B Boutique opens in Cannon Beach

Dozens gathered to celebrate the grand opening of the women’s clothing store B Boutique Thursday at its new location in Cannon Beach.

The store, which the owner Jenny Becker describes as “fun and different styles for all women,” operated in Seaside for 14 years before moving to Spruce Street.

“When we opened in Seaside, we wanted

to be closer to the schools for our kids,” Becker said. “But now my kids are out of school, and it was time to come back home to Cannon Beach.”

Becker, who has lived in Cannon Beach for the past 25 years, operates the store with her mother and daughter. It replaces Primary Elements Gallery, which closed earlier this year.

“I’ve always loved this building and the fact it had a view of the park,” Becker said. “When I saw it come available, I didn’t hesitate.”

More than 4,000 cut trees remain near I-84

CASCADE LOCKS — More than 4,000 cut trees remain on a patch of ground near Ainsworth State Park following a wildfire that struck the area this summer.

The Oregonian reported that Oregon Department of Transportation workers

have spent nearly two weeks removing the trees, which were deemed likely to be a threat to motorists. The trees have forced the eastbound lanes of Interstate 84 in the area to remain closed since Sept. 4.

The tree removal continued Thursday, primarily on Shellrock Mountain.

But Oregon Department of Transportation officials say those threats and others should be minimized enough by Sunday night or Monday morning to allow reopening of the eastbound section between Troutdale and Hood River. The westbound lanes opened Sept. 14.
