Colleen Maupin Powell

Portland
May 17, 1925 — Sept. 21, 2017

Colleen ("Cluny") Powell was born on May 17, 1925 in Sioux City, Iowa, to Vern and Florence Maupin. She died on Sept. 21, 2017 in Portland. She was 92 years old.

Colleen was preceded in death by her husband of 67 years, Gordon Alderman Powell. She is survived by daughter Pamela Sutherland (Bruce); daughter Paige Powell; daughter Robin Powell (Sid Snyder); daughter Heidi Powell (Andy Jessup); five grandchildren, Calvin, Whitney, Taylor, Lydia and Clara; and a grandcanine, Poe.

Colleen grew up in Sergeant Bluff, Iowa, where her parents owned and operated a small-town pharmacy with a soda fountain, groceries and billiards. She studied sciences at Briar Cliff College and Creighton University.

She loved flying and became a United Airlines stewardess flying out of Portland. Her longest flight was in a DC-3 to Denver with stops in The Dalles, Pendleton, Boise and Twin Falls. They usually flew at about 8,000 feet, but when they exceeded 9,000 feet the crew sucked on oxygen tubes.

As a stewardess, Colleen was responsible for serving meals to 21 passengers and two pilots. The return flight from Denver often encountered strong headwinds, and could take eight hours. Married stewardesses were not allowed, so Colleen's airline career ended when she married Gordon in 1948.

Colleen raised four daughters in Raleigh Hills. She sewed beautiful clothes for them, and supported their many interests. She endlessly drove them to a variety of music, dance, art, swimming, riding and golf lessons. Colleen had a successful real estate career for 50 years, first in Portland and later in Gearhart, where she and Gordon moved after Gordon retired in 1986.

Colleen enjoyed making arts and crafts, skiing and bridge club. Colleen was known for the Scotch shortbread she served at open houses, English toffee and the gorgeous May baskets she made and delivered to friends each May Day.

No service will be held. Remembrances may be made to the Clatsop County Animal Shelter and the Pixie Project in Portland.

Russian hackers attempted to access Oregon voter information in 2016

Washington state also targeted

The U.S. Department of Homeland Security informed Oregon officials Friday that Russian hackers attempted to access voter information during the 2016 election.

"We block upwards of 14 million attempts to access our network every day," said Lisa Vasa, Oregon's chief information security officer. "These attempts come from all over the world, including Russia, with the largest number from the U.S."

Federal officials said the Russian attackers tried to access the Oregon Secretary of State computer network. The office's databases include voter information.

According to the Oregon Secretary of State's Office, the state's security measures "thwarted Russian government attempts."

"The fact that DHS confirmed that we had no Russian intrusions is a testament to the strength of the network security program we have in place," said Oregon Secretary of State Dennis Richardson.

Oregon was one of 21 states targeted by Russian

operatives. National Public Radio reported Friday that Washington state was also targeted by the hackers.

"Only two state election security breaches last year have been made public so far. Hackers were able to gain access to the records of tens of thousands of voters in Illinois' centralized registration database, but there's no sign any records were deleted or changed. Russian hackers also gained access to the password and other credentials of a county elections worker in Arizona, again there's no evidence records were altered," according to NPR.

Craft3 receives federal grant support

Regional lender Craft3 has been awarded \$686,500 through the Community Development Financial Institutions Program, which helps support financial institutions that focus on lending in economically distressed communities.

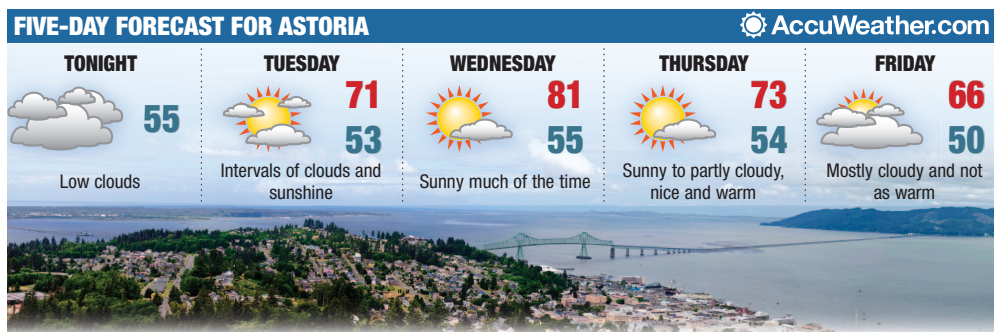
Craft3, which often takes on higher-risk financing projects than commercial banks, was one of 265 awardees

nationally, and also received funding from a related program to help Native Americans. The fund, under the U.S. Department of the Treasury, was established in 1994 to support economic revitalization and development among underserved communities.

Craft3 has secured more than \$11 million from the fund, which would face a 23 percent cut under a U.S. House budget proposal. President Donald Trump's proposed budget

would ax the grant program entirely.

The lender posted about the award on Facebook: "This \$686,500 Financial Assistance award will contribute to loan capital and increase our net assets, supporting our ability to leverage these funds with up to \$3.4 million in debt and provide additional financial assistance to consumer and commercial borrowers who are not able to access traditional capital."

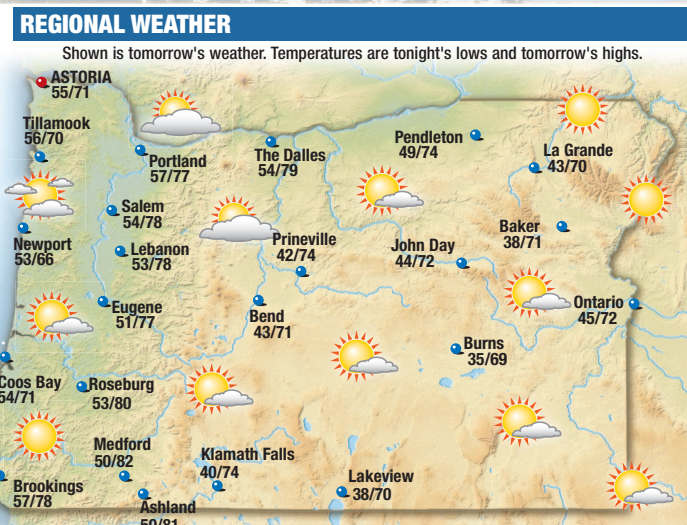

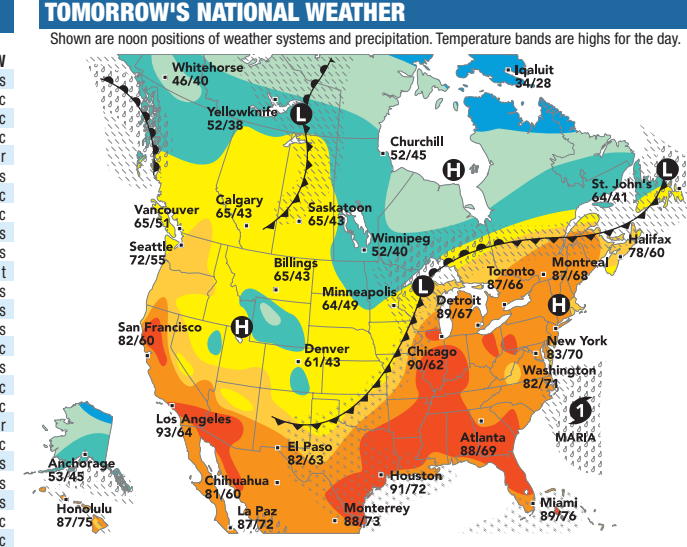
