Forest Grove man allegedly assaulted in Seaside dies

A Forest Grove man who suffered serious injuries from an alleged assault in Seaside in March died on Tuesday.

Travis Todd, 49, was sent to a Portland-area hospital after being allegedly assaulted near the inter-

section of Avenue K and S. Columbia Street on March 30.

An autopsy will be performed in the next couple of days. The investigation is ongoing.

Officials are still seeking information from anyone who spent time with Todd the evening of March 29 or

Whale washes ashore near Leadbetter Point

LONG BEACH, Wash. — A mature whale washed ashore last week near Leadbetter Point on the northern end of the Long Beach Peninsula.

Researchers conducted a necropsy of the whale on Thursday.

According to local resi-

dent Nellie Hux, who photographed the personnel from Portland State University and the Cascadia Research Cooperative, the older female probably washed up alive.

There were no visible signs of trauma as sometimes occurs when whales are struck by large ocean-going ships. Its stom-

ach was empty and contained no plastic debris. There was no sign it had recently given birth or was lactating.

"Just her time to go," Hux said.

Observing the necropsy was "sad, interesting and very graphic ... a great educational lesson for these students and me."

After a brief illness, Robert Gerald Sullivan passed away peacefully April 3, 2019, in Longview, Washington, in the loving company of his family.

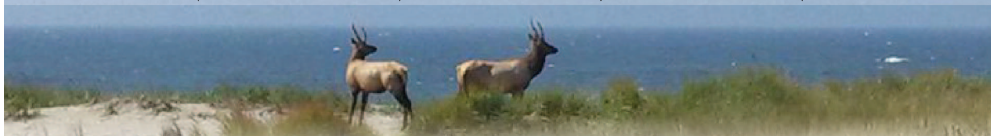
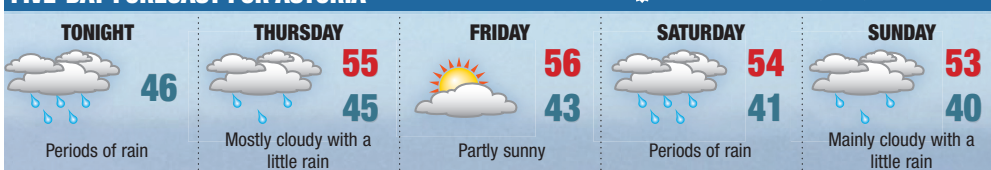
He was preceded in death by his two sons, Bradley (1957) and Scott (2011), and his great-granddaughter, Avery.

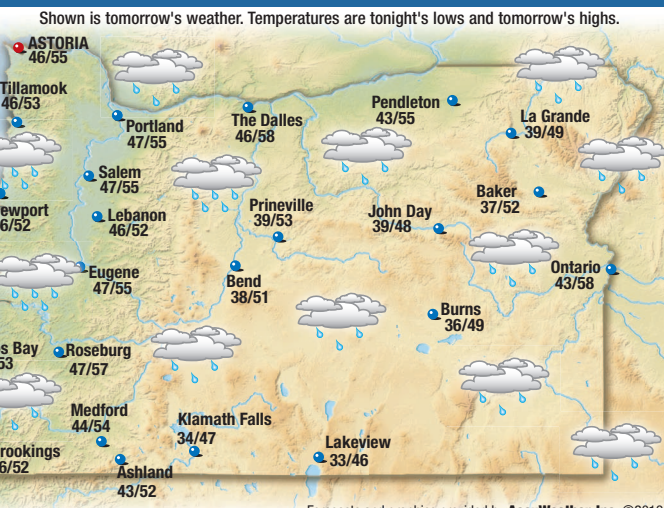

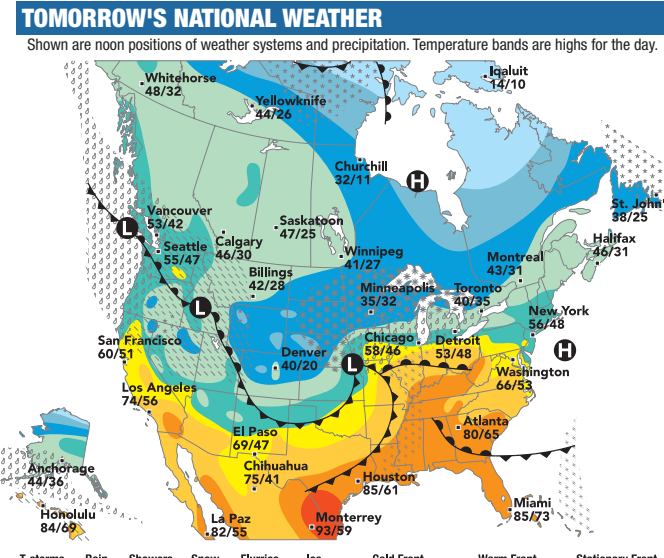
