Wildfire season in county comes to an end

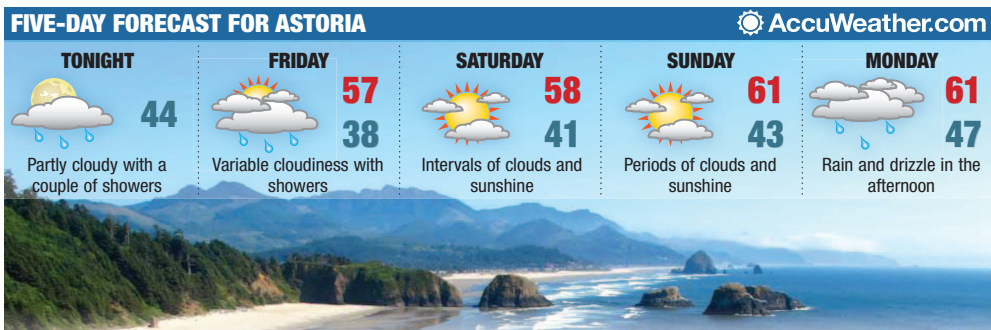

Wildfire season in Clatsop County is officially over.

The state Department of Forestry declared an end to the season effective 12 p.m. Wednesday. Logging operations on state, private and

federal Bureau of Land Management areas in northwest Oregon are no longer subject to requirements such as maintaining fire equipment at logging sites.

The Department of Forestry also will no longer require burning permits, with an exception for burn barrels or open burning.

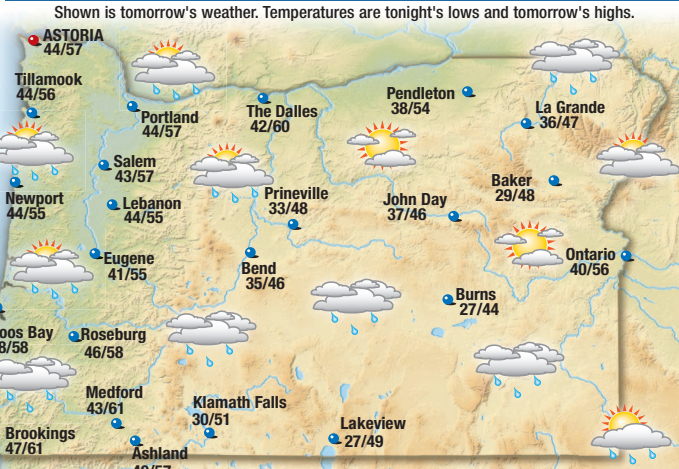

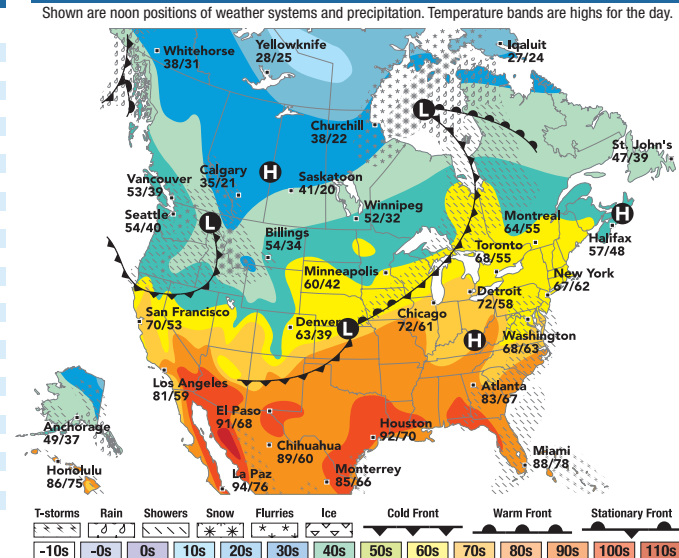

Fishermen get another crack at sturgeon

Fishermen will have a chance to catch and keep white sturgeon during a limited two day recreational fishery on the Columbia River at the end of the month.

Oregon and Washington state fishery managers announced on Wednesday that they will be opening the area between the Wauna power lines — located about 40 miles

from the river's mouth — to Bonneville Dam for sturgeon retention fishing on Oct. 21 and Oct. 26.

It is the first such opening in the area since 2013. The Columbia and Willamette rivers were closed to retention from 2014 to 2016 over concerns about the abundance of legal-size sturgeon. These numbers have since improved.

In June, state fishery managers had opened the Lower

Columbia River, from the Wauna lines down to the estuary, to sturgeon retention fishing for five days. The fishery closed a day early when thousands of eager fishermen caught more fish than expected.

For the upcoming fishing period, biologists say there are an estimated 1,245 legal-sized sturgeon available to catch in the Columbia River. They predict fishermen will catch around 1,050.

Leo Kenneth Leard Jr., 88, was born Dec. 18, 1928, to Leo (Pop Leard) and Ina (Van Camp) Leard in Astoria, Oregon. Leo grew up in Seaside and graduated from Seaside High School in 1948.

American Legion Post 99, where he was a commander from 1975 to 1976.

He is survived by his wife of 66 years, Millie; two daughters, Viki McDonald of Kelso, Washington, and Kathi Winslow of Vancouver, Washington; and a son, Keith, of Elkhorn, Nebraska. He has several grandchildren and great-grandchildren, and a niece and a nephew. He was preceded in death by a daughter, Sherri Schlappi, and a sister, Phyllis Card.

A private military graveside service will be Wednesday, Oct. 18, 2017, at Willamette National Cemetery in Portland.
