Robert "Bob" Moore was born on Feb. 11, 1940, in Santa Ana, California, to his parents Robert and Gladys Moore. He was the younger brother of Ronald, Irene, Genevieve (Ginger) and Marie, and the older brother of William and Jerry. His family moved to Astoria when he was 3 years old.

Bob enlisted in the U.S. Army when he was 17 years old, where he earned his GED. He served six years in the Army, three of them in Germany, where he met Annamaria Klinzing, his first wife and the mother of their five children, Jerry, Rick, Peter, Trish and Theresa. Bob achieved the rank of Sergeant E5 at the very young age of 23, and received an honorable discharge in 1963. They moved to the Astoria area, where Bob worked for the city of Astoria. At one point, he was working for the city during the day, and working on construction of the Astoria Bridge at night. He saved up for his first fishing boat, and began a long career as a commercial fisherman.

In 1972 Bob met Kathryn "Misty" Young, his present wife and the mother of their three children, Uriah, Crystal and Robert. Bob continued to work as a commercial fisherman off the coasts of Oregon, California and Mexico. Bob and Misty lived in Mexico for several months, while he worked with the government of Mexico to assist them with the development of their tuna fishery. Over the years, Bob also worked intermittently at various jobs, including warehouseman at the Grand Coulee Dam, and sales manager at his brother Jerry's electronics store in Anchorage, Alaska.

Bob was a loving husband and father who

took great pleasure in becoming closer to his children, and enjoying his grandchildren. Children and adults alike appreciated the way he told stories and joined discussions with great gusto and enthusiasm. He had a private pilot's license, and loved to daydream about buying an airplane and flying with family and friends. His varied passions included gardening, enjoying the affection of his pet cats, reading and discussing American history and firearms. Most of all, he was a strong believer in Jesus Christ, and the promise of everlasting life.

He is survived by his wife, Misty; his sons, Jerry and his wife Missy, Rick, Peter and his wife Cathy, Uriah and his wife Chau and Robert (Bob) and his wife Jennifer; and his daughters, Trish Higgins and her husband Kevin, Theresa Mills and Crystal Rodli and her husband Jesse. Bank robber arrested in Astoria

A man accused of committing multiple burglaries throughout Oregon was arrested Tuesday morning in Astoria, the U.S. Marshals Service said.

Marshals arrested Billy Dean Hayes, 53, outside a

motel on the 5300 block of Lief Erikson Drive at 10:45 a.m. He has been accused of robbing five banks in Lake Oswego, Salem, Newberg and two in McMinnville in the past two months. He was later taken to the Clatsop County Jail, the Marshals Service said.

The FBI announced Monday it was offering a \$3,000 reward for information leading to Hayes' arrest. In his robberies, Hayes typically would approach a teller, demand cash and leave on foot after receiving the money. He was suspected to be armed and dangerous, the FBI said.

Freeby hired as new deputy district attorney

Anne Freeby has been hired as Clatsop County's first new deputy district attorney in seven years.

Freeby, 27, of Astoria, started her new role Monday. She replaces David Goldthorpe, who was appointed by Gov. Kate Brown in early December as the district attorney of Malheur County.

Originally from Milwaukie, Oregon, Freeby graduated with a degree in biology from Oregon State University in 2011. She graduated from the University of Oregon School of Law in June. Location and office atmosphere

attracted Freeby to Clatsop County, she said.

"Astoria is beautiful and it's a beautiful county," Freeby said. "The office is not too big, but you can still see plenty of different kinds of things."

Freeby said she was inspired to practice law by a human rights law class during her senior year at Oregon State. She held various positions in law offices as a UO law student, including a year-long stint as a law clerk with the U.S. Attorney's Office in Eugene. There, she gained trial experience working alongside full-time lawyers.

Clatsop County District Attorney Josh Marquis said he preferred to hire someone who recently earned a license

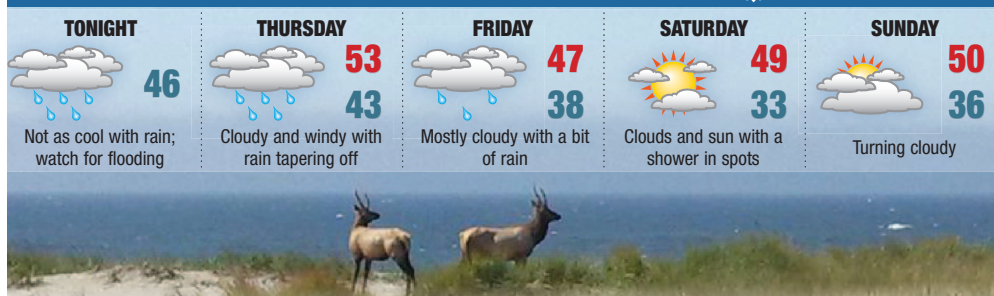
to practice law and that Freeby's trial experience was a key factor in her hiring. "It's fairly unusual to find rookie lawyers who have jury trial experience," Marquis said. "I was looking for a rookie for a number of reasons. You get to train them in your practices."

Freeby's starting salary will be a little more than \$63,000, which is more than \$35,000 less than Goldthorpe's pay at the time of his departure, Marquis said.

Freeby joins a staff of deputy district attorneys who have worked for the office for an average of 10 years, Marquis said.

"I think it kind of gives me an advantage in a sense that everyone is really knowledgeable," Freeby said.

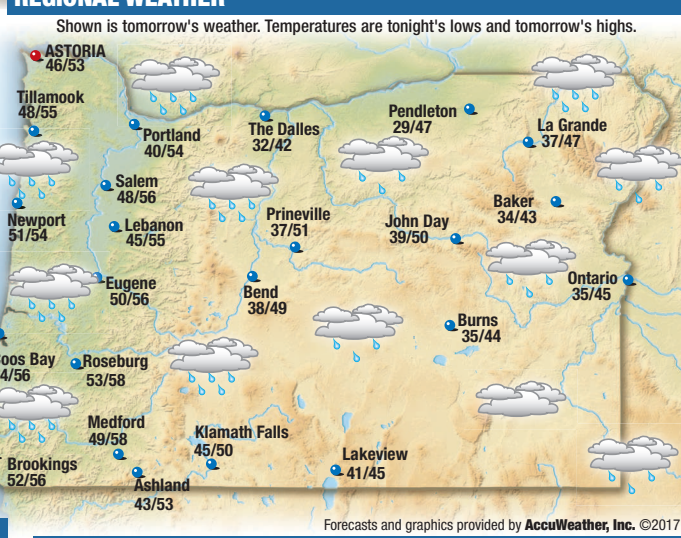

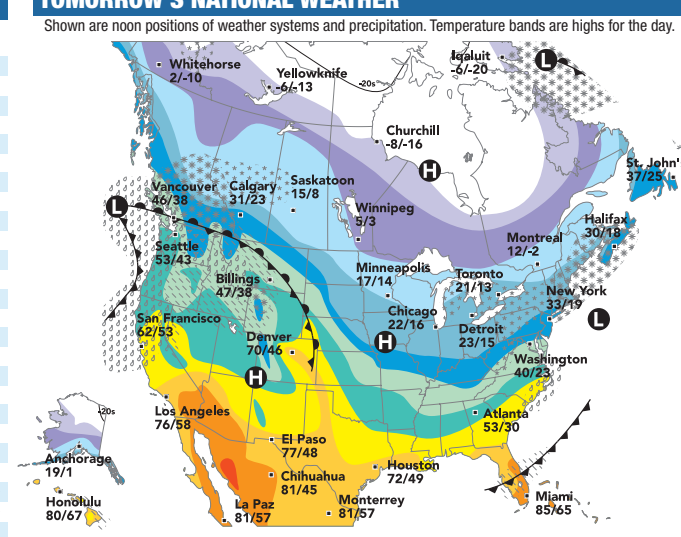

Historic preservation funds are available

Uniontown projects will take priority

Astoria has received a grant from the state Historic Preservation Office to assist property owners with historic renovations.

The Historic Landmarks Commission's renovation grant program will make these funds available to homeowners looking to make exterior

rehabilitation or renovation improvements.

Projects in the Uniontown neighborhood will take priority. If additional funds are available after initial outreach to the Uniontown area, they will be open to other eligible historic properties.

Properties designated as a historic landmark, or as contributing to a National Register historic district, are eligible.

Renovation or rehabilitation work must be located on the primary facade of the

structure, or where it is highly visible to the public. Structural improvements to preserve the integrity of the structure may also qualify.

Projects may receive 50 percent of the cost up to a maximum of \$3,000 in grant funds, and must be completed by July 31.

The grant program has been financed with federal funds from the National Park Service.
