Salmon fishery closes on the Columbia due to low fish returns

State fishery managers have closed all salmon fishing on the Columbia River today as returns of fall Chinook salmon continue to track well below earlier predictions.

If the return continues to be low, it would be the lowest return of fall Chinook to

the mouth of the Columbia River since 2007, according to Tucker Jones, Columbia River Program manager with the Oregon Department of Fish and Wildlife.

"2018 is a pretty bad year for Columbia River salmon returns," he said. "Except for upper Columbia sockeye, most runs will come in at 30

percent or less of preseason forecast."

Angling for salmon and steelhead retention is closed until further notice from the mouth of the Columbia River at Buoy 10 through the U.S. Highway 395 bridge near Pasco, Washington. The closure affects fishermen in both Oregon and Washington state.

College readies tobacco ban

Clatsop Community College is preparing to go tobacco-free with the return of teachers Monday.

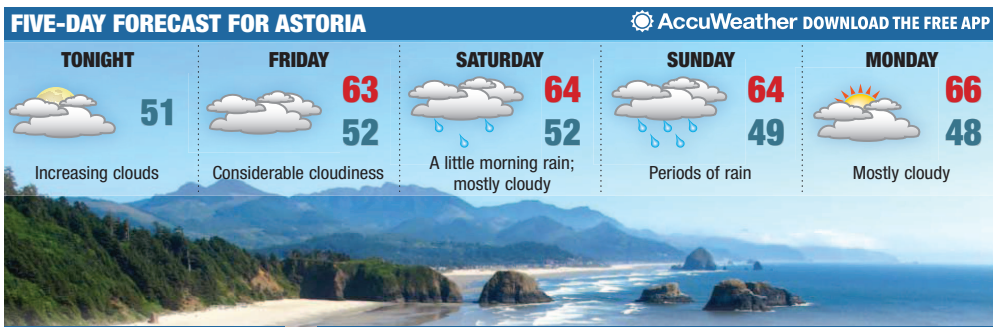
The college's board of directors voted in March to adopt the policy because of health hazards. No smoking or use of tobacco products, including e-cigarettes and vaping devices, will be allowed on campus, including parking lots.

"Tobacco use is the leading cause of preventable death and disease in this country," Christopher Breitmeyer, the college president, said in a release. "As an institution of higher education, we strive to provide a safe and healthy environment for our students, faculty and staff to learn and work, and adopting a tobacco-free policy is an example of this commitment."

The college is tearing down two on-campus smoking shel-

ters before fall term begins Sept. 24, while erecting signs to identify campus boundaries and running a publicity campaign. Trash and ash receptacle locations will be placed near campus entry points along Jerome Avenue and 16th Street to encourage proper disposal of tobacco products.

While the policy advocates for people to stop smoking, the college is also exploring coping strategies and counseling to help with compliance.

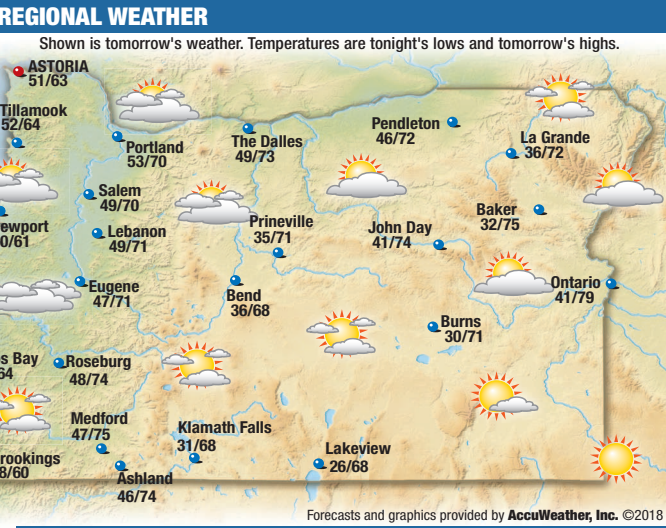

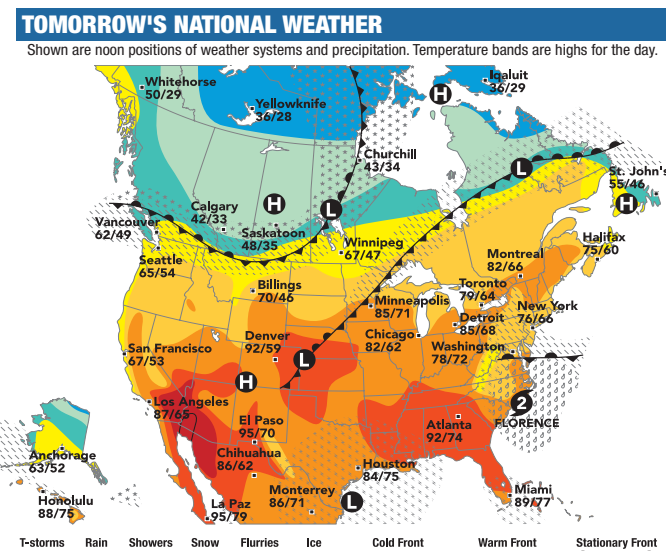

Ronald Gary Miller Knappa

March 27, 1938 – Sept. 11, 2018

Ronald Gary Miller passed away after battling liver cancer for the last few months. Born March 27, 1938, in Coquille, Oregon, to Jack and Melba (Varney) Miller, he was the second of five children.

Ron started school in Vanport, Oregon, in 1944 and a year later moved to Siletz, Oregon. By third grade he was attending school in Toledo, Oregon, graduating in 1956. Ron earned his bachelor's and master's degrees from the Oregon College of Education, now Western Oregon University. He was the first in his family to attend and graduate from college.

Soon after graduating in 1960, Ron began teaching in Toledo, and then went to teach at Cherry Park Grade School in Portland, Oregon. Ron and his wife, Jane, and children moved to Astoria in 1964, where he taught physical education for several years before making what would be his final career move to begin teaching at Knappa High School in 1967. He loved teaching, coaching (especially football), counseling and watching his grandkids in their activities.

Ron is survived by his wife, Jane (Harman) Miller, whom he married in 1959; sister, Joyce Miller, of Salem, Oregon; five children, Ron (Julie) Miller, of Plummer, Idaho, Laura (Dan) Waddingham, of Seattle, Washington, Carrie (Ken) Aaro,

of Portland, Oregon, and Tim (Heather) Miller and Jeff (Akiko) Miller, of Knappa, Oregon; daughter-in-law, Christina Miller, of Tacoma, Washington; 27 grandchildren; and seven great-grandchildren.

Ron was preceded in death by a son, Bruce (2016); two brothers, Jackie (1980) and Paul (1999); and a sister, Janet Whitehurst (1995).

He was a member of Astoria Christian Church and Lower Columbia Gideons, holding various offices. He served as an elder in his church until age and illness caused him to become an elder emeritus.
