# Thrilling night at Aiken Field

The most exciting game of the summer had the cars at Ernie Aiken Field honking Thursday night, when Astoria Ford rallied from a 7-2 deficit to start the bottom of the seventh inning for an 8-7 win over Warrenton.

Neah-Kah-Nie followed with a 14-5 win over the Warriors in the second game, and the Fishermen scored a 9-8 victory over Knappa to cap the Junior State baseball triple header.

The Astoria Ford crowd was silent for the first six innings of the opener, as Warrenton pitchers Duane Falls and Dylan Atwood allowed just two hits over Astoria's first six at-bats.

Meanwhile, the Warrior bats were also kept silent by Astoria Ford pitcher Mike Moore.

After Warrenton scored four runs in the top of the first inning — highlighted by back-to-back RBI doubles by Falls and Atwood — Moore took the mound in the second inning, and retired nine straight over three innings.

The Warriors tacked on two runs in the fifth, as Talon McGrorty was hit by a pitch, then eventually scored on a wild pitch.

Josh Earls drew a walk, advanced to third on a single by Ryan Hoagland then scored on an errant throw.

ond with no outs, and Sven Johnson wasted no time in ending it, with a line drive to center scoring Moore with the walk-off, game-winning run.

"It took us six innings to wake up, but the boys never gave up," said Astoria Ford coach Tyler Lyngstad. "I am extremely proud of the effort today."

## Pirates 14, Warriors 5

Warrenton had to turn right around and play one of the hottest teams in the region this summer, the Neah-Kah-Nie Pirates.

With previous wins this summer over Astoria Ford and Knappa (including a 13-0 victory over Astoria Ford two days earlier, and a 7-0 win over Knappa), the Pirates built an 8-2 lead over Warrenton after four innings, then ended the game with six runs in the fifth (plus the two-hour time limit) for a 14-5 win.

Neah-Kah-Nie pitchers Keygan Wagner and Eddie Loza limited the Warriors to six hits, with four strikeouts and four walks.

Falls had three of Warrenton's six hits, with a double.

The Warriors entered the day with just 10 players, including two incoming eighth graders, and finished their second game with nine, when outfielder Hordie Bodden Bodden left with a slight injury.

"Our youth really showed today," said Warrenton coach Lennie Wolfe. "It was the first time our young pitchers had an off-day, and we didn't exactly help ourselves in the field (with eight errors in the loss to Neah-Kah-Nie). But we just lost a doubleheader, and even with the youth we have, we're still 7-3 for the summer, so I can't really complain."

Warrenton is scheduled to play additional games Monday and Wednesday at Aiken Field.

## Fishermen 9, Loggers 8

Astoria Ford had to rally again in the nightcap against Knappa, ultimately a 9-8 win for the Fishermen.

Down 3-0 early, Astoria tied the game in the fourth, only to have the Loggers score three more runs in the fifth for a 6-3 advantage.

The Fishermen finally scored all the runs they would need with a six-run sixth inning.

A bases-loaded double by Gunnar Olson tied the game at 6-6 and Tony Tumbarello brought in two more runs with a single.

Trailing 9-6 entering the seventh, the Loggers staged a rally of their own, scoring twice and putting the tying run at third base, before Bo Williams retired the final batter on a ground ball to preserve the win.

## Bruce Rochat Berney

Astoria

Feb. 3, 1935 — July 27, 2020

Bruce Rochat Berney, of Astoria, died peacefully in his sleep on July 27, 2020, due to complications from COVID-19. He was 85.

Born Feb. 3, 1935, in Walla Walla, Washington, to Vera (Whitney) Berney Gault and Harry Berney, he grew up in Camas, Washington, with his two older brothers, Charles and Donald.

Upon graduating from Camas High School in 1953, he went on to receive his bachelor's degree at the University of Puget Sound in 1957.

After two years of service in the U.S. Army Medical Corps, he obtained his master's degree in education at Lewis & Clark College. He spent two years teaching English in Toyama, Japan, and then earned a master's degree in librarianship at the University of Washington.

On Jan. 1, 1967, he became director of the Astoria Library, where he served for over 30 years. Also in 1967, Bruce met Kristina Pernu. The couple married in 1968.

Bruce was incredibly active in the local community, and in preserving and promoting the rich history of Astoria. He restored

several Victorian homes, helped establish the Historic Landmarks Commission and served for several years as the city's historic preservation officer.

He was active in the Kiwanis Club, Friends of MacDonalld, the Astoria City Council, the Clatsop County Historical Society, Boy Scouts, church and many other community service organizations.

Bruce is survived by his wife of 52 years, Kristina Berney; daughter, Laura Boughton; sons, Mark Berney (Kathleen) and Steven Berney (Theresa); six grandchildren, Devina, Orion, Brendan, Fineas, Emma and Olivia; brother, Charles Berney (Carole) of Watertown, Massachusetts; and numerous nieces, nephews and cousins.

A small, private, outdoor memorial service will be held at Ocean View Cemetery.

# Seaside's Kawasoe scores big victory in Portland

The weather was hot, but Seaside's Carson Kawasoe was hotter on the golf course earlier this week.

A junior-to-be and three-sport athlete with the Gulls, Kawasoe scored a major win in his best sport, when he won the annual Bob Allard Memorial Golf Classic, Monday and Tuesday at Rose City Golf Course in Portland.

Competing in the age 14-18 boys open division, Kawasoe shot a four-under par 140 to win by just one stroke over Cole Rueck, who shot a three-under par in Tuesday's final round. There were 60 golfers in the division, with top age group golfers from around the state.

Kawasoe shot a 74 in Monday's first round, highlighted by an eagle on the 10th hole.

But it was Rueck who was atop the leaderboard after the first round with a 70, followed by Nicholas Nautiyal (71), two golfers with a 72, and two others at 73.

So Kawasoe had his work cut out for him in Tuesday's second round.

"I was tied for seventh, but I told the guys in my group, 'you know guys, I'm just going to go win it.' And I kept it going."

And Kawasoe answered the challenge by scorching the course in Round 2, with

birdies on three of the first five holes. Kawasoe birdied No. 8 and finished the front nine with a 32. He recorded his second eagle on the 11th hole, on his way to a 34 on the back nine, for a six-under par 66.

Kawasoe said Rueck "played really solid. He bogeyed (holes) three, six and nine. I had one bogey on the day and the putter got pretty hot on the front."

Still, Kawasoe was not following the leaderboard very closely.

"I actually wasn't," he said. "Two of the kids I was playing with knew one of the dads in the last group, and we passed each other when I was on 18, and they were on 16. I had a two-shot lead with five

to play, and everyone seemed to know except for me.

"Right after I tapped in on 18, they said, 'I think you just won it.'"

Kawasoe knew most of the other golfers in the tournament. Rueck will be a junior at 5A Corvallis this year.

"They were mostly from Portland and Vancouver," he said. "Everyone congratulated me, and they were all really cool about it."

"It was definitely the biggest win I've had," he added. "I got myself over the hump. I started pretty slow this summer, just trying to get back in the groove. After the first round, I told my dad (Astoria Golf & Country Club golf pro John Kawasoe), 'I think that might have got me over the hump.'"

As for the Gulls, Seaside will be one of the favorites to win a 4A state title next spring — or whenever high school boys golf returns to the course. The Gulls would have been one of the favorites last spring, with all of their golfers returning this year.

"It was a bummer to have it canceled, but I was glad to have some tournaments this summer," Kawasoe said. "Luckily I'm young, so I get a couple more seasons. Curtis (Kunde) will be our only senior this year."

The champion from each division of the Allard Memorial will receive an invitation to the Tournament of Major

Champions, Sept. 12 at Illahe Hills Country Club in Salem, and Charlotte's Tournament of Champions, Sept. 26 at Creekside Golf Club in Salem.

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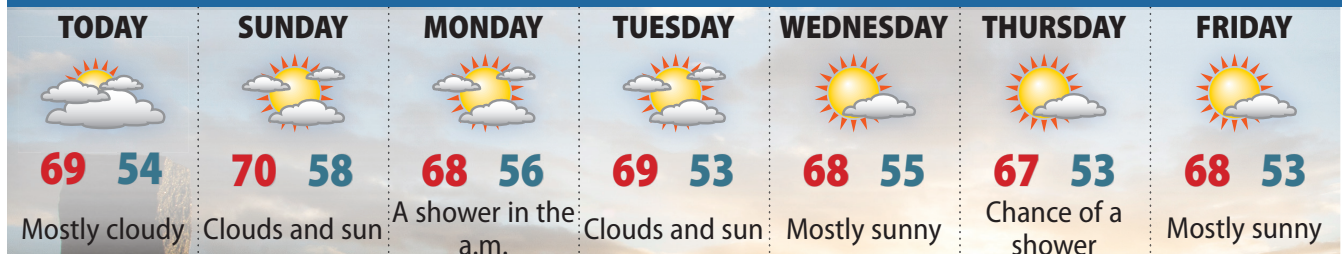
