Astoria man arrested for assault

An Astoria man was arrested after allegedly breaking into a woman's apartment and assaulting the two people inside Tuesday night.

Around 10:30 p.m., Astoria police received a call about a neighbor causing a disturbance in the 1200 block of W. Marine Drive.

Earlier in the night, Moses Keithley, 23,

reportedly jumped through an open window "like Superman" into a woman's apartment and began to assault the man she was sitting with on her bed, said Astoria Deputy Police Chief Eric Halverson. The man was able to escape to the apartment next door to call 911.

When the officer arrived,

he heard a woman screaming and decided to kick down the bedroom door, where he found Keithley on top of the woman holding her down.

Halverson said Keithley and the woman appeared to know each other, but the relationship is unclear.

Keithley was arrested for first-degree burglary, fourth-degree assault, one count of strangulation, two counts of harassment and criminal trespass in the first and second degree.

Etta Lurene Bruner, a longtime Clatsop County resident, passed away Sunday, April 28, in Astoria.

Born to John and Anna Lousignont on Oct. 3, 1925, she was raised on the family's wheat ranch near Dufur, Oregon, where she and her older brother, Vern, developed a strong work ethic and close connection to the land. Etta enjoyed spending time outdoors riding horses and rock hunting with her family.

After graduating from Dufur High School in 1943, she moved to The Dalles, where she worked as a switchboard operator for the local telephone company. In 1951, she married Arthur S. Bruner. They made their home in The Dalles, where they raised their three children, Vickie, Kathy and Ed.

Etta shared her childhood pastime of rock hunting with her children. They spent countless hours as a family digging around in old river beds looking for agates, petrified wood and picture jasper, to name a few. She shared the best specimens with children while volunteering at the local grade school.

After 20-plus years of marriage, she and Art divorced, and she moved to the Knappa area, where her daughter, Vickie, lived with her children. Eventually, Kathy and Ed moved to the area as well, so she was able to play a vital role in all of her grandchild-

dren's lives. Etta became the family photographer, attending every athletic and extracurricular event that her grandkids participated in. Besides spending time with family, she also loved gardening, fishing, clam digging and treasure hunting at garage sales.

She was preceded in death by a brother, Vern Lousignont.

She is survived by her three children, Vickie Lawson, of Warrenton, Kathy Lammers (Rick), of Knappa and Ed Bruner (Diana), of Knappa; her grandchildren, Melissa Lahti (Rick), of Astoria, Josh Lawson (Becky), of Astoria, Shana Bruner, of Simi Valley, Cal-

Two vie for community development job

After more than a year without a community development director, Astoria now has two candidates for the job.

Their names are not yet being released, but City Manager Brett Estes announced a public meet-and-greet event at Clatsop Community College next week. The event will give people a chance to meet the candidates, hear more about their experiences and backgrounds and ask questions.

The event, held at Columbia Hall, room 219 at 1651 Lexington Ave., will begin at 5:30 p.m. on May 8. Comment cards will be provided so people can share their initial impressions of the candidates they

speak with at the event. Estes held a similar event February 2018 when he had two candidates lined up for the job. Ultimately, neither candidate was offered the position.

Estes has served as interim community development director in addition to his role as city manager since former director Kevin Cronin left in 2017. He brought on former city planners Rosemary Johnson and Mike Morgan as consultants to help with projects in the Community Development Department. Morgan briefly served as interim community development director.

Estes posted the job several times since Cronin left. While Estes has been able to get a list of candidates, he has not succeeded yet in finding a replacement.

This year, Estes brought on Prothman, a consulting firm that specializes in recruitment services across the nation, to post the position and recruit candidates.

Over the last two years, the department has been asked to take on large, time-intensive projects, including the creation of codes to guide development along a portion of the Astoria riverfront.

Some projects have had to go on the back burner to accommodate more pressing priorities, Estes said. City Planner Nancy Ferber, hired during Cronin's tenure, left for another job this spring.

The community development director oversees a number of issues, including development review, code enforcement and urban renewal.

Glenn Dale Stuhr Svensen

Oct. 6, 1932 — April 24, 2019

Glenn Dale Stuhr, son of Walter and Lenore (Krah) Stuhr, was born Oct. 6, 1932 in Utica, Nebraska, and passed away April 24, 2019 in Knappa, Oregon, at 86 years old, after battling multiple myeloma.

He was preceded in death by both of his parents. Glenn's survivors include his wife, Elizabeth (Betty), of Svensen, Oregon; son, Frank, and his wife, Jessica, and grandsons, Cody, Kayden and Mykel, all of Knappa, Oregon; brother, David, of Lowell, Massachusetts; sisters, Nancy Schafer, of West Bend, Iowa, and her husband, Francis, and Linda Springer, of Utica, Nebraska, and her husband, Jerry.

Glenn graduated from Benedict High School in 1952. He worked as a mechanic from a very young age. After high school, Glenn headed out west and ended up working in Idaho Falls for a while, before finally moving further west to Portland, Oregon, where he worked for the local Volkswagen dealership as one of the first VW mechanics. He later then moved to Astoria, Oregon, to work as a mechanic at a new VW dealership that opened up.

Glenn met Betty in Portland in 1963, and they were married Sept. 10, 1964, in

Reno, Nevada. Over the years in Astoria, he worked in various shops in town, and would travel to Alaska in the summer to mechanic on the fishing boats until Glenn and Betty adopted Frank in 1975.

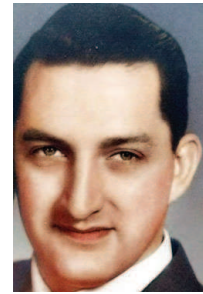
Glenn retired from North Coast Auto in Astoria in 1995. After retiring, he worked part time at various jobs, including helping with the new fairgrounds. He drove truck for Walluski Western for a number of years. He also drove The Bus, and worked at Hampton as a security guard.

Glenn had a vast knowledge of VWs, as they were his car of choice. Many people would bring or call about VW issues, and he always knew how to fix it. Glenn loved airplanes, and received his pilot's license in the 1960s, though he eventually sold his plane. He always wanted to construct a kit plane of some sort and begin flying again.

Glenn was cremated, and a private service will be held in Nebraska in the future.

A potluck-style celebration of life will be held at his home in Svensen on Sunday, May 5, at 1 p.m.
