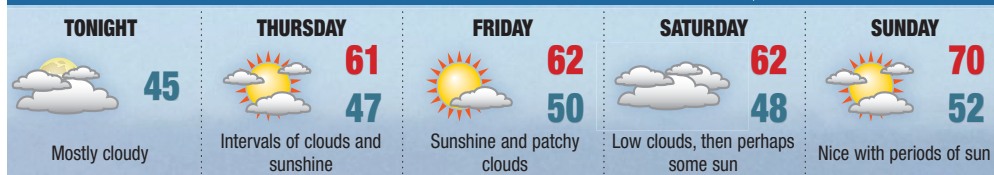
Elks BPOE No. 180 and Lewis & Clark Bible Church. Many lives have been touched in the various areas of his involvement and service.

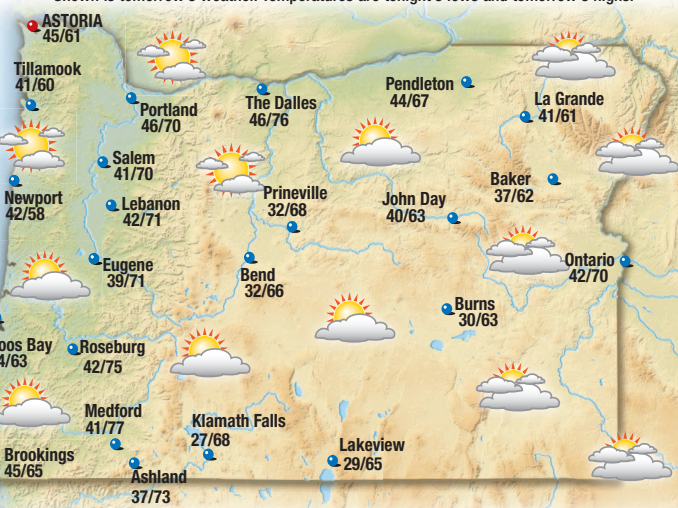

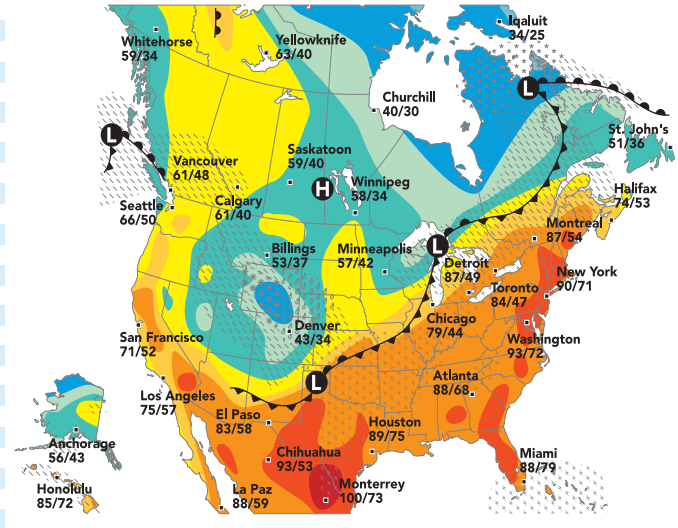
