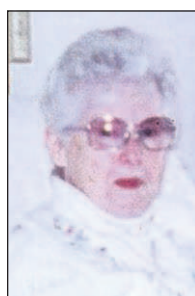
Eileen was a shy, private, very creative and talented lady, as well as an avid reader
