Creative minds at 121 Oregon arts organizations will be empowered by \$1,031,593 in fiscal year 2019 Operating Support Grants from the Oregon Arts Commission.

Ranging from \$3,000 to \$29,750, the

grants are available to nonprofit organizations that have the arts at the core of their mission.

Among local groups awarded Operating Support Grants are the Astoria Music Festival Inc., which received \$5,914, and Liberty Restoration Inc., which was given \$3,000.

The Oregon Arts Commission is supported with general funds appropriated by the Oregon Legislature and with federal funds from the National Endowment for the Arts as well as funds from the Oregon Cultural Trust.
