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Clatsop County is accepting applications for grants to local social and human service agencies that serve people in need socially and economically. The grants will be distributed by the county Human Services Advisory Council on behalf of Clatsop County Board of Commissioners. This year there is \$30,000 total available in funding; individual programs will be eligible for grants of up to \$10,000. Preference is given to programs that: provide services

that are available to all county residents; serve the largest number of county residents; work collaboratively with other groups and receive significant portions of their funding from sources other than the county; address a need not now being addressed by other groups or agencies; and have missions that are consistent with the board’s priorities as identified in Clatsop Vision 2030 Together. The Human Services Advisory Council grant committee will make funding recommendations to the Board of Commissioners for approval at one of its regularly scheduled meetings.
