Can Zuckerberg really make a privacy-friendly Facebook?

SAN FRANCISCO -After building a social network that turned into a surveillance system, Facebook CEO Mark Zuckerberg says he's shifting his company's focus to messaging services designed to serve as for-

tresses of privacy. Instead of just being the network that connects everyone, Facebook wants to encourage small groups of people to carry on encrypted conversations that neither Facebook nor any other outsider can read. It also plans to let messages automatically disappear, a feature pioneered by its rival Snapchat that could limit the risks posed by a trail of social media posts that follow people throughout their lives.

It's a major bet by Zuckerberg, who sees it as a way to push Facebook more firmly into a messaging market that's growing faster than its main social networking business. It might also help Facebook ward off government regulators, although the Facebook CEO made clear that he expects the company's messaging business to complement, not replace, its core businesses.

But there are plenty of obstacles. Facebook has weathered more than two years of turbulence for repeated privacy lapses, spreading disinformation, allowing Russian agents to conduct targeted propaganda campaigns and a rising tide of hate speech and abuse. Zuckerberg submitted to two days of grilling on Capitol Hill last April. All that increases the challenge of convincing users that Facebook really means it about privacy this time.

Encrypted conversations could alleviate some of those problems, but it could make others worse. Security is an "admirable goal," said Forrester Research analyst Fatemeh Khatibloo. "I'm just not sure it addresses the bigger issues Facebook is

facing right now."

Facebook grew into a colossus by vacuuming up people's information in every possible way and dissecting it to shoot targeted ads back at them. Anything that jeopardizes that machine could pose a major threat to the compa-

ny's share price, which would also affect its ability to attract and retain talented engineers and other employees.

In a Wednesday interview, Zuckerberg predicted Facebook's emphasis on privacy will do more to help the company's business than hurt it. While most of the stock market slipped in Wednesday trading, Facebook's shares gained \$1.25 to close at \$172.51.

The Facebook CEO has been telegraphing some of these changes to investors for the past six months, but his Wednesday blog post is the first time he has explained the idea to the more than two billion people that use Facebook's services and look at its ads. Those ads are expected to generate \$67 billion in revenue this year, according to the research firm eMarketer.

If everything falls into

place, Facebook will also display similar advertising on the privacy-protected messaging services. Those services are also likely to offer other moneymaking features, such as a digital wallet, as Facebook attempts to build something similar to Tencent's popular WeChat service in Asia.

"If you think about your life, you probably spend more time communicating privately than publicly," Zuckerberg said. "The overall opportunity here is a lot larger than what we have built in terms of Facebook and Instagram."

That's far from proven. While Facebook has already tried to show ads in the Messenger app, it's seen only limited success. It hasn't even tested the concept in WhatsApp since it acquired that service for \$22 billion in

chapter of the Coastal Conservation Association, a group that has long opposed gillnets on the river, said the fishery and its practices belong to the past.

David Commissioner Graybill, who served on the joint committee, did not support the change to the original policy and voted against the recommendation Saturday. He cited ongoing concerns about the size of salmon runs, and debated the actual economic impacts of the Kitzhaber Plan on commercial fishermen.

"I want to make it loud and clear to that group that I'm not going to accept going backwards," he said, addressing sport fishing representatives. "An increased share for the gillnet fleet is not to be considered."

But commercial fishermen and commissioners countered that the original policy has not met its goals and needs to be adjusted.

A five-year review of the policy completed by Washington fishery staff last year found both commercial and recreational fishermen were not seeing promised economic enhancements or stability as a result of the policy. The commercial fishermen saw active declines in their economic opportunities.

Washington has yet to find any good commercial alternatives to gillnets. Proposed alternatives like purse and beach seines were costly for fishermen and appear to negatively impact steelhead, researchers found during test fishing with the gear. Nor has the state identified off-channel areas to replace the main stem fishing grounds com-

mercial fishermen lost. Oregon has had more success at establishing off-channel fishing areas, but a similar review by state fish and wildlife staff came to the same conclusions about alternative gear and the economic impacts of the policy.

"And then the second reason is to keep these elk in the field for longer. We have a lot of issues with damage on our surrounding landowners, so the more we can keep the elk in this field, the better off they'll be. They're not causing

problems for anyone else." The 3 to 5 pounds of alfalfa per elk dropped on the field covers about one-quarter to one-third of their daily diet, said Bryan Swearingen, the wildlife area manager in Jewell.

"We'll continue to feed these elk on an irregular

basis until the grass starts to grow," Swearingen said. The alfalfa is trucked in

from Eastern Oregon, so as to taste different from what local elk are used to in the fields. Feeding continues until the elk become disinterested, by which point wildlife managers know nature has taken over for the season.

The special visit by the preschoolers Wednesday was the last in a series of popular feeding tours the state offers between December and February that usually draw around 1,000 people annually.Swearingen warns people to register early. His office had around 1,100 people reserved for the tours within the first seven hours of registration last December.
