Jazz great Fareed Haque returns to Manzanita

MANZANITA — International jazz star Fareed Haque brings his funk/Latin/soul/jazz band to the San Dune Pub in Manzanita at 8 p.m. Sunday, Sept. 16.

A prolific guitar player, composer and educator, Haque started his jazz career with fusion pioneer Joseph Zawanil, starred in Paco D' Rivera's Cuban Orchestra, toured with Sting and founded the Indo/Latin/Fusion band Garaj Mahal with German bassist Kai Eckhart

in 2001.

Mahal took the jazz world by storm, and two years later Guitar Player Magazine named Haque "World Guitar Player of the Year."

Haque's Funk Brothers is a loose association of skilled musicians who rotate in and out of the band with a core group. The leader likes how different lineups affect the sound of the band. "That keeps things fresh and fluid," he said.

This Manzanita performance is associated with the Manzanita Music Festival through the Fareed Haque Music Camp, which takes place Monday and Tuesday, Sept. 17 and 18, at the historic Reed House. The camp is for all musicians and includes an intense curriculum focusing on playing together and improvisation.

Three days of Flavel fun

ASTORIA — Clatsop County Historical Society hosts three days of Flavel Fun featuring the "other" Flavel house and John Goodenberger, Thursday through Saturday, Sept. 20 through 22.

Three years ago, Greg Newenhof purchased the long-neglected Capt. George Conrad Flavel residence with the intention of restoring it. When Greg died in January, his brother Jeff conceived a project dedicated to the memory of his brother: a book detailing the history of the Flavel family.

The Newenhof Family and Newenhof City Lumber Company, in collaboration with the Clatsop County Historical Society, are sponsoring three consecutive events to raise money for that project.

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At 7 p.m. Thursday, Sept. 20, Goodenberger will present his popular lecture "A Family Residence in Decline" in the Columbian Theater, 1102 Marine Drive.

The lecture will trace the lives of George Flavel's descendants: reclusive and mysterious, and fodder for endless gossip. "A lot of people run amok with the facts regarding the Flavels," Goodenberger said. "There's no need to embellish this story." The evening will also feature a few minutes of Flavel home movies. Tickets are \$10 and sold only at the door.

Then, at 7 p.m. Friday, Sept. 21, a

special reception will be held at the Capt. George Conrad Flavel residence, 627 15th St. Attendees will view newly donated Flavel family home movies never before seen publicly. Spanning the 1930s, 40s and 50s, the films cap-

ture the family at home and on world travels. Tickets for the evening are \$75 per person. Space is limited. Attendees will enjoy cocktails and hors d'oeuvres.

In addition, attendees will be able to bid for this once-ina-lifetime event: wine at the Capt. George Conrad Flavel home, and a catered dinner

at the Capt. George Flavel House Museum.

Finally, from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. Saturday, Sept 22, the Capt. George Conrad Flavel residence will be open for self-guided tours. The public will be able to see work accomplished in the ongoing restoration. Tickets are \$10 for Historical Society members, \$25 for nonmembers.

Memberships start at just \$35 for individuals, \$55 for a family. Members get discounts on events like this, free admission to the Historical Society museums, a subscription to Cumtux and discounts in the CCHS gift shops.
