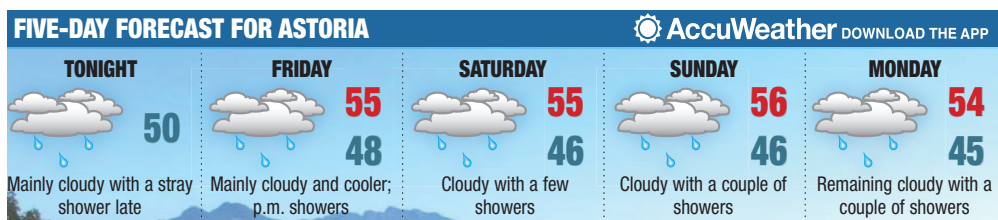

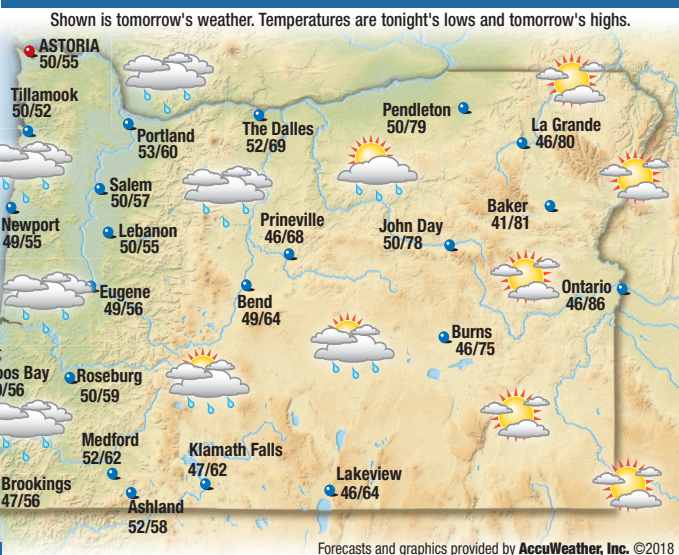

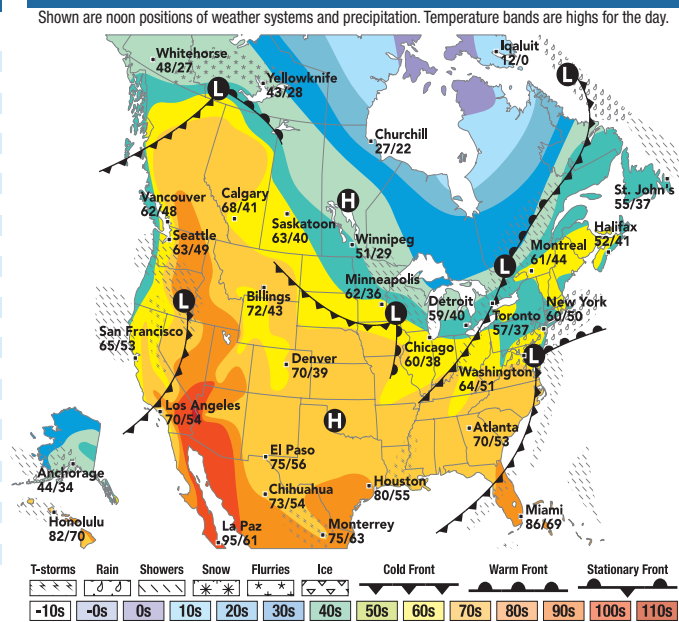

US officials slam nuclear waste problems at Hanford facility

RICHLAND, Wash. — Problems first identified six years ago at a Washington state plant where deadly nuclear waste is supposed to be treated in the future continue to plague the multibillion-dollar facility, U.S. investigators have said.

The Government Accountability Office said in a report released Tuesday that the site's contractor, Bechtel National,

has not fully completed planned actions, according to the Tri-City Herald.

And the corrections that have been made have not prevented continuing quality assurance problems. The report also criticized the U.S. Department of Energy for its oversight of the project.

The \$17 billion plant has been under construction since 2002 to turn up to 56 million gallons of radioactive waste

into a glass form that would be buried at another site. The waste is a leftover from the past production of plutonium for the nation's nuclear weapons program.

The sprawling Hanford site in eastern Washington state is temporarily storing the radioactive and toxic wastes in underground tanks. It's owned by the Energy Department, which hires private contractors to manage the cleanup work.

Martin Eugene West

Astoria

March 22, 1925 — April 1, 2018

Capt. Martin Eugene West (Gene to his family) was born in Eugene, Oregon, on March 22, 1925, to Nellie Middleton West and William Rudolph (Rudy) West. He died on Easter Sunday 2018, after a long decline, at the age of 93, in Astoria, Oregon.

Ocean View Funeral Home in Astoria, Oregon, arranged the cremation. Martin will be buried at sea, according to his wishes, with one son spreading the ashes while the other son recites the Sailor's Prayer. His plaque will be added to the Maritime Memorial on Astoria's waterfront. A celebration of life will take place at the Columbia River Maritime Museum's Barbey Maritime Center from 11 a.m. to 2 p.m. on May 5, 2018.

His younger brother, Robert, preceded him in death. Martin is survived by his wife of 72 years, Patricia; his children, David, Robin, Christine and Cheryl; seven grandchildren; and five great-grandchildren.

Martin grew up in Marshfield in Coos Bay, Oregon. He traveled to Astoria with his mother to take his first job at age 17 on a dredge ship. He acquired sufficient sea time to receive his Certificate of Service to Able Seaman on any waters one week after his 18th birthday, and started his mariner's career. Martin had a meteoric rise in rank with sea time, and continued education after graduating in 1944 from the U.S. Maritime

Officers School in California.

He married Patricia Stephens in June 1945. At age 37, he was a ship's master for States Steamship Line. He served for two years as relief master on a variety of ship types and tonnage before being accepted as a member of the Columbia River Bar Pilots, where he guided ships across the treacherous Columbia River Bar for 25 years.

He retired in 1991, and launched into a second full-time career as landlord, manager and maintainer of up to five apartment complexes, totaling 36 units. Martin and Patricia took a cruise on the Carnival Line, and then a trip to the Orient with their youngest son.

Martin was an active member in the community. He was a member of the Lewis and Clark Civic Theater as a ticket taker and supporter, engaged in many inherent duties; the First Presbyterian Church; the Masons; the Viking Nordic Dancers as treasurer; the Astoria Golf & Country Club; Gov. Vic Atiyeh's Maritime Affairs Advisory committee, serving two appointments; the Port of Astoria Commission; the Columbia River Bar Pilots, as treasurer then president; the International Pilots Association, which took him to Washington, D.C., many times; and he played an active role as consultant for the Columbia River Pilots' labor negotiations.
