Audrey Louise (Broce) Paetow of Walla Walla, Washington, passed away Nov. 8, 2016, at her home at the age of 96. Memorial services will be at the First United Methodist Church, 11th and Franklin, in Astoria, on Thursday, Nov. 17, 2016, at 11 a.m. Parking and access are available. Light refreshments will follow the service. Concluding services and interment will be held at 2 p.m. at Ocean View Cemetery in Warrenton.

Audrey was born Nov. 21, 1919, in La Junta, Colorado, the daughter of Jacob Harmon and Mariah Jane (Pennington) Broce. She went through school and attended Brown's Business College in La Junta.

She worked as a stenographer in civil service during World War II at La Junta Army Air Field. She came to Astoria at a friend's request in 1946, and worked at Tongue Point and later for the U.S. Maritime Commission. She married

Charles Paetow on June 20, 1948, in Astoria.

Audrey will be remembered for her love of music and for being an accomplished pianist, able to play by ear. She sang in the choir at the First United Methodist Church for many years. She was involved in the church and the Astoria Senior Center, serving in several different capacities. She liked to sew, do arts and crafts and work crossword puzzles.

Audrey was preceded in death by her husband, Charles; sister, Claudia McGee; and brother, Fred Broce. She is survived by her daughter, Carolyn Rae, and son-in-law, Bruce Mason, of Milton-Freewater, Oregon; her grandson, Nicolas Mason, his wife, Kari, and their daughter, Abigail,

of Salisbury, Maryland; her granddaughter, Marissa (Mason) Kleven, her husband, Mark, and their children, Bow and Scout, of Langley, British Columbia, Canada; her nieces, Shirley Davidson and Nancy Graves of Colorado and their families; and extended family in Colorado, Missouri and West Virginia.

Frances Marie Clark

Chinook, Washington

July 11, 1932 — Oct. 25, 2016

Frances Marie Clark was the daughter of LeRoy Jones Mulwee and Bertha Vestine Townsend Mulwee. She was born in Eureka, Montana, on July 11, 1932. She passed away in hospice care at Alder House in Astoria, Oregon, on Oct. 25, 2016, after a very brief battle with cancer.

As the youngest of nine children, her older siblings insisted that she had to have a nickname, which was Ella Jaye. Not only did the nickname stick, but all school, Sunday school and even census records while she lived in Montana carried that name. Some of her brothers and sisters never called her anything else.

In 1944, her mother and two sisters moved to Bremerton, where her mother babysat for a friend working in the shipyards. She attended school from 6 a.m. to noon, as Bremerton did two shifts of school until the war ended. In 1945, she and her mother returned to Montana.

The two sisters had met sailors and gotten married. Since she was now the only child at home, her father decided to take a job in Washington ... or Oregon ... they weren't sure. Her dad went to get train tickets and explained that he wasn't sure of the name of the town, but it started with a C or a K. The clerk read him the list of the stops that started with a C or a K. He decided that Camas was the right town. When they arrived in Camas, there was no job, and also no money to get another train ticket. The job was in Klamath Falls, Oregon.

Frances attended Camas Junior High for seventh grade and finished school in Washougal, graduating in 1950. She was a Song Queen, leading cheer songs in her senior year. She dreamed of a leisurely summer after graduating, but it was short-lived.

The president of the Pendleton Woolen Mills had come to the high school to ask the typing/shorthand teacher about her top student. When she recommended Frances and

she was offered the job, it was an opportunity that she couldn't turn down. She was able to buy a 1953 Ford convertible, which she loaned to her boyfriend one day when it was snowing. A few hours later, her best friend called to say that she had just seen the convertible with the boyfriend (Les Clark) and his buddy throwing snowballs with the top down. She eventually forgave the boyfriend, and married him, and became a homemaker.

In 1966, the young family with four children moved from Washougal to Chinook. In addition to being a full-time mom, Frances was the secretary and bookkeeper for the fishing business. She was also the secretary for Northwest Gillnetters. She attended most of the meetings to set fishing seasons for all the time that they were married, and was very informed on fishing issues. She was a member of Salmon for All.

She is survived by her husband of 62 years, Les, at the family home; daughters Karen (Steve) Gray and Cheryl (Steve) Raistakka; sons Lee (Cynthia) Clark and Steve Clark; grandchildren Leeann, Ryan, Baylee, Jason, Jake and Chelsea; great-grandchildren Nesia Molina and Kaylee AnnMarie Gray; brother LeRoy; and brother-in-law Irv Loucks. Among her nieces are Sherry Hindman and Terri and Lynette Daugherty; among her nephews are Elmer Stacy, David Daugherty and Larry Mee. She was predeceased by sisters Jessie, Eva, Blanche, Claudia, Cleo and Winnie; brother William "Blane"; and nephew Ronnie Daugherty.

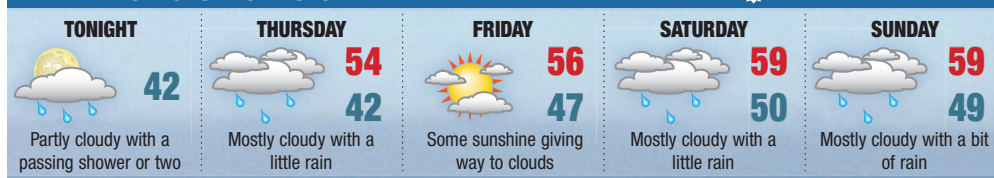
A celebration of life will be held at Chinook Lutheran Church on Saturday, Nov. 19, at 11 a.m. with a luncheon following the service.

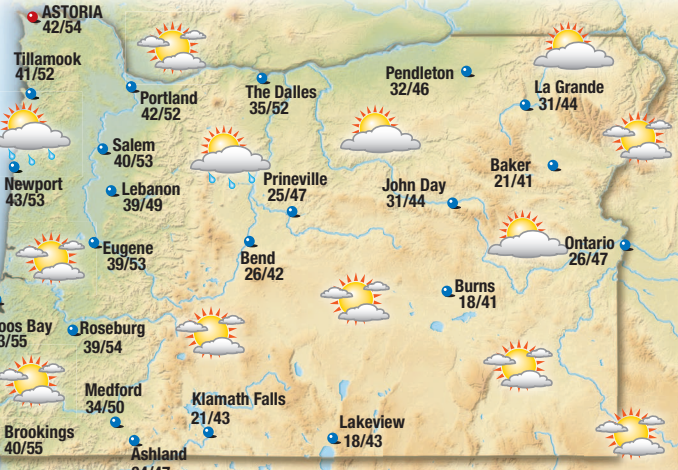

Shown is tomorrow's weather. Temperatures are tonight's lows and tomorrow's highs.

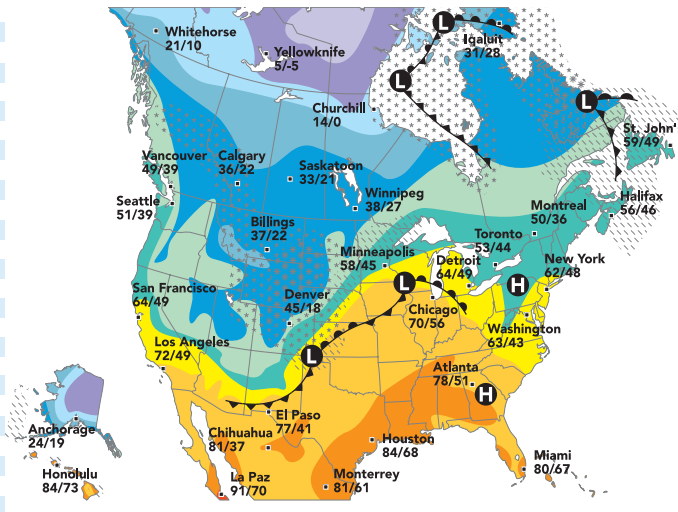
