Warrenton crushes Vernonia

WARRENTON — The Warrenton Warriors ran up, down and around the Vernonia Loggers in a Northwest League football game Friday night, for a 42-18 victory at John Mattila Field.

Coming off a 70-21 loss at Knappa two weeks earlier, the Warriors (3-2 overall) made good use of their bye week to prepare for the other Loggers, who drop to 1-5.

The Warriors were never challenged, building a 35-6 lead in the first half.

Warrenton quarterback Jacob Morrow did most of the damage, rushing for 299 yards and four touchdowns on just 18 carries. Devin Jackson added 23 carries for 70 yards and two scores.

Warrenton coach Ian O’Brien said, “Nie Pior, Kale’o Kapua, Mark Warren, Jake Morrow, Gio Martinez all had five or more tackles. We recovered multiple fumbles, as the weather condi-

tions made for a sloppy night for both teams handling the football.”

For the Warriors, Hordie Bodden had a key interception in the first half which led to points. Warrenton’s offense was on the field for much of the night, as the defense slowed an aggressive Vernonia rushing attack. Kenzie Ramsey was perfect on point-after touchdown attempts.

“I was proud of our kids bouncing back after the last league game,” O’Brien said. “We played like we are capable. The offensive line did an outstanding job. Mark Warren played his best game of his season on the offensive line.”

Still, “we have to do a better job taking care of the ball,” he said. “We had too many fumbles and turnovers. Two turnovers inside the red zone are some things to clean up. We are looking forward to head down Highway 101 to battle a great Neah-Kah-Nie team.”

Neah-Kah-Nie scores first win over Knappa since ’02

KNAPPA — Before the season started, one of the teams that most concerned Knappa coach Aaron Bar- endse was Neah-Kah-Nie.

The coach knows football, as his concerns were realized Friday night at Knappa, where the Pirates scored their first win over the Loggers since 2002, 38-14.

Knappa quarterback Eli Takalo was 12-of-19 for 117 yards passing, and rushed for 143 yards and two touchdowns (runs of 28 and 20 yards) on 12 carries.

“We didn’t play well up front on either side of the ball as a whole,” Bar- endse said. “Two costly fumbles and a snap over the head of our punter to give them first-and-goal was a big difference in the game.

“We didn’t play Logger football at all,” he added. “Back to the drawing board. Hats off to Neah-Kah-Nie. They played harder for four quarters and just ground on

us. Hopefully we can both stay healthy and make a run.”

The game was tied 14-14 with just over three minutes left in the second quarter. The Loggers had the Pirates facing a third-and-15, when the Pirates completed a pass for 17 yards.

Neah-Kah-Nie scored to take a 22-14 lead, then added a touchdown when an errant snap on a punt gave the Pirates a first-and-goal in the final seconds of the first half.

The Pirates scored to make it 30-14, and “we never recovered after that,” Bar- endse said.

Neah-Kah-Nie was 4-for-5 on two-point conversions.

“Who knows, we might get to meet up in the play-offs,” he said. “We’d love the opportunity to play them again and give our fans the game they deserved to see. We were just off. We know it, the kids know it and I’m looking forward to getting back to work this week with the kids and improving each day.”

Astoria gets defensive in win over Tillamook

Fourth-down plays were very kind to the Astoria Fishermen Friday night.

From fumbled punts and pass interference calls on Tillamook, to key runs, big pass plays and generous spots for Astoria, the Fishermen downed the Cheesemakers 25-12 in a Cowapa League football game at CMH Field.

With most members of Astoria’s 2008 state championship team in attendance, the modern-day Fishermen showed that they can rise up and play some defense, too.

After giving up six points on Tillamook’s opening possession, Astoria allowed just six more points on its way to the victory. With one more win in their final two games, the Fishermen (2-4 overall) can start thinking state playoffs, with their No. 12 ranking in the latest OSAA poll.

Astoria’s first big fourth-down play was actually a punt.

The Cheesemakers — coached by Astoria graduate Kye Johnson — forced a Fishermen punt on Astoria’s first offensive series, only to fumble the ball back to the Fishermen.

Astoria responded with a 12-play, 40-yard drive that resulted in a 28-yard field goal for Taylor Palmberg.

In a game that lasted well under two hours, the Fishermen had just one more offensive possession the remainder of the first half, and scored on that one, too.

Starting from their own 15, the Fishermen drove 85 yards, keyed by a 17-yard run from Ryan Stutznegger and a 33-yard pass from Bo Williams to Ian Hunt.

Williams capped the drive with a 1-yard run with 48 seconds left in the half.

With a light rain falling the entire game, there were just

two turnovers — both by the Cheesemakers.

“It was huge to win the turnover battle, and to come out with no turnovers was big, considering the conditions,” said Astoria coach Howard Rub. “And we seemed to win the fourth-down plays. We made some big plays there, both offensively and defensively.”

Neither team scored in the third quarter, highlighted by a defensive stand from the Fishermen, who stuffed the Cheesemakers on a fourth-and-inches play.

Astoria scored on the first play of the fourth quarter, as Niko Caruana ended a seven-play Fishermen scoring drive with a 4-yard TD run.

The big play of the drive was a fourth-and-nine pass from Williams to Hunt that went for 28 yards to the Tillamook 6.

The Cheesemakers answered with a 75-yard kick return by Kaleb Boomer, cutting Astoria’s lead to 17-12.

But that would be Tillamook’s final score of the night. Astoria ran nearly eight minutes off the clock on its next drive that resulted in a 2-yard TD run by Stutznegger. The drive was keyed by two fourth-down pass interference calls on the Cheesemakers.

Astoria’s Michael Moore ended Tillamook’s next drive with an interception.

Defensively, “Balan Kolee was in the middle of everything, making plays,” Rub said. “Ben Carpenter, David Merry and Dylan Ploghoft all had huge games defensively, and Josh Olson had a big game and made some big plays.”

Having already played the top two teams in the Cowapa League, the Fishermen finish the regular season against the bottom two, Molalla (Oct. 12) and Valley Catholic (Oct. 19).

Routine win over Molalla for No. 1 Seaside

SEASIDE — The Seaside Gulls scored their usual, routine blowout victory Friday night, 36-7 over Molalla at Broadway Field, in the first football meeting between the two teams since Molalla joined the Cowapa League.

The “runaway” candidate for state 4A Offensive Player of the Year, Seaside running back Alexander Teubner ran his season total to 1,131 rushing yards and 24 touchdowns, with four more scores and 171 yards on the ground against the Indians.

With 115 rushing attempts through six games, Teubner is averaging 9.8 yards per carry.

Seaside (6-0 overall) had Friday’s game locked up by halftime, 22-0, while the Gulls’ defense held Molalla to just 76 yards in total offense, and 1-for-12 on third-down conversions. Despite four turnovers, Seaside finished the game with 402 yards in total offense.

The Gulls were voted as the unanimous No. 1 team in last week’s coaches poll.

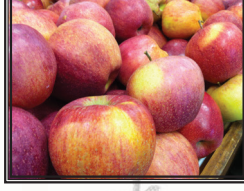
