

Oregon shifts hepatitis A prevention

BEND — Oregon health officials are working to redirect hepatitis A prevention strategies toward homeless populations following a shift in how outbreaks of the disease occur.

The Bulletin reported the Oregon Health Authority has purchased additional hepatitis A vaccines this year, distributing them to county health departments in areas with large homeless populations.

Previously, hepatitis A outbreaks were mostly linked to international travelers or foodborne outbreaks, with infections occurring mainly in children.

Oregon has documented 20 cases of the disease through November. Four of the cases last year involved people younger than 40.

The federal Centers for Disease Control and Prevention recorded 1,521 cases of hepatitis A in 2017 from California, Kentucky, Michigan and Utah. Of those, 57 percent had reported drug use, homelessness or both. As a result, the Advisory Committee on Immunization Practices recommended in October adding homelessness to the list of reasons why someone should be vaccinated.

Hepatitis A is typically transmitted when someone ingests something that has

been contaminated with the feces of an infected person. Symptoms include fever, fatigue, nausea, abdominal pain, dark urine, joint pain and jaundice. Most people recover with limited treatment, but complications can occur especially among people already in poor health.

“The homeless population just seems like the perfect setup for this transmission,” said Dr. Paul Cieslak, medical director for communicable diseases and immunizations at the Oregon Health Authority’s Public Health Division. “You’ve got people living without the benefit of running water and often without toilet or sewage.”

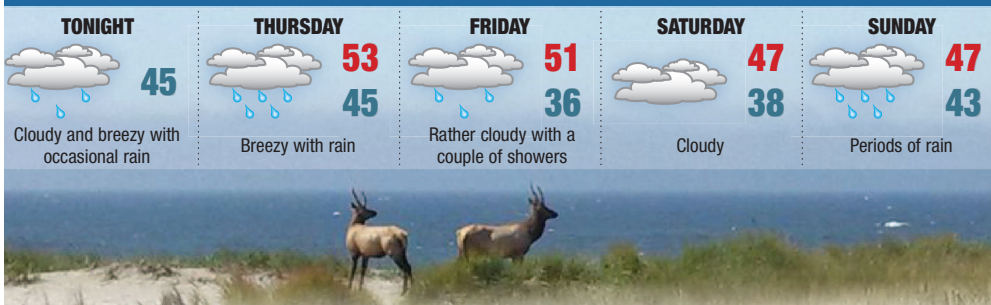

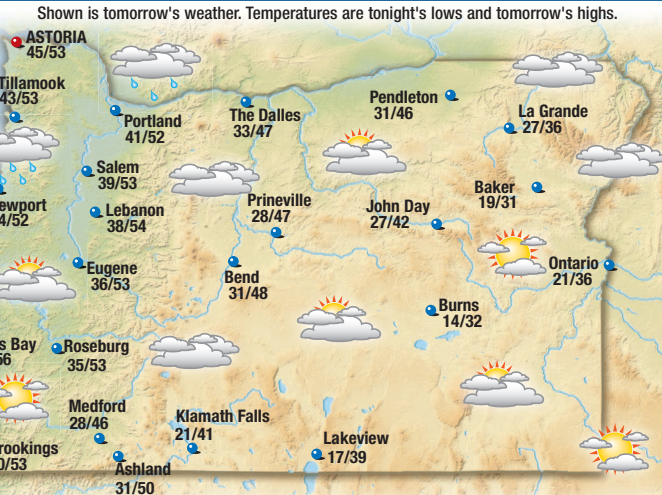

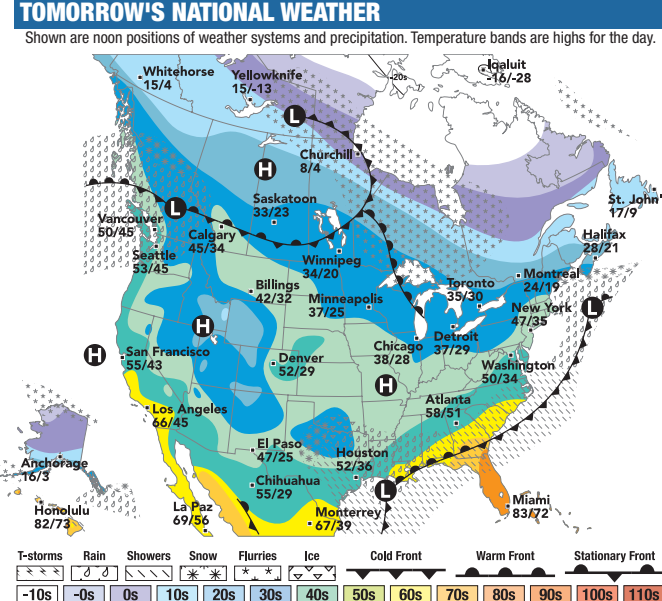

Emmy Haglund Backlund Oren went to her heavenly home on Dec. 25, 2018, at the age of 101. She died quietly and peacefully in her home in Oceanside, California.

Emmy was born in Astoria, Oregon, to John and Amanda Haglund, of Knappa, Oregon. She grew up on a houseboat near Knappa Dock with her brother, G. John (Johnny) Haglund. Her father was a commercial fisherman, and she had many happy memories of living on the houseboat, and the summers spent at Tongue Point, Oregon, where the house was towed for the summer fishing season.

She attended Knappa schools and graduated in 1935 as senior class president. During her youth she was involved with Brownies, Girl Scouts, 4-H Club and playing guitar and piano with her brother, Johnny. After high school, Emmy attended the Pacific School of Beauty Culture in Portland, Oregon, and graduated with honors in 1938.

She went to work as a beautician at the LaRose Beauty Salon in Astoria, Oregon. She was also employed for a time with Point Adams Packing Co., and in the 1960s worked at the Owl Drug Store in Astoria, Oregon.

In 1939, Emmy married Gearhart Backlund, of Astoria, Oregon, and had two children. In 1966, she married Jalmer Oren, of Astoria, Oregon, and moved to Gearhart, Oregon. They found fun and adventure traveling extensively in the U.S., Canada and Great Britain. They joined Our Saviour's Lutheran Church in Seaside, Oregon, and Emmy became active in quilt-making for Lutheran World Relief for many years, as well as volunteering for various church functions and events.

Emmy's ties to Knappa continued over her life, as many occasions were spent at the old net house, also known as the Duck Shack, where family and friends gathered for holidays, picnics, crawfish and crab feeds, music and games and boat rides.

In 2010, Emmy moved to Oceanside, California, to be near her daughter, Doreen,

and son-in-law, Jerry. She joined the King of Kings Lutheran Church, and again became involved with quilting by helping the Piecemakers with ironing the fabric used for the quilts.

She met many wonderful people at the church, and also in her new neighborhood in a senior community in Oceanside. She loved the warm weather, and was glad she made the move. She spent the last four years in the excellent care of her caregiver, Alice Gana.

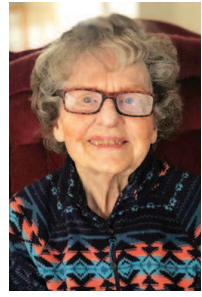
