Born Frederick Richard Parhaniemi on Oct. 16, 1930 in Astoria, Oregon, known to his family and close friends as "Dick," he passed away peacefully on March 13, 2018.

Fred grew up in Astoria, Oregon, with his two younger brothers, Rudy and Bob, the sons of Fred and Silvia Parhaniemi. After graduating from Astoria High School, Fred went to work in a local machine shop. In November of 1950 he was drafted into the Army and was stationed at Fort Lewis in Washington state. During his time at Fort Lewis, he was introduced by a friend to Betty Johnson of Renton, at a dance in Seattle. The two quickly fell in love and they were married on Dec. 22,

1951. After they were married, Fred continued his service in the Army and was stationed for a time in Garmisch, Germany, where he made some lifelong friends.

Fred was honorably discharged from the Army in October of 1952. He returned to Renton and built a home in May Valley on the Johnson Homestead, where he and Betty started a family. Their first child, Richard (Rick), was born on May 9, 1954. Stephen (Steve) was not far behind, born on June 3, 1955. Finally, Mark

was born on Dec. 29, 1960

In the early 1960s, Fred built a small shop behind his home where he and his two brothers started Reliable Machine and Manufacturing

> Co. Their business grew until it was necessary to move to a larger facility in Kent. Fred passed his expertise onto his sons, who all spent time working at Reliable Machine until the business was sold in 1983. His sons continue to work in the trade to this day.





Kitzhaber agrees to settle ethics case for \$20K commission voted to pursue the governor's residence in

Former Gov. Kitzhaber has agreed to settle a state ethics case against him for \$20,000.

The proposed agreement between the Oregon Ethics Commission and the former governor who resigned in February 2015 amid an influence-peddling scandal is 20 times more than a previous proposed settlement, which the commission rejected.

In February, the ethics

10 alleged violations of state ethics law by Kitzhaber.

"preliminary find-The ings of violation" were based on a 135-page report released in February by state mivestigators.

Kitzhaber violated law prohibiting use of his office for personal financial gain at least twice when he took actions that benefited his fiancée, Cylvia Hayes's environmental consulting firm, 3E Strategies, investigators wrote in the report. Hayes lived in

Salem with Kitzhaber, and her payments from clients were counted as part of the couple's household income in mandatory statements of economic interest.

rne commission made no finding that former Governor Kitzhaber intentionally used his position as governor to advance the financial interests of Ms. Hayes or 3E Strategies," states the proposed stipulated final order, released Wednesday. "Such intent is not a necessary element."
