



Col. Robert Edward Fastabend (ret.), 83, chief of staff for the Oregon Army National of Vancouver, Washington, passed away on Sunday, Dec. 24, 2017. He was born a Christmas twin on Dec. 25, 1933, in Astoria, Ore-

gon, to John and Elizabeth (Shea) Fastabend. His twin, Bill, passed in December 2002. He grew up in a large family with six brothers and a sister. It was a lively household with much laughter and love. The brothers were the best of practical jokers, as evident one Christmas when Bob got a left shoe for Christmas and a right shoe for his birthday.

Robert "Bob" graduated from Star of the Sea High School in 1951. He married his sweetheart, Margaret "Peggy" Smith, in October 1952, in

Gunnison, where Peter graduated from Gunnison County High School. He earned a bachelor of arts degree from Western State College of Colorado. Peter then joined the Navy. While


stationed at the Naval Post Graduate School in Monterey, California, Ensign Hunter met his bride, Louise Holm, who was working at the Fort Ord Hospital.
