Warrenton improves to 7-1 in summer season

Nine players were all the Warrenton Warriors had on Saturday at Ernie Aiken Field, but nine was all they needed.

The Warriors posted two more wins on their way to another impressive sweep on a full day of Junior Baseball in Astoria, where Warrenton defeated Ilwaco 13-3 and Knappa 7-3.

Neah-Kah-Nie followed with a 7-0 victory over Knappa, and Astoria Ford capped the night with a 3-0 win over Tillamook.

Dane Gouge's Astoria Ford is sponsoring all Junior Baseball games in Astoria this summer, with three more games on tap both Tuesday and Thursday.

In their two wins on Saturday, the Warriors gave up the first run in both games, then bounced back with good pitching and a flurry of extra base hits and base stealing to win both games.

In Game 1, Ilwaco's Kaeden Lyster drove in teammate Jackson Wilkin to give Ilwaco the first run of the day, but Warrenton scored six in the bottom of the second.

Dylon Atwood had a ground rule double to left field to bring in Hordie Bodden, who came to the plate again later in the inning and belted a bases-loaded triple for a 6-1 lead.

In the third inning, it was Duane Falls' turn, who blasted another bases-loaded triple to the fence to help the Warriors pull away. Bodden Boddin had another triple in the fifth to drive in the game-ending run.

"T.J. Hicks had his best day of the season, and Hordie is demonstrating the potential that he has with speed and power," said Warrenton coach Lennie Wolfe. "The first five guys in our lineup, we have some very fast kids. The big part is, I'm just pleased with the commitment from the players of having them show up five days a week.

Astoria Ford pitchers Gunnar Olson and Tony Tumbarello tossed a two-hit shutout over Tillamook, 3-0, in Saturday's final game.

Olson pitched four-and-a-third innings, allowing both hits with eight strikeouts, while Tumbarello struck out two to pick up the save.

Mayors call for limits as more police sent to Portland

PORTLAND — The mayors of six U.S. cities appealed Monday to Congress to make illegal for the federal government to deploy militarized federal agents to cities that don't want them, even as the Trump administration is considering sending more of them to Portland.

"This administration's egregious use of federal force on cities over the objections of local authorities should never happen," the mayors of Portland, Seattle, Chicago, Kansas City, Albuquerque and Washington, D.C., wrote to leaders of the U.S. House and Senate.

Early Monday, U.S. agents repeatedly fired what appeared to be tear gas, flash bangs and pepper balls at protesters outside the federal courthouse in downtown Portland. Some protesters had climbed over the fence surrounding the courthouse, while others shot fireworks, banged on the fence and projected lights on the building.

President Donald Trump said Monday on Twitter that the federal properties in Portland "wouldn't last a day" without the presence of the federal agents.

The Washington Post reported the Trump administration may be sending up to 150 additional federal agents to Portland.

According to an internal email reviewed by The Washington Post, the U.S. Marshals Service is sending 100 more deputy U.S. Marshals to Portland. The Marshals appear each night wearing camouflage.

Homeland Security is considering sending about 50 additional Customs and Border Protection agents to Portland, according to an administration official who spoke on condition of anonymity because they were not authorized to speak publicly about the matter. The plan has not been finalized, and it's not clear if the

officers would be replacing the officers on the ground. The Trump administration says the forces are needed in Portland to protect the courthouse and other federal buildings. But the mayors said the officers have patrolled areas distant from the federal properties and arrested citizens without cause.

PORTLAND HAS HAD NIGHTLY PROTESTS FOR TWO MONTHS SINCE THE DEATH OF GEORGE FLOYD IN MINNEAPOLIS IN MAY.

The mayors said they support legislative efforts to require notice and consultation with and consent from local authorities before deployments; require visible identification at all times on federal agents and vehicles unless on an undercover mission authorized by the local U.S. attorney; and impose limitations on federal agents' crowd control activities to protecting federal property.

Some protesters have accused Mayor Ted Wheeler of hypocrisy because he has allowed Portland police to use tear

gas and other riot-control weapons on protesters, including peaceful ones.

Demonstrations in support of racial justice and police reform in other cities around the U.S. were hit with violence over the weekend. Protesters set fire to an Oakland, California, courthouse; vehicles were set ablaze in Richmond, Virginia; an armed protester was shot and killed in Austin, Texas; and two people were shot and wounded in Aurora, Colorado, after a car drove through a protest.

Sunday evening, Portland police responded to a shooting at a park close to the site of the overnight protests. Two people were detained and later released, police said Monday morning. The person who was shot went to the hospital in a private vehicle and was treated for a wound not considered life threatening.

Also late Sunday, police said someone pointed out a bag in the same park, where officers found loaded rifle magazines and Molotov cocktails. The shooting was not related to the items, police said. It was not clear whether the shooting or the material found in the bag was connected to the protests.

The city has had nightly protests for two months since the death of George Floyd in Minneapolis in May. Trump said he sent federal agents to Portland to halt the unrest but state and local officials said they are making the situation worse.
