

Police continue search for missing woman

Authorities are still searching for a woman who went missing in late November near state Highway 53 in northern Tillamook County.

Maria Del Carmen Quintana, 59, was reported missing by a family member. The Tillamook County Sheriff's Office has been searching ever since for Quintana, who is considered endangered. She is described as about 5 feet, 9 inches tall and weighing 160 pounds.

County employment cools with winter

Unemployment in Clatsop County continued creeping up in November with the onset of winter, according to state figures.

The county sported a 4.2 percent seasonally adjusted unemployment rate last month, compared with 4 percent the month prior. Seasonally adjusted figures compare expected monthly changes with reality. The county was tied for the 10th-lowest unemployment rate statewide with Wasco County.

The county lost 240 jobs, 50 fewer than expected. Total nonfarm employment was at 18,760, 90 more than

the year prior.

The private sector lost 320 jobs over the past month, including 220 in leisure and hospitality; 60 in food manufacturing; and 40 in professional and business services. Retail climbed by 40 positions with holiday shopping. Local education added 50 jobs, and other government services another 40.

Over the past year, leisure and hospitality have added 200 jobs and retail trade 180. Professional and business services have cut 160 jobs; and mining, logging and construction another 40. Nearly 100 state government jobs were reclassified into private-sector education and health services.

ton, near the New Youngs Bay Bridge on one count each of driving under the influence of intoxicants and misdemeanor driving while

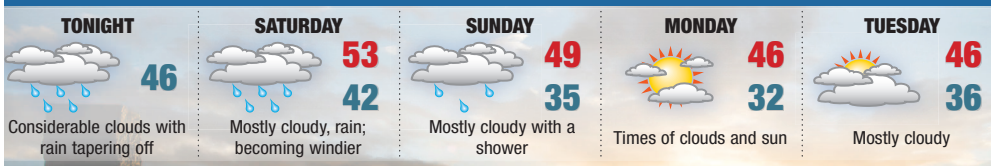
suspended. Miller admitted to using marijuana and was later tested by a drug recognition expert, according to police.

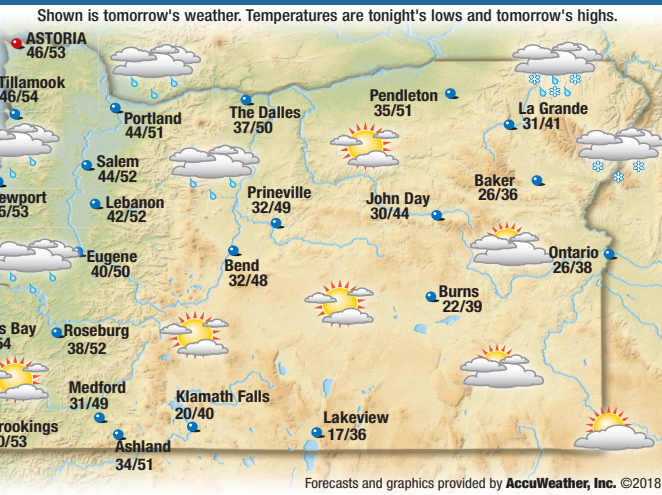

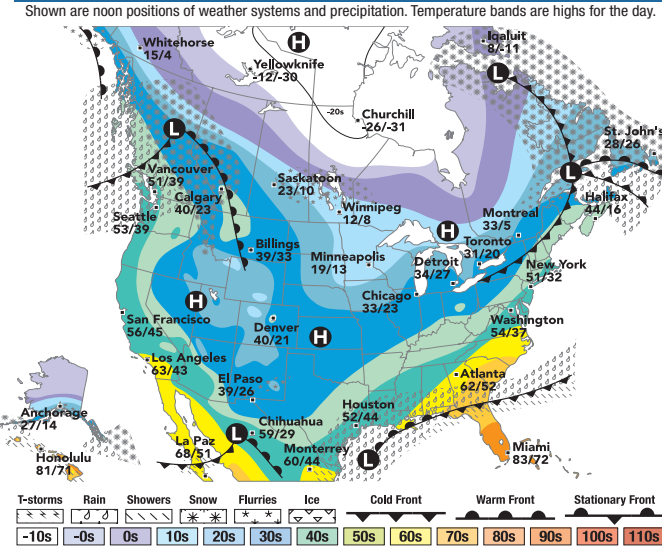

New food stamp requirements coming

Up to 1,000 food stamp beneficiaries in Clatsop County face new work requirements being imposed by the Trump administration.

The mandatory employment and training program is expanding to recipients categorized as able-bodied adults without dependents that do not qualify for an exemption from the time limits.

Starting in the new year, people between 18 and 49 without a child are required to participate in qualifying employment and training activities to maintain eligibility in the Supple-

mental Nutrition Assistance Program.

Dawn Myers, an operations and policy analyst with the state Department of Human Services, said there are 1,000 such individuals in Clatsop County.

Qualified activities include working 20 hours a week paid or unpaid; education or other training programs; and community service with a public or private nonprofit. People who fail to participate could face losing assistance.

People exempt from the time requirements include pregnant women and individuals mentally or physically unable to work.

The Department of Human Services began notifying people affected by the new work requirements in July, Myers said. The state has partnered with employment agency WorkSource Oregon to provide job search, training, GED exam preparation, English courses and several short-term education or vocational training programs to help people find employment.

People affected are encouraged to call their local Department of Human Services self-sufficiency office. The office in Astoria is located at 450 Marine Drive and can be reached at 503-325-2021.

Shirley Ann Tinner Astoria

Shirley Ann Tinner was born on Nov. 9, 1936, to Finnish immigrants Frans and Hilja (Eskola) Fransen, and passed away on Dec. 13, 2018.

She lived in Astoria her entire life, with the exception of spending winters in the desert for many years. Educated in the Astoria school system, and full of pride to be an Astorian, Shirley was a judicial assistant to Circuit Court Judge Thomas Edison for 23 years, and retired at the age of 57.

In 1954, she married Carvel Tinner, and they had one daughter, Kim. Shirley was the youngest of seven children; she had three brothers, Albert, Walter and John; and three sisters, Helen, Ruth and Audrey.

Shirley was active in the forming of the Astoria Scandinavian Midsummer Festival in 1968, and didn't miss a festival in 51 years. At the 50th celebration, she was chosen as the honorary grand marshal. Extremely proud of her Finnish heritage, Shirley grew up in Uniontown, learned to

speak the language at an early age (which she continued to speak into adulthood), was a member of the Finnish Brotherhood, Columbia River Maritime Museum and the Clatsop County Historical Society, where she generously shared time over the years.

She is survived by her daughter, Kim Supple (Dan); grandson, Joseph Supple (Shannon); her sisters, Helen Mack (Blaine) and Audrey Brown; along with numerous nieces and nephews.
