The Pacific Power Foundation awarded a grant of \$2,000 to the Astoria Downtown Historic District Association for its 13th Street Alley Activation

The alley connects Duane and Commercial streets; the project, estimated to cost approximately \$12,500, is now almost 50 percent funded.

ADHDA Executive Director Sarah Lu Heath, who has helped lead the effort to pursue a permanent lighting and art installation

for the alley, said the first phase of the lantern installation will be created over the

next several weeks. A request for proposals from regional artists will be issued this winter if funding

is completed.


