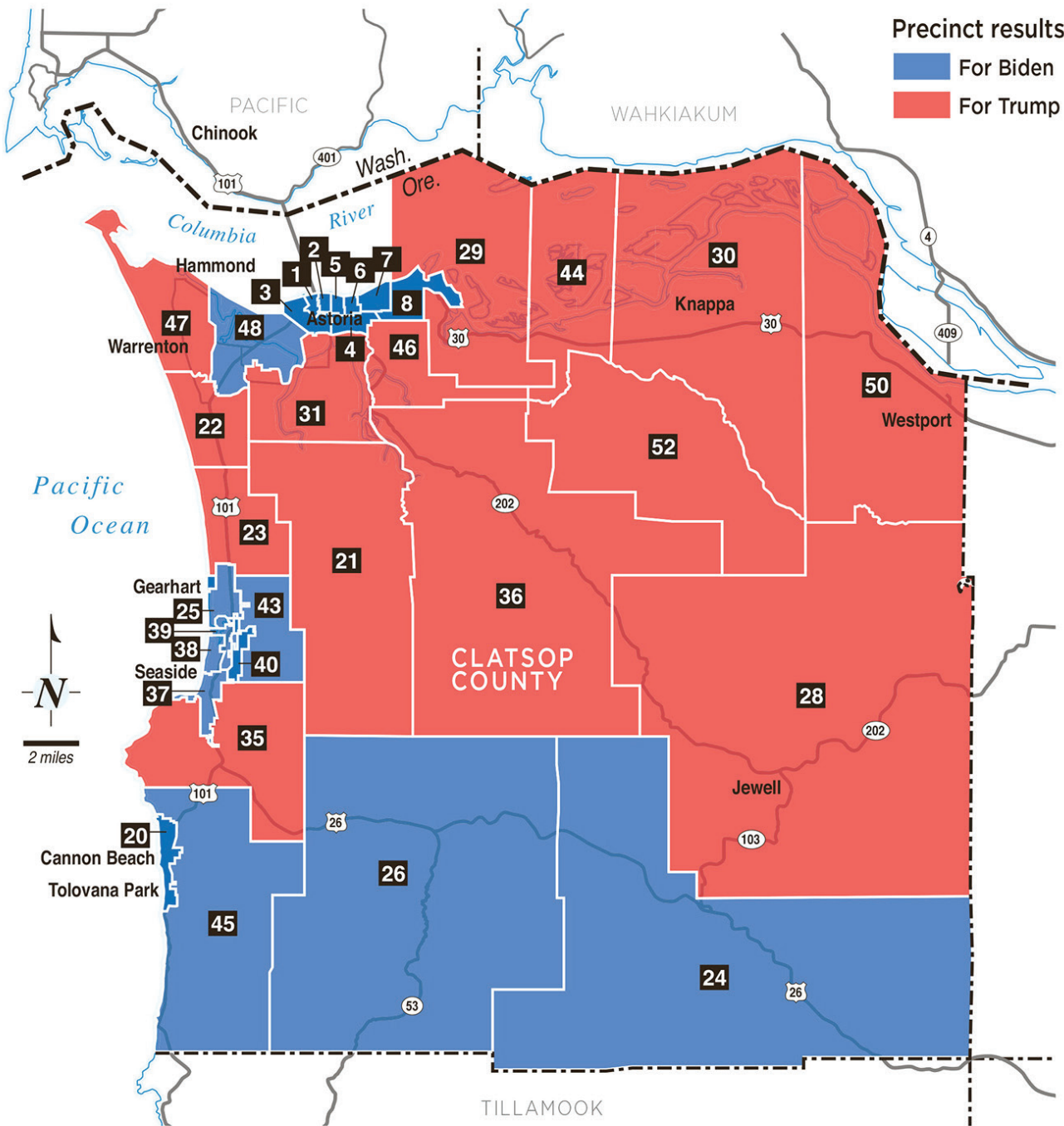

County vote for president shows how opinions harden

ELSIE — Diane Jette describes herself as an independent voter who is socially liberal and fiscally conservative.

The 74-year-old resident of Elsie, a rural, unincorporated area in the southeastern corner of Clatsop County, said it was her fiscally conservative side

that compelled her to vote for President Donald Trump in 2016.

“I had hoped that he would be able to stop our financial bleeding,” Jette said.

This year, she said she would have voted for just about anybody to replace Trump.

“His personality has come through and also he’s shown himself to be a bigot, which is so, so against my beliefs,” Jette said. “You’d like to hope

that the leaders you elected are actually somewhat on your side. And then, of course, I found out he was only on his own side.”

Elsie was one of three precincts — along with Stanley Acres and part of Warrenton — that favored Trump in 2016 but flipped to former Vice President Joe Biden, the Democrat, in 2020. One precinct — Walluski — switched to the Republican.

Despite the coronavirus pandemic, social unrest across the nation and an economic crisis, the county’s vote for president did not shift substantially,

Food delivery app plans kickoff

Deliveries are set to start in mid-January

The North Coast could soon have a dedicated food delivery service.

Candy Yiu, a software engineer at Intel, owns Near the Pier Guesthouse on Franklin Avenue and the Portland restaurant Malka with her husband, Akshay Dua. Over the summer, the couple started Slurpalicious, a free online and smartphone ordering platform for the North Coast, and has added several food carts.

Yiu and Dua recruited several drivers, including themselves, and plan to start deliveries in mid-January. Yiu said the service will initially cost restaurateurs up to \$50 a month.

Seaside loses a civic leader

Lyons led the Gulls to the 1994 state football title

SEASIDE — Stubby Lyons, a former coach and civic leader in Seaside who led the Gulls to a football state title in 1994, died on Christmas Day.

Lyons, 86, was a community leader as a teacher, coach, city councilor and volunteer, advocating for downtown improvements, a skate park for teens, a new public library, a city parks master plan and the Pearl Harbor Memorial Bridge.

Elected to the City Council in 2000, Lyons served until stepping down in 2014.

Sasquatch Sandwich comes to Seaside

Lancaster runs food cart

SEASIDE — Jason Lancaster, a former top chef at restaurants along the North Coast, is now displaying his culinary skills from inside his Sasquatch Sandwich Co. food cart parked at Hamilton Market on Avenue U.

Lancaster was a chef at Maggie’s on the Prom when he met the restaur-



rant’s co-owner, William Montero. While Lancaster left Maggie’s several years ago, the two met up at the Seaside Golf Course this fall.

Montero invited Lancaster to set up on the parking lot of the market, which he opened in 2019 with family members at the site of Ken’s Market.

Earlier this month, Seaside approved a special parking lot sales

event permit in response to restrictions for the coronavirus pandemic.

“I had the truck and he had the property,” Lancaster said while grilling an Asian num pang sandwich — pork belly, cucumbers, pickled carrots, cilantro, spicy mayo on a club roll. “This is exactly what I wanted it to be.”

Sasquatch Sandwich has a recurring set of specials including the Sasquatch Reuben, with pastrami, Swiss cheese, pickled cabbage, Russian dressing on marble rye; the Cubano, pork shoulder, ham, Swiss, pickle, mustard and pub roll; and the salami hero and vegetarian garden sandwich
