In 1965 the family moved to Oregon, returning to Colorado in 1974.

Jean Rose spent her time raising children, gardening, painting, quilting, and was involved with the Star of the Sea Church and Altar Society in Oregon and St. Peter's in Fleming, Colorado.

She had an adventurous spirit. She enjoyed taking the kids on weekend outings, exploring the Northwest coastal areas. She also liked to travel, and was able to see the Canadian Rockies, Italy and Ireland.

While in Oregon, the family often made the trip to Colorado during the harvest season. On

the way, Jean made sure we took a new or scenic route, even though it may have taken twice as long. When they returned to Colorado in 1974, they made their home in the Lone Star area.

Medford man pleads guilty to threatening Obama and FBI agents

MEDFORD — The U.S. attorney for the district of Oregon says a Medford man has pleaded guilty in federal court to threatening to kill President Barack Obama, threatening to shoot FBI agents and possession of an unregistered explosive device.

The statement from the U.S. Department of Justice says

John Martin Roos, 62, pleaded guilty to the charges Monday in U.S. District Court.

Roos admitted in court to using racially inflammatory language in a Twitter post in which he threatened to kill Obama. In a Facebook post, Roos threatened to "snipe" FBI agents "with hunting rifles."

Roos was arrested last April while parking his truck in White City. The statement

says the arresting agent found a loaded semi-automatic pistol underneath the floor mat on the driver side. A search of Roos' apartment uncovered more firearms and several pipe bombs.

Roos faces up to 10 years in federal prison. Sentencing is scheduled for March 16 in Medford. Roos was ordered to remain in custody pending his sentencing.

No arrests made in Portland election protests

PORTLAND — Portland police say a protest that erupted after Donald Trump's election victory did not lead to any arrests.

Protesters took over a sec-

tion of Interstate 5 late Tuesday and early Wednesday, affecting traffic in both directions for about an hour.

Sgt. Pete Simpson says officers have not received any significant reports of vandalism. A fire in a downtown Portland

trash bin did not spread.

Simpson says the department realizes emotions are high after the election. He hopes anyone planning a large demonstration alerts the agency so officers can manage traffic.

Two men arrested after hit-and-run

Oregon State Police troopers and the Clatsop County Sheriff's Office arrested two men after a hit-and-run Tuesday near John Day County Park.

Around noon, Stephan Harris, 28, of Hillsboro, was driving a Chevy Silverado on U.S. Highway 30 when he side-swiped a Chevy Tahoe near Fern Hill Road, according to Chief Deputy Paul Williams. Harris then drove up Fern Hill Road toward Fernhill Holly Farms before he and his passenger, 33-year-old George Murray of Westport, fled on foot.

Williams said Harris was later taken into custody around 12:40 p.m. by state police troopers near Clarendon Road. He was arrested on several charges, including possession of a controlled substance for heroin and methamphetamine,

driving while under the influence of intoxicants, a misdemeanor for attempting to elude police on foot, reckless driving and failure to perform the duties of a driver in an accident with injuries.

Williams said Murray was

tracked by deputies and a K-9 unit into the brush along power lines running between Fern Hill and Clarendon roads and apprehended at 1 p.m. Murray was arrested on a parole violation from Marion County, but faced no other charges.

Charges dropped against pair who filmed pipeline protest

SEATTLE — Prosecutors have dropped charges including burglary and sabotage against two filmmakers who recorded a protest at an oil pipeline in Washington state last month.

The filmmakers, Lindsey Grayzel of Portland, and Carl Davis of Orcas Island, Wash-

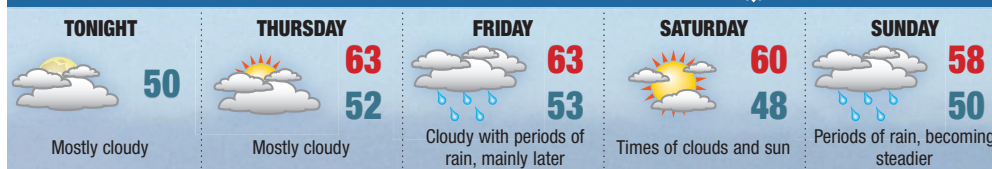
ington, say they were working on a documentary about climate activist Ken Ward on Oct. 11 when Ward broke through a fence and turned a safety valve along the Kinder Morgan Trans Mountain pipeline near Burlington. Ward also livestreamed his actions.

The three were among 11 people arrested that day amid attempts to shut down oil pipelines in Washington,

North Dakota, Minnesota and Montana in solidarity with those protesting the four-state Dakota Access pipeline project in North Dakota, said Jay O'Hara, a spokesman for the environmental activism group Climate Disobedience Center.

Charges remain against the other nine, who include two people who were recording actions in North Dakota and Minnesota.

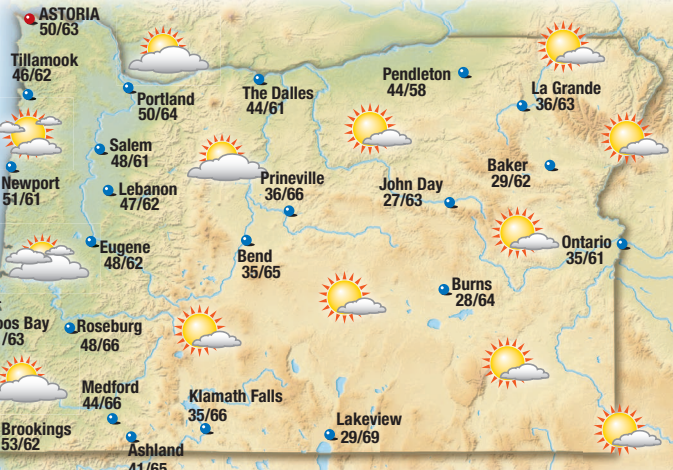

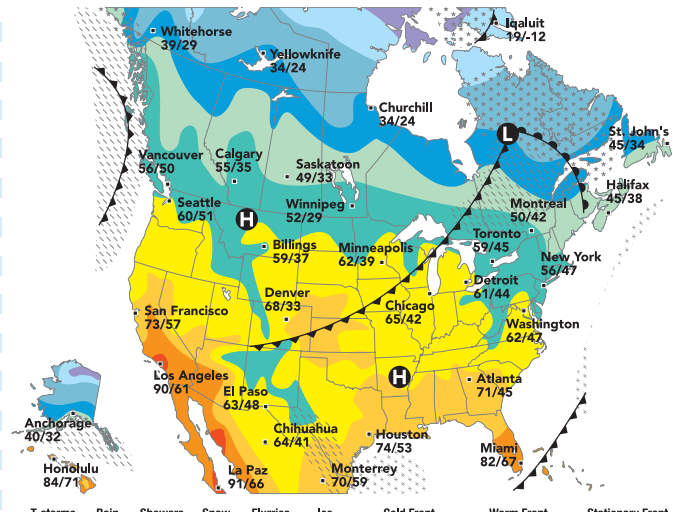
