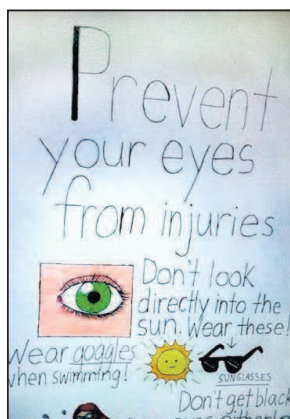

U.S. Bank grants \$95,000 to nonprofits

U.S. Bank awarded more than \$95,000 in grants to nonprofit organizations in Columbia, Cowlitz, Clatsop, Tillamook, Lincoln and Coos counties, and \$26.2 million in total across the country in 2016, including grants made to U.S. Bank's national partners, United Way and American Red Cross, as well as employee-giving match programs.

Clatsop County received \$35,000, not including marketing and sponsorships in the region. The local agencies receiving grants are as follows: Seaside Museum and Historical Society, \$1,000; Liberty Restoration

Inc., \$3,000; Astor Street Opry Company, \$2,000; Assistance League of the Columbia Pacific, \$4,000; Helping Hands Re-Entry Outreach Centers, \$5,000; Way to Wellville Clatsop County, \$5,000; Lower Columbia Hispanic Council, \$3,000; Healing Circle, \$3,000; Tolovana Arts Colony, \$1,000; Friends of the Astoria Armory, \$5,000; and Camp Kiwanilong, \$3,000.

The grants, made through the U.S. Bank Foundation, support the three core pillars of the "Community Possible" corporate social responsibility platform the bank introduced last year: Work, Home and Play.

Maritime Archaeological Society meets in Astoria this weekend

The Maritime Archaeological Society is holding its annual membership meeting Saturday and Sunday at the Barbey Maritime Center, 1792 Marine Drive. The two days are filled with presentations, including updates on society maritime archeology projects, and an entire day of training opportunities. The project presentations and keynote address are free and open to the public. Refreshments will be provided.

On Saturday, the annual reports and project updates begin at 9 a.m., followed by the keynote speaker at 11 a.m. The keynote speaker is Tom Beasley, executive direc-

tor of the Vancouver chapter of the Underwater Archaeological Society of British Columbia. He is presenting "Underwater Archaeological Society of British Columbia: 40-plus years of Adventure and Discovery Underwater" and "Tonquin: Solving the 200-year-old shipwreck Mystery." The day wraps up with a behind-the-scenes tour of the Columbia River Maritime Museum boat hall and artifact storage on Saturday afternoon.

Sunday is dedicated to training courses for society members. Basic training begins with an introduction to maritime archaeology, including maritime archaeology laws and regulations, and

is followed by more advanced hands-on volunteer survey training in the afternoon. For members who have already completed basic training, a remote sensor class covers planning and operations of the magnetometer, side scan sonar, Remotely Operated Vehicle and 3-D laser scanners.

The training sessions are free for Maritime Archaeological Society members. New or renewing membership applications are being accepted at the meeting. RSVP is appreciated for planning purposes.
