

Oregon Senate president may retire

SALEM — State Senate President Peter Courtney, one of the Legislature's most powerful members, has yet to decide on whether to stay on the job or retire.

The 74-year-old Democrat contemplates retirement after achieving career milestones such as being the most-

ured Senate president and longest-serving current lawmaker, with 33 years in office.

"I haven't decided what I'm going to do. ... I go back and forth when I do think about it," Courtney said in an emotional telephone interview with The Oregonian.

If Courtney finishes his full term, which ends in 2019, he will hold the record for

longest-ever serving Oregon legislator.

Courtney downplayed his role in Senate lawmaking, calling himself a "rank-and-file" member and a "player-coach." But Courtney wields considerable power by controlling committee assignments, presiding over voting and directing Senate operations.

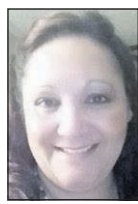

Asbestos information class offered Aug. 10

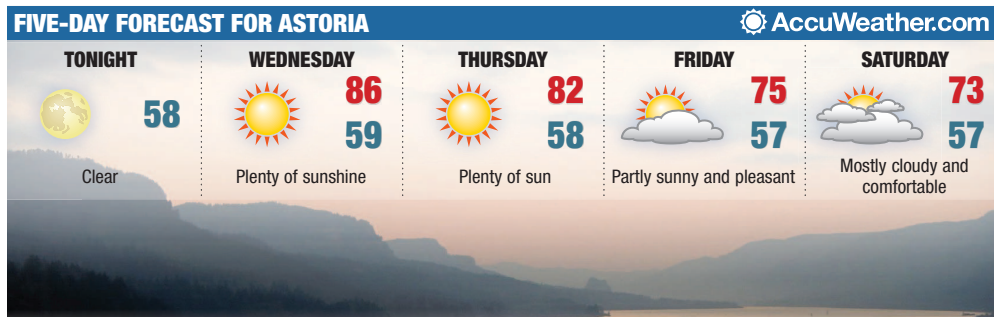

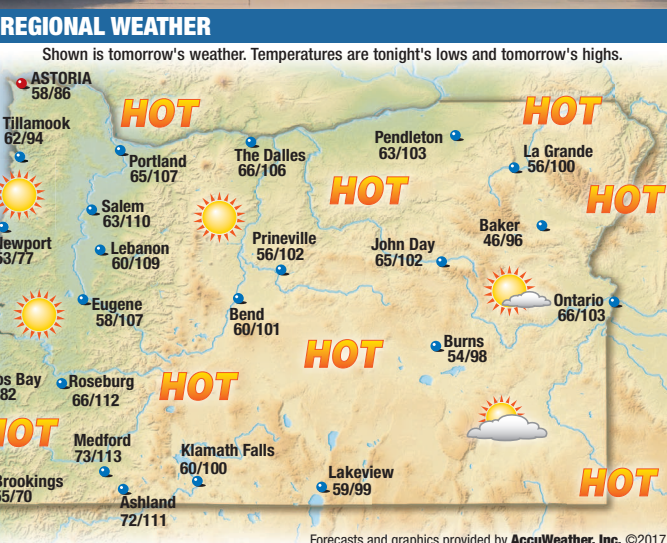

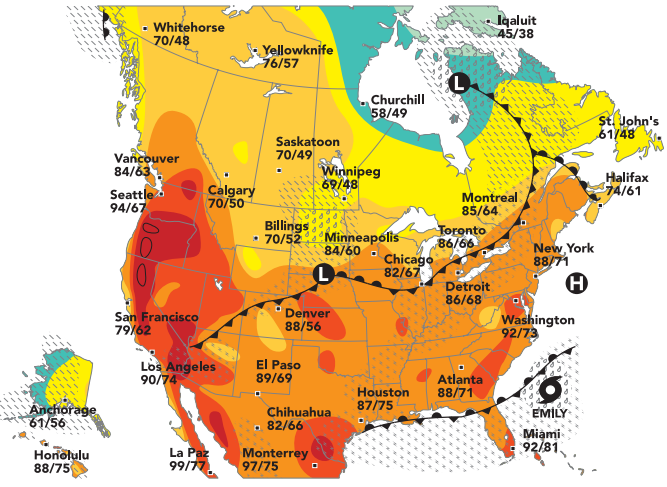

Robert Adrian Malo passed away July 17, 2017. Bob was born on Aug. 3, 1949, in Portland, Oregon, to Robert and Violet Malo. Growing up, he enjoyed working on the family farm and playing baseball.

After graduating from Tigard High School in 1968, he followed his dream and moved to Hawaii to surf. Returning to Oregon, he divided his time working for the family seafood restaurant and business, doing construction and surfing. He worked to create the North Shore Surf Club, and helped open a Cannon Beach surf spot "The Needles." Bob purchased the F/V Bobby, which he operated for commercial fishing and crabbing out of Garibaldi.

He married Pam Sowa in 1981, welcoming a son, Matthew, in 1983. After the passing of his father, the family relocated to the family farm outside Sheridan in 1987. A daughter, Katelin, was born in 1988. At the farm, a small herd of cows, chickens and geese could always be found, as well as Bob and Matthew working on haying chores. Bob was a hard worker, operating the farm and being employed with Yamhill County Public Works.

Surfing remained a passion of Bob's, splitting his time between Cannon Beach and the valley. Bob permanently relocated to Cannon Beach,

renovating a small beach cabin into his home and working for the city of Cannon Beach and then Tillamook County Public Works. After he retired in 2011, Bob spent his time fishing, hunting, clam digging and surfing.

Bob is survived by his children, Matthew Malo (Becca Bostwick) and Katelin Malo; his brother, James Malo (Kathleen); his niece, Angela Royer (Glenn) and their children, Malia, Krystopher and Mathew; his nephew, James Malo (Jennifer) and their children, Summer, Emily and Casey; as well as many lifetime friends who were like family.

He is preceded in death by his parents, Robert and Violet Malo; his baby brother, Raymond Malo; and his grandparents, Roy and Bessie Malo, Raymond Robertson and Leonard and Viola Hespach.

Bob's passing leaves a void that will never be filled. His infectious smile, willingness to help anyone and his constant "good job" words of encouragement will forever be missed. He never met anyone he didn't like, and was often seen driving around waving at people he knew, and those he didn't.

Betty Ann was an excellent seamstress, sewing clothes for both herself and her daughters. She was also artistic, and enjoyed taking watercolor lessons from Charles Mulvey. She loved to garden; her favorite flower was sweet peas. She was a good cook, and her family particularly loved her razor clams (which she often dug).

Early on, she understood the merits of exercise, and could often be found walking the hilltops of Astoria. She was an avid reader, and passed her love of reading to her daughters. All throughout her life, she loved animals, and beloved pets were a very important part of the family. In her later years, she developed an interest in birds. No matter where she lived, she always had several bird feeders.
