After high school, she went to work for Pacific Northwest Bell as operator.

In 1946, Beverly and Duane decided they were made for each other and married on Dec. 7. In the following years they raised four children. Beverly was always busy. If not hauling kids to sports, dances and sleepovers she would be giving blood at the grade school or volunteering at the Junior League of Portland. The Autzen house at 17th and Myrtle was always active with the kids from the neighborhood. Everyone was welcome. Even more so in the winter when it would snow (sledding on 17th).

Beverly and Duane retired and moved to Gearhart in 1988 where they enjoyed golf, fishing and clamming. In 2001, Beverly lost the love of her life after 55 years of marriage. For

the past 15 years, Beverly was very independent, living alone almost to the day she died. She liked to watch golf, needlepoint and loved to cook. Although battling leukemia for over 10 years, she never once complained about anything, and was always positive. She was so brave. Even though she had many health issues,

Beverly just like always, caring more about family, friends and neighbors than herself.

As an angel on earth, now she flies with the angels in heaven. Goodbye, Mom. We love you.

Beverly was preceded in death by her husband, Duane; her brother, Maj. Gen. Jack Waggstaff; and her sister, Pat Gerving. Warming Center holds training tonight

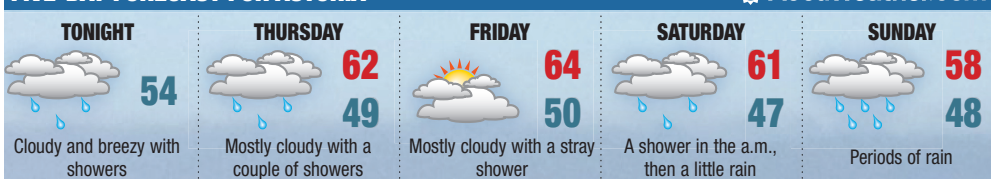

New volunteers who wish to help at the warming center are encouraged to attend if they have not volunteered before. Only one session is needed.

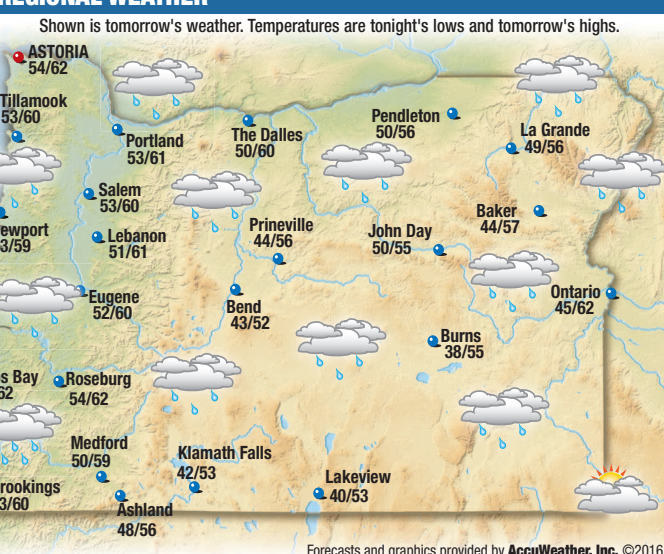
FIVE-DAY FORECAST FOR ASTORIA

Table with weather statistics for Astoria through Tuesday, including temperatures, precipitation, and sun and moon data.

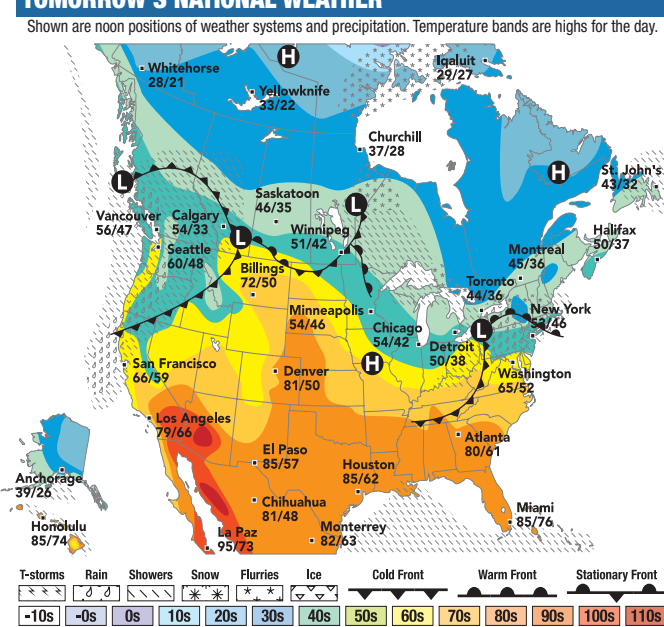

Astoria woman injured in head-on crash

A head-on crash caused by an impaired driver on the New Youngs Bay Bridge Tuesday morning left an Astoria resident in the hospital with serious injuries.

Roadside evidence and witness statements showed Billy Adams, a 36-year-old Seaside resident, was driving northbound in a 2002 Mitsubishi

when he crossed completely into the oncoming lane. He ran head-on into Astoria resident Doris Selvy, 57, who was driving a 2001 Kia Optima.

Both Adams and Selvy were taken to Columbia Memorial Hospital. Selvy sustained serious injuries and was transferred to Oregon Health & Science University, where she was listed in serious condi-

tion as of this morning. Adams had minor injuries, including a broken ankle.

While investigating, state police established probable cause and arrested Adams on charges of driving while under the influence, reckless driving and second-degree assault. Adams consented to a Breathalyzer, which showed no alcohol, but he refused to provide a blood or urine sample.

County taxpayers may have received wrong bills

More than 10,000 Clatsop County tax payers may have received the wrong property tax statements last week due to a processing error by the state agency that mails out the bills.

The error only affects property owners who normally receive two to six statements annually. Property owners

with only one property, or more than six, don't appear to have been affected, said Suzanne Johnson, assessment and taxation director for Clatsop County.

While the statements themselves contain correct information, many of them did not reach the intended property owner. Instead, various people contacted the county's Assessment and Taxation office saying they had received someone else's statements. Of the

approximately 33,000 tax bills the Oregon Department of Administrative Services' Publishing and Distribution office handles for Clatsop County, an estimated 10,150 of the bills sent out on Oct. 14 may have included the wrong statements in the envelopes, county management says.

Reprinted property tax statements should be showing up in mailboxes soon, though. The state sent out reprinted bills on Tuesday.
