Oregon approves new air quality rules to allow more prescribed fire

The Oregon Environmental Quality Commission approved new smoke rules Thursday that should make it easier to use prescribed burns to lessen overall wildfire risk.

Using prescribed fire during cooler and wetter times of the year can go

a long way toward making forests more resilient to major wildfires. But it's been hard for land managers to find windows to burn because of a zero-tolerance policy for smoke entering communities. Prescribed fires could be cut off or canceled if smoke strays where it shouldn't — an event regulators call a "smoke intrusion."

"This change will allow relatively low levels of smoke from prescribed burning to occur more frequently in communities. And that's a tradeoff for reducing the potential for much worse smoke incidence from wildfire in the summer season," said Richard Whitman, the director of the Department of Environmental Quality.

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


