Knappa Loggers' Hoover selected as scholar-athlete

Oregon defeats Cal 66-53 for Bears' 9th straight loss

BERKELEY, Calif. — The Oregon Ducks were happy to get a conference win on the road, but dissatisfied with their own play after a victory over a struggling California team.

MiKyle McIntosh had 13 points and 11 rebounds and Oregon beat California, 66-53, on Thursday night, sending the Bears to their ninth straight defeat to match the second-longest losing streak in school history.

Troy Brown had 16 points and Elijah Brown added 15 for the Ducks (15-7, 5-4 Pac-12), who never trailed

and held a double-digit lead for much of the game.

Oregon won easily despite committing 17 turnovers and allowing California to grab 19 offensive rebounds.

"We could have won by a lot more points," McIntosh said. "You take the win, but you've got to learn from this."

Oregon coach Dana Altman said his team was far too sloppy, saying the Ducks should have focused on being more careful with the ball after 11 first-half turnovers. Instead, they had two more turnovers early in the second half, including an ill-advised lob from near midcourt.

Travis scores 24 to lead Stanford past the Beavers

STANFORD, Calif. — Reid Travis contributed most of his offense in the first half. He did enough in the second half to keep Stanford in control.

Travis scored 21 of his 24 points in the first half and grabbed six of his nine rebounds in the second, helping Stanford beat Oregon State 80-71 on Thursday night.

"In the first half we were flying around, getting stops," Travis said. "In the second half we were watching the score too much and waiting for the game to end."

Dorian Pickens, who finished the

game with 999 career points, added 15 for the Cardinal (12-11, 6-4 Pac-12), who ended a three-game losing streak. Daejon Davis added 12 points and seven assists.

"This last week has been tough on us," Pickens said. "We're glad to get the win."

Drew Eubanks scored 19 points to lead the Beavers (11-10, 3-6 Pac-12), who lost their third straight and five of six overall. Tres Tinkle added 18 and both Stephen Thompson Jr. and Ethan Thompson scored 10.

Eubanks converted a 3-point play in the final eight minutes to pull Oregon State within six points at 64-58 but that was as close as the Beavers got.
