Suzanne “Suzie” Englund Fleck, 81, of Coquille, passed away on Jan. 3, 2021. A family graveside service was held Jan. 9, and a celebration of life gathering will be planned for later this year.

She was born in Astoria on July 3, 1939. Suzie graduated from Astoria High School in 1957. She then attended the University of Oregon, where in 1961 she received a bachelor’s degree in health/physical education and recreation, and was a member of the Tri Delta sorority.

She was married to James Franklin Fleck on Jan. 21, 1961.

Suzie held many positions in her career, working with youth, adults and the elderly, centering around activities and recreation. She retired from her final position as activities director at Heritage Place assisted living in Bandon in 2005.

She was a member of the Girl Scouts, 4-H club, PEO, Coquille Valley Hospital Auxiliary and Faith Lutheran Church. Suzie was very active in her community, support-

ing projects such as the Coquille pool and carousel.

She had a passion for swimming, singing, fishing, traveling, playing her accordion, dancing, family, friends, playing dress-up with grandkids and was an avid University of Oregon Ducks football fan.

She is survived by her brother, Jon Englund, and his wife, Mary-Jean, of Astoria; children, Dean Fleck, and his wife, Andrea, of Newport, Jean Trendell, and her husband, Bryan, of Coos Bay, and Mark Fleck, of Coos Bay; eight

grandchildren, Devin, Dana, Amity, Jennifer, Natalie, Elyse, Rylee and Sydney; and four great-grandchildren, Mia, Shane, Jaylen and Porter.

She is preceded in death by her father, Axel Englund; mother, Freda Englund; and husband, James Fleck.

Rev. John Tindell

April 2, 1936 — Dec. 31, 2020

Rev. John Tindell has been called home after a lifetime of service to the Lord, many communities in Alaska and the Pacific Northwest and his family. He died peacefully at home, under hospice care, on Dec. 31, 2020, after a struggle with complications from a stroke.

John was born on April 2, 1936, in Miami, Florida, to John J. and Mary L. (McLean) Tindell. His mother raised him in their neighborhood Allapattah Methodist Church, which led to his goal at age 12 of serving as a Methodist pastor, a path he followed for almost all of his adult life.

John met Beryl Insinger while they were students at Florida Southern College in Lakeland, Florida. They were married in 1959, while John was finishing a master’s degree in divinity from Emory University, and following Beryl’s agreement to a life of adventure in Alaska and beyond. The two traveled the globe together extensively. Beryl died in 2018, after 60 years of marriage.

In his deepest self he was an explorer, following mission opportunities in Cuba, Appalachia, Scotland and over 35 years in Alaska. He was the founding pastor of the Sitka United Methodist Church, and the first pastor of the then newly combined Methodist and Presbyterian Northern Light United Church in Juneau. He also led the

east Anchorage and Anchorage First United Methodist churches.

After his official retirement in Alaska, John served four more churches, two in Idaho and two in Oregon. His final assignment was 11 years as pastor of the Seaside United Methodist Church in Seaside.

John is survived by his two children, Raymond and Cynthia (“Cindy”); grandson, Kevin; and sister, Estelle Lima, of Miami, Florida.

Raymond is a Portland attorney and graduate of the University of Miami and Southern Methodist University Law School. Cindy is a graduate of Georgetown University, has master’s degrees from Columbia University and the Harvard Business School, and is a vice president at NextEra Energy in Palm Beach, Florida.

In retirement years, John and Beryl enjoyed being a part of the life of their grandson, Kevin, a doctoral student at Arizona State University.

Isom: Quarantined with family in Knappa

A few days later, his wife tested positive. They quarantined with their family at home in Knappa.

“It’s interesting, because we had kind of different symptoms,” Isom said. “My wife’s symptoms were more cold-like, losing taste and smell and kind of feeling it in her sinuses. And my symptoms were more flu-like. So it was more fatigue, achy body.”

Aside from working on some emails from home, Isom mostly left operations at the Port to Matt McGrath, the deputy director. His quarantine ended a week ago, and he started coming back into the office Monday.

Bornstein Seafoods, a processor located across from the Port offices, faced a virus out-

break in May. But Isom said he is the first employee of the Port so far to test positive for the virus.

“At some level, it’s kind of a numbers game,” he said. “If you have enough employees, with kind of the community spread that’s gone on, it’s hard to avoid it for too long.”

The Port has closed its offices to the public, held Port Commission meetings online and followed state and federal safety guidelines. Isom said the agency is lucky to have a lot of physical space and private offices to protect staff.

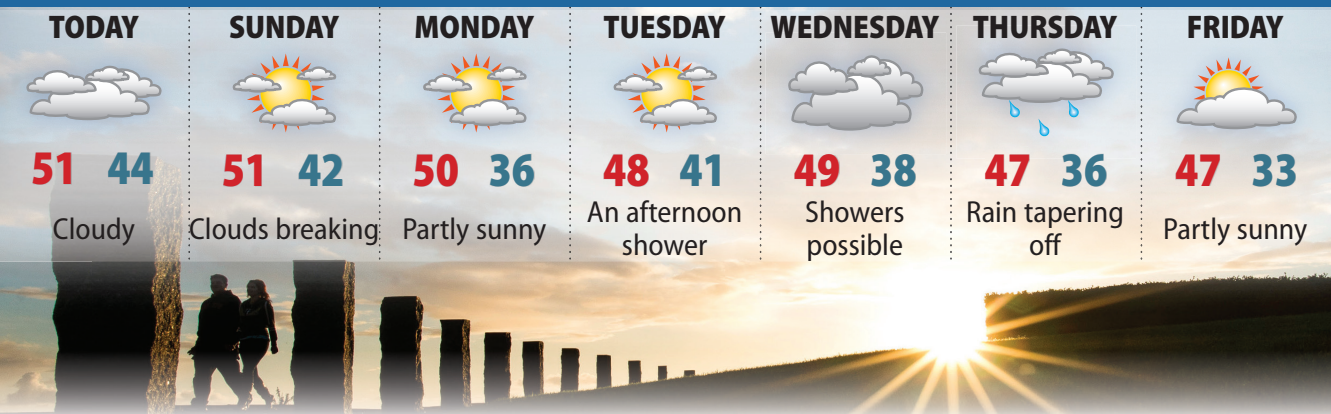
Isom said he is hopeful for a quick rollout of vaccines in the county.

“Until there’s sort of that herd immunity, we’re going to be kind of stuck where we’re at,” he said.

Lawrence Edward ‘Larry’ Goodell Sr.  
Aberdeen, Washington  
Jan. 3, 1950 — Jan. 7, 2021

Lawrence Edward “Larry” Goodell Sr., 71, a resident of Aberdeen, Washington, died on Jan. 7, 2021, at Grays Harbor Community Hospital in Aberdeen.

Larry was born on Jan. 3, 1950, in Astoria to Eugene S. and Ethel C. (Jones) Goodell. Larry was raised within a commercial fishing family where the Columbia River provided a way of life that sustained Larry and his family for generations.

Larry’s childhood home, located at Pillar Rock, Washington, was part of a small but historic fishing community where the tide ruled and salmon provided.

Prior to graduating from Naselle High School in 1968, at the age of 14, Larry took ownership of his first gillnet boat and fished for Point Adams Packing Co. as a young commercial fisherman. At 14, Larry also became a member of the Altoona Snag Union, and fished among his dad, relatives and other comrades for over 50 years.

Over time, Larry grew his fishing career and thrived upon the vast resources that our waters provided. Throughout 65-plus years, Larry fished in the Columbia River, Willapa Bay, Grays Harbor, Quinault River, Puget Sound, in Cordova, Cook Inlet and Bristol Bay, Alaska, and the coastal waters of Washington state and Oregon.

As a lifelong fisherman, when one season ended, the next season was just beginning where, guided by a depth finder and a tide book, Larry fished-to-live just as his father, siblings and relatives always had.

Larry’s way of life ran through his veins, and for the Goodell/Jones family, those traditions were rooted in Native American heritage. Raised in the ancestral homeland of the Wahkiakum Band of Chinook Indians, from both his mother and father Larry descends from a long line of Native American ancestry.

A direct descendant of Chinook headman and chief, Comcomly, Larry embodied his tribal lineage and honored his ancestry in all he did. His support and honor for the Chinook Tribe — of which he was a member — was unwavering, and he always hoped and dreamed federal recognition would bless his Chinook people.

He was a staunch supporter and advocate for Native American fishing rights and defended his origins as an Indian fisherman at all times.

Also an enrolled member of the Quinault Indian Nation, Larry’s legacy included many seasons fishing the Chehalis River with his father and other relatives, sharing his knowledge and growing close to the Quinault community. He also cut timber on the Quinault Reservation, and served on behalf of the Quinault Tribal Council as a member of multiple fish committees.

Larry’s humor and wit were unparalleled and guaranteed to make anyone laugh. Without fear, his ability to press forward — regardless of any circumstance — helped carry forward all those he cared for and touched. Larry’s spirit was a shining light where humor, patience and modesty won each day.

As we read this brief story and reflect upon Larry’s life, we may take comfort knowing that he lived a wonderful life and leaves a legacy of love, adventure, strength, pride and so many fish from so many places.

As time and tide wait for no man, Larry will be deeply missed by all, as he is called home to our Lord and walks on to our Creator.

Surviving relatives include a daughter, Laurie (Rich) Wyatt, of Montesano, Washington; three sons, James (Sofia) Goodell, of Bothell, Washington, George Ero (Cheryl) Goodell, of Dillingham, Alaska, and Junior Goodell, of Aberdeen, Washington; 11 grandchildren; one great-granddaughter; and a sister, Annette (Craig Wheatley) Goodell Bowley, of Longview, Washington.

A daughter, Cheryl Rose Goodell, and siblings, Eugene Goodell Jr., Carolyn Almer and Clifford Goodell, died previously.

There was a visitation at the Coleman Mortuary in Hoquiam, Washington, on Friday from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. and again on Saturday from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m.

A graveside Indian Shaker service will be held at 10 a.m. on Sunday at the Taholah Cemetery in Taholah, Washington.
