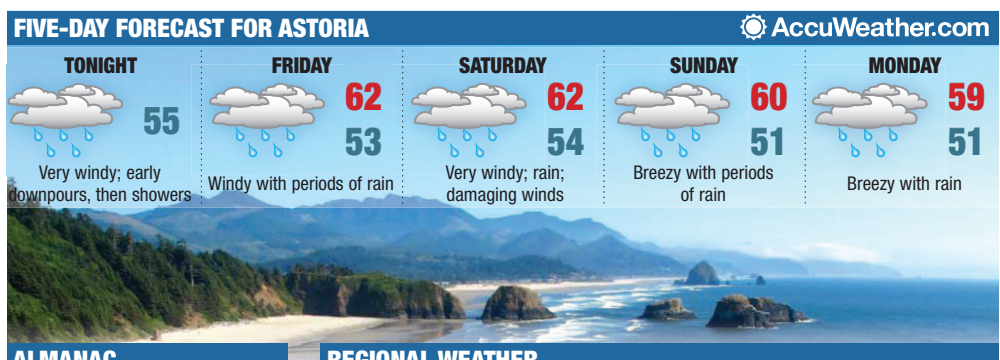

state, the charter school's board members are preparing for next fall by working with the district and maintaining local support.

Hull has been involved with Cannon Beach Academy since May 2013 as a committee member, board member, board president and interim executive director. Working with the organization was "rewarding and also an extraordinary commitment," he wrote in a letter to the board.

"It is now time for me to focus on the reason my family came to Cannon Beach and that is our family business," Hull wrote. "Thank you for the opportunity to work together to achieve the goal of a public charter school in Cannon Beach. You have the determination and desire to see this school to the finish line. I look forward to seeing Cougar pride once again in Cannon Beach when the school opens in the fall of 2017."

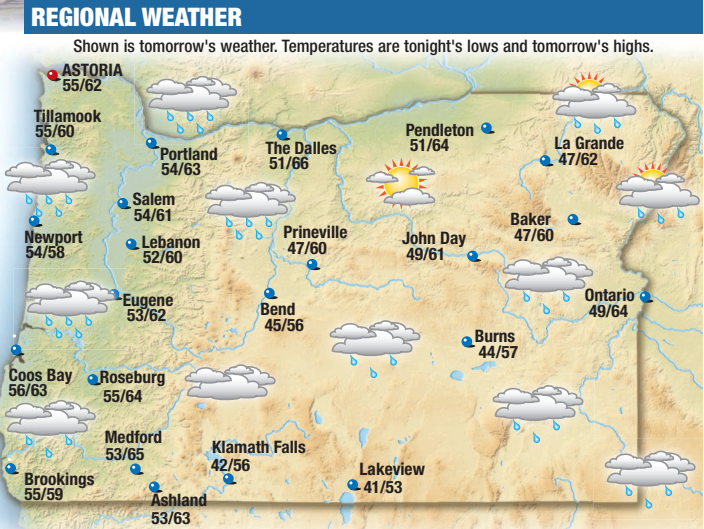

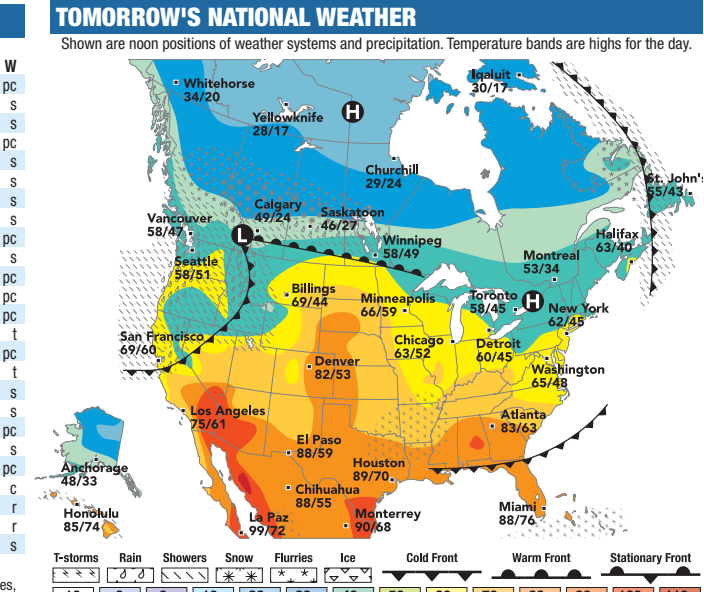
