SEASIDE — Teena Toyas was named the Seaside American Association of University Women Scholarship Foundation’s 2019 Breaking Barriers honoree at the April 24 “Movie Dollars for Scholars” fundraiser. She was also awarded \$500, which she will contribute to Clatsop Community College programs. Toyas holds both bach-

elor’s and master’s degrees in physical education and recreation, and successfully officiated basketball for 38 years in Oregon, Washington, Tennessee and Kentucky. She has also officiated for championship competitions and soccer games. She has received numerous awards, including Oregon Athletic Coaches Association Official of the Year in 2016-17, and has served as

president of the North Coast Basketball Association, was on the Oregon Athletic Officials Executive Board for eight years, and has been a commissioner and official for the North Coast Volleyball Officials Association for more than 30 years. Toyas is the dean of transfer education at Clatsop Community College, where she is also instructor of health and physical education.

College to hold GED orientations

Clatsop Community College will hold orientations next week for its General Education Development exam training classes. The college offers free classes to prepare students 16 and older for the

GED exam, which provides a high school credential. The classes are offered in English or Spanish, with tutoring. Students younger than 18 are required to present a release from compulsory education form from their local high school before attending class.

The GED exam orientations will take place from 10 a.m. to 1 p.m. May 9 at the college’s South County Center, 1455 N. Roosevelt Drive, and from 10 a.m. to 1 p.m. in Columbia Hall Room 219 on the college’s main campus at 1651 Lexington Ave.

Astoria High School senior recognized as Silent Servant

Astoria High School senior Henry Samuelson received a Silent Servant student award from the Peter R. Marsh Foundation of Vancouver, Washington, on Thursday. Principal Lynn Jackson nominated Samuelson for the award, which recognizes people who “voluntarily and privately serve others in need.” Such people “are indeed the most valuable citizens of our communities,” according to the foundation. Jackson said the definition fits Samuelson perfectly. “Henry Samuelson is a young man who has impacted not only his educational community but also the greater community

in numerous ways through doing selfless service without the expectation of any recognition or reward,”

Jackson said. “He is a positive force for good.” Samuelson volunteers with Homeless Connect Guide and works with younger people as a youth mentor. In addition to other volunteer work at school and in the community, he also serves as a leader and national ambassador for the 4-H Club. He was presented with the award during an all-school assembly in Astoria on Thursday. The Silent Servant award came with \$500 for Samuelson to spend as he chooses, as well as \$1,000 to the high school to “pay forward.” Jackson plans to use the money to honor staff members who have gone above and beyond their job descriptions in serving students and the community.

College names outstanding scholars

Clatsop Community College has named Leland Weideman, of Seaview, Washington, and Avery Anderson, of Jewell, to its All-Oregon Academic Team. Weideman and Anderson traveled April 26 to Salem, where they and the scholars from Oregon’s other 16 community colleges were presented to the state House and Senate and given medals by Gov. Kate Brown. They will also receive an Oregon transfer scholarship.

Weideman is in his second year at the college working on an associate transfer degree. He is on the dean’s list with a 4.0 GPA. He received the Information Literacy Prize last year through the college library’s writing competition. “My parents weren’t exactly the schooling type, but when they saw the potential in me they gave it their all to ensure that I kept my education going,” Weideman said in a news release from the college. “So here I am with a strong 4.0 GPA in the first two years of college. While I may not know how many more years I have to go, I know that as long as I keep my head up and my brain sharp, I can accomplish anything.” Anderson, who previously earned an associate degree from the college in weld-

ing and fabrication, will graduate this year with an associate transfer degree and head to Oregon State University with hopes of pursuing a career in astrophysics. He participates in community college honor society Phi Theta Kappa and has consistently made the dean’s list and honor roll. Faculty and staff nominate students who show excellence in the classroom, general intellectual curiosity, service to the community and the ability to share their talents with others. Pat Keefe, the college’s physics instructor, coordinates the selection process, sponsored by the Oregon Community College Association.
