

# Clinic: Deadline for grant is Friday

Nearly 80 school-based clinics around the state have shown to increase student attendance and academic performance by not forcing children to leave campus for medical care.

"It's really an asset to the health of the school district," McNickle said.

The Jewell School Board voted 3-2 last month to have McNickle pursue a grant on the school district's behalf. But school board members were concerned about safety after hearing the clinic would be open to the public. McNickle reassured school board members they have control over what services the clinic offers, how often and who can go.

The Knappa School Board recently opted not to pursue the health center grant this funding round, Superintendent Paulette Johnson said. People there had expressed concerns about location, safety, access, quality of providers, extra foot traffic, drug deals and child abuse, she said.

"It is a misunderstanding of what a (school-based health center) really is," she said. "Just not enough time to research and bring the community on board. It is still worth looking into and researching. But we have to get the fears out and talk about them to provide opportunities for our students."

Jewell School Board members wondered what sort of notification parents would receive and authority they would wield over children seeking services, a similar concern that in 2013 helped sink a county sponsored school-based health center in Astoria.

By state law, children 14 and older do not need parental permission to seek health care. But at a school-based health center in Willamina, the school district required every student up to 18 to notify parents, McNickle said. He recommended that Jewell have a

blanket permission slip with the services a child would be allowed to receive. The only exception would be in medical emergencies, he said.

School board members could decide whether to offer mental health services at the clinic, but such services would be referred out to specialists such as Clatsop Behavioral Healthcare, McNickle said.

Alice Hunsaker, school superintendent in Jewell, said the mental health agency already visits campus once a week.

"If they have to go to Seaside or Astoria to get those services, it wouldn't happen," she said. "Parents wouldn't take them."

There are nearly 80 school-based health centers in 25 counties around the state. Stephen Phillips, Jewell's new deputy superintendent, queried 10 of them about general practices and concerns.

None of the school districts he contacted had security concerns, had been pressured by any outside agency to add services or had invested any significant amount of money into the state-funded centers. The main challenges encountered were getting students in and out efficiently and keeping their visits confidential from fellow classmates. The majority of centers were open to students and the public, while only Beaverton School District voluntarily added reproductive health care.

"They were all very happy, but they were all different," Phillips said.

None of the school-based health centers so far have closed. The only school district in danger of losing its clinic was Powers, a southern Oregon town with a shrinking high school of 26 students where more residents than kids use the center, Phillips said.

The application deadline for a school-based health center grant is Friday, and the center will hear back early next month whether Jewell will be funded, McNickle said.

# Ceremony: 'I love this country'

Up to 750,000 people participate in citizenship ceremonies throughout the country each year. Oregon has more than 400,000 foreign-born residents, according to the U.S. Census Bureau.

One of them is Irina Belikova. She met her husband, Yevgeniy Belikova, when he was visiting his parents in Ukraine. He has lived in the U.S. for 23 years, most recently in Portland, and she moved eight years ago before giving birth to their son, Arthur, 4.

Irina Belikova said Oregon's natural surroundings remind her of home.

"I plan to live here and I like it here," she said, adding, "It's not so rainy in my country."

Many citizenship ceremonies take place at courthouses or other public spaces. The setting at Fort Clatsop was not lost on those in attendance. They took the oath just a few feet from where Meriwether Lewis and William Clark took shelter during a winter as they explored the area. During the ceremony, people dressed in 19th-century garb shot four volleys from muskets.

"It just says America or, really, Oregon," Jardiel Campos said.

Superintendent Jon Burpee drew a connection between the Corps of Discovery's journey and that of modern-day immigrants.

"That winter was Lewis and Clark's American moment, and today, you're about ready to have your American moment right where they had theirs. Although, speaking with several of you earlier, I know that you traveled much further than Lewis and Clark did," Burpee said. "It's fitting that, today, you take your first steps as citizens here in this national park,

a park that commemorates a journey."

Rosin Ortiz's parents took her to the U.S. from Mexico when she was a toddler. She has lived in the Beaverton area for most of her life. Now 31 years old and working at a naturopathic clinic, Ortiz wanted to join the rest of her family as a citizen.

Penny Edwards and Russ Luloff each had things in Oregon that pulled them down from Canada 20 or more years ago. For Luloff, it was his wife, Melody, whom he met at a Canadian school years ago. For Edwards, it was her job at Salem Hospital.

"I expect to spend the rest of my life here, so I wanted to be able to contribute to the country," Edwards said.

Ruslan and Tatyana Kovalenko, of Portland, left Ukraine more than 15 years ago. Ruslan Kovalenko works at Five Star Cleaners, a laundry service, while Tatyana Kovalenko is a stay-at-home mom.

"She has a job, taking care of the kids," said their daughter, Angelika, 11.

The Kovalenkos now join Ruslan's mother, father, grandmother and grandfather as U.S. citizens.

"I love this country," he said. "This is a good country."

# Camping: 'We're not just saying 'Get out of here''

Police Chief Geoff Spalding agreed. The hope is to deal with camping issues but have a minimal impact on the people camping, he said. However, there are concerns with some of the camps where trash has piled up or where other health and human safety issues might exist, he added.

There are several different types of camps in the woods. Some appear to be abandoned and are filled with trash. Others are organized, tidy and include semipermanent structures for sleeping and storage.

But besides concerns about displacing people, the city is sensitive to a recent federal appeals court decision that found "no camping" ordi-

nances in Boise, Idaho, violated the Constitution.

Spalding is working with City Attorney Blair Henningsgaard to figure out exactly where the ruling touches on Astoria's ordinances. The court's ruling was nuanced, Spalding said. Much of it was specific to Boise and may not apply to Astoria. Illegal camping was considered a misdemeanor in Boise. In Astoria, it is only an infraction and not considered a criminal act.

Boise's rules "criminalize the simple act of sleeping outside on public property, whether bare or with a blanket or other basic bedding,"

the appeals court stated in its opinion.

"We conclude that a municipality cannot criminalize such behavior consistently with the Eighth Amendment when no sleeping space is practically available in any shelter," the court said.

For now, Astoria police are in a holding pattern, Spalding said. They are not actively seeking out camps or posting any more 24-hour cleanup notices. Officers will respond if there are complaints about specific camps or illegal or suspicious activities, but they will hold off on moving other campers along until a final

ordinance is in place.

Spalding also plans to bring the issue to Mayor Arline LaMear's homelessness solutions task force, which includes representatives from social services agencies and organizations.

"The only thing I would comment on is that we've got to find some housing for people if we're going to do this," LaMear said.

"I mean, I know it has to be done for safety reasons," she added, "but, especially with the rainy season coming on, it's not a very pretty picture to think where these people are going to be sleeping."

City Councilor Cindy Price agreed. When the council debated lighting the Column for Astoria Pride, she argued the landmark should be treated like other monuments and lit just with white light.

The council has waited for several months now for the Friends to provide a draft policy, she said, and reiterated points she made earlier: "I just think that we shouldn't be putting colored lights on our most iconic piece of art in Astoria."

"Pink has nothing to do with supporting breast cancer," Price added, noting concerns about how certain large awareness organizations, such as Susan G. Komen, allocate money to research.

But City Councilor Tom Brownson, who called himself "agnostic" about lighting

the Column, pointed out pink is the color people associate with breast cancer awareness. He believes there was a way to let multiple organizations and causes make use of Column lighting, but he decided to abstain from voting. The rest of the council voted down the lighting request 4-0.
