

The first film, "DAR HE: The Lynching of Emmett Till," will be screened at 2 p.m. Sunday, Jan. 15 at the Liberty Theatre, located at 1203 Commercial St. Tickets cost \$5.

Presented as a tribute to Martin Luther King Jr.'s birthday, the documentary "DAR HE: The Lynching

of Emmett Till" tells the true story of a hate crime that changed America. The film is crafted from the public record: a transfixing, true dramatization of the historic interviews and events surrounding the murder that became a lightning rod for moral outrage and pivotal in inspiring a generation of young people to commit to social change in the 1950s. Directed by Rob Under-

hill, the film was adapted

from the acclaimed oneman play "Dar He: The Story of Emmett Till," which was written and performed by Mike Wiley. In the play and the film, Wiley plays every character.

The second film in the Winter Film Series. a tribute to Robert Redford, who turns 80 this year, will be the 1967 film "Barefoot in the Park." The film will be screened at 2 p.m. Feb. 5 at the Liberty Theatre.
