Seaside police to honor Goodding

SEASIDE — Seaside police will observe the second anniversary of the shooting of Sgt. Jason Goodding with a public memorial Feb. 5 at Seaside Police Department headquarters. Goodding, 39, was shot in the line of duty after serving a felony warrant on Phillip Max Ferry on Feb. 5, 2016. Fellow officer David Davidson returned the fire, resulting in Ferry's death.

The public remembrance and candlelighting will be conducted in the police department's parking lot, 1091 S. Holladay, at 6:30 p.m. rain or shine, Police Chief Dave Ham said. After the ceremony, the department hallway will be opened to the public to view tributes to Goodding, who was a 13-year Seaside police veteran.

Goodding's death brought an outpouring of support from around the globe.

In May, Goodding's name was added to the Fallen Law Enforcement Officers' Memorial at the Oregon Public Safety Academy in Salem. He was the 183rd Oregon law enforcement officer to die in the line of duty since the 1800s.

Goodding is survived by his wife, Amy, and his two daughters, Joslyn and Jayden.

"Time tends to heal," Ham said. "It's not that I don't remember my friend every

single day — I do. But I think the main remembrance that I have of Jason is the friendship he provided me personally, the camaraderie professionally, the way that he went about his business and the way he treated people. Still to this day I think that's something to be commended and something for me to try to mirror. His memory is going to continue throughout the community."

Willard Asseri Ivanoff Commercial fisherman Aug. 11, 1932 — Jan. 3, 2018

Willard Asseri Ivanoff, 85, a lifelong resident of Astoria, Oregon, died Jan. 3, 2018, at Oregon Health & Science University Hospital in Portland. Ivanoff was born Aug. 11, 1932, in Astoria, to Asseri and Aina Linnea Aspfor Ivanoff.

On March 25, 1957, he married the beautiful love of his life, Susan Calif, in Astoria, Oregon.

Ivanoff lived in Astoria his entire life, and was a son of first generation Finnish immigrants who migrated from the upper Midwest. He was a lifelong commercial fisherman, which took him many places, including Alaska, Oregon, Washington state and California, pursuing multiple species of commercial catch.

He grew up in the throes of World War II, and served proudly in the Army during the Korean War.

Although the war ended before he was called to the front, he was an extremely patriotic individual who always made a point to show his support for veterans and all branches of the armed forces. He had several missions late in life that can't be divulged, but the people involved know, and witnessed an amazing navigator able to find remote places in the middle of the night.

Ivanoff was an avid outdoorsman who loved to dig razor clams, fish for anything that swam, and hunted his entire life. Some of his most memorable hunts were moose hunting on the Yukon after driving to Alaska, and then boat-

ing approximately 700 miles down the river and its pristine tributaries, as well as multiple moose trips to Canada.

Ivanoff loved life and all that it had to offer, including his wife, family, friends and dogs, and he was loved in return. He will be deeply missed at lunchtime, but good for the pocketbooks of many. As most know, cribbage was his favorite game. He had many entertaining stories of his long and adventure-filled life, and he kept his marvelous sense of humor to the very end. He will be remembered for his welcoming and generous personality.

Ivanoff's lifelong partner, Susan, passed away in 2011. He was also preceded in death by his brothers, Robert Ivanoff and Bill Ivanoff; and son-in-law, Steven Jacobson. He is survived by his brother and sister-in-law, Donald and Glenda Ivanoff; a sister-in-law, Nancy Johnson; his four children, Susie, Renee, John and Thor; two daughters-in-law, Katrina and Janelle; son-in-law, Bob Seppa; and grandchildren, David (Cally) Jacobson, Michelle (Matt) Spohn, Emily and Jeremy Jacobson, Kelsey and Zachary Seppa, and Annika and Addison Ivanoff.

There will be a tribute for a life well lived at 1 p.m. June 3 at the Clatsop County Fairgrounds.

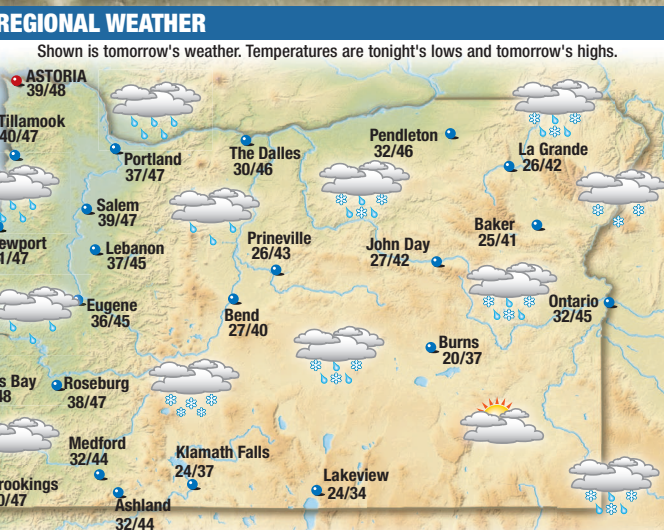

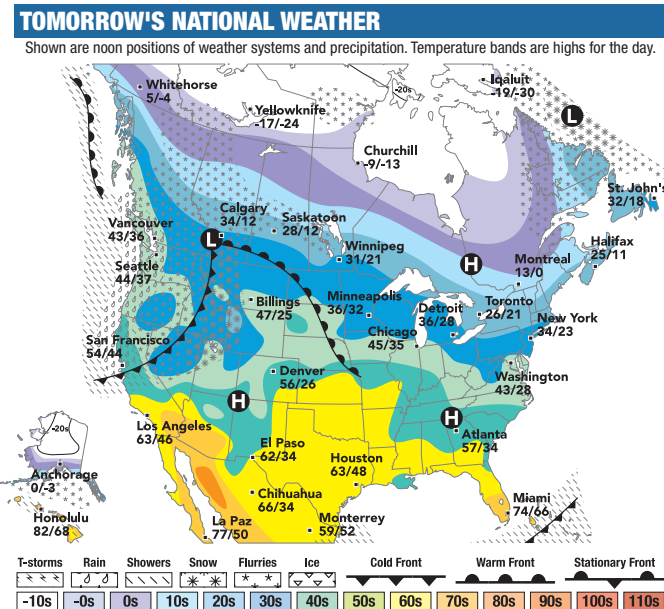
